**FIRST READING**

Isaiah 5:1-7

**A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah**

**I** will sing a song about the vineyard of my dear friend.  
It was on the side of a fertile hill.  
My friend dug the ground, removed the stones,  
and planted the best vines.  
He built a watchtower and dug a place to press the grapes.  
He hoped they would be good,  
but bitter grapes were all that grew.

Now listen, people of Jerusalem and of Judah!

**GOSPEL**  
Matthew 21:33-43

**A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew**

Jesus told the chief priests and leaders to listen to this story:

"A land owner once planted a vineyard.  
He built a wall around it and dug a pit to crush the grapes in.  
He also built a lookout tower.

"Then he rented out his vineyard and left the country.

"When it was harvest time,  
the owner sent some servants to get his share of the grapes.  
But the renters grabbed those servants.  
They beat up one, killed one,  
and stoned one of them to death.  
He then sent more servants than he did the first time.  
But the renters treated them in the same way.

"Finally, the owner sent his own son to the renters,  
because he thought they would respect him.  
But when they saw the man's son, they said,  
'Someday he will own the vineyard.  
Let's kill him!  
Then we can have it all for ourselves.'  
So they grabbed him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him."

Jesus asked, "When the owner of that vineyard comes,  
what do you suppose he will do to those renters?"

The chief priests and leaders answered,  
"He will kill them in some horrible way.  
Then he will rent out his vineyard to people  
who will give him his share of grapes at harvest time."
