

#### From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

What is the first thing that you are going to do when you rise from the dead?

I bet no one has asked you that question before or at least not that directly. In some ways, with eternity in front of us, it really



doesn't matter since we have all the time in the world and then some to do whatever we want in Heaven, right?! But seriously, what would you do first?

In John's Gospel, as he was relating the resurrection to his followers, the evangelist adds a strange little detail: "When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place." (Jn 20:6-7). From this line, it appears the very first thing that Jesus did when He rose from the dead was to roll-up the cloth that was used to cover His face. Now, no one was there to see exactly what happened, and I suppose that there could have been some angel attendants flying around tidying up after Him. But in all the resurrection appearances that would follow, Jesus is presented as perfectly capable of taking care of Himselfwalking and interacting with the disciples, breaking bread. He even cooks some fish on a charcoal fire by the beach. It would seem that in His resurrected body, He did all these things by Himself, so rolling up the face cloth was likely the very first action that He took once risen from the dead.

Now, not to make a mountain out of a molehill, but it is an odd detail. In describing the most amazing miracle of all time, why spend any time mentioning this obscure little tidbit? With a growing consistency, every act of healing and resurrection that Jesus performed in His earthly ministry pointed toward a restoration of order and harmony to the individual as well as the greater community. When we consider the healing of Jairus' 12 year-old daughter, when Jesus restores her to life. He gives her back to her parents and tells them to give her something to eat. When he heals Peter's mother-in-law, Jesus brings her back to health and she immediately begins to resume her normal place in the household, waiting on them and bringing food. When He raises the young man at Nain from the dead and causes him to sit up in his coffin, Jesus immediately gives him back to his grieving mother and restores him to his community, alive and well. When Jesus rose Lazarus from the dead, the first thing He tells those who witnessed this amazing miracle to do was to "untie him and let him go free."

In all of these moments, there is a restoration of order and place. In Jesus' mind, little girls should not be sick in bed but up and about, enjoying a meal with their family. Mothers-in-law should not lie sick with a fever, but be fully alive and exercising joyfully their honorable and cherished place within the family, doing what grandmothers have done for eons—lavishing their families with food and love. Young men do not belong dead in coffins, but alive and reunited with their mothers and community. Close friends do not belong in the tomb, but free and unburdened by

illness and death to go and live their lives freely before God and others.

When death or illness occurs, not only does the individual suffer, but the whole family and extended community suffers the loss of everything this person is and all the blessings that they contributed to the whole. Healing and resurrection mean, suddenly, that everything is made complete once again, everything works, everything is as it ought to be. There is relief, joy and a palpable sense of peace, a restored right-relationship with God and one another that is to be savored.

And in Christ Jesus, every small detail and aspect of that restoration will be attended to. Starting with rolling up a face cloth and putting it away, where it will not ever be needed again. If, in His resurrected body, Jesus is mindful of even this minuscule and seemingly insignificant action, how much more will He be of every intimate and substantial detail in raising us from our graves and restoring us to life before God the Father and one another? How much more attentive will He be in recreating our universe in perfect harmony with God's Will? If the Risen Christ in all His glory took the time to roll up His face covering, how much more time will He take to restore each of us fully to the new life that awaits us in the resurrection.

So, what is the first thing you will do when you rise from the dead? Who will you look to reunite with first? Where would you want to go? What activities will you look forward to reengaging in? What areas of present chaos will you look to tidy up and cleanse? What parts of our lives will need to be purified and made holy and whole? What kind of order from disorder will the Lord bring about in us through His resurrection and ours? What will we need to pack up and put away, never to need it again in Heaven? I recently read an article about a man who passed away after being in an iron lung for more than 50 years. One can imagine as he experiences the resurrection, it might well include him turning off and packing away all the machinery that he was dependent on for life in this world, and breathing-in freely the new life that is in front of him for all eternity. Think about what it will be like! Ponder the possibility! While our real experience of the glory of the resurrection will always exceed our capacity to dream and muse on it in this world, our present hope is fueled nonetheless by our earnest desire to be with the Lord, both here and now and especially in the time to come.

May the Easter joy of the resurrection be ours today!




