

Dear Friends:

On this Easter Day we would do well to reflect upon what it means to profess belief in the "resurrection of the body," which is what we say every Sunday as we recite the Nicene Creed at church. I wonder how often we pause to realize what an astonishing claim of faith that really is. Resurrection! It happened to Jesus and it's promised to all of us who are faithful to the end. But one of the earliest heresies in our Christian Tradition--and one of the most enduring ones--is the one that believes that resurrection means escape from the body and moving in to the life of pure spirit with God. That's completely wrong. And it is rooted in the mistaken belief that there is something vile or essentially evil about our bodies. It is easy enough to understand why we are tempted to feel this way. After all, our bodies are those machines that tend to get broken down over time, flabby, cancerous, arthritic, wrinkly, tired, incontinent, achy, and especially, prone to death and decay. It can, and often has, felt reasonable for people--even people of sincere faith--to regard the human body as a kind of prison in which our souls are trapped until the day we die or are made free.

To repeat, that's all wrong. Not that such conditions don't happen, but they are no reason to despise our real fleshly bodies. Our bodies are the media through which we can be "somebodies," and can engage other somebodies through sight, sound and touch. They are the reason that we can make specific decisions to love other people in concrete ways. That doesn't deny that our bodies can grow sick and weak, or that they can even become occasions for sin, but it is to say that Christians have no reason to hold bodies in contempt. The "real us" is not our souls. It is our souls AND our bodies. That is exactly why our Creed at mass refuses to speak of the "resurrection of the soul." That's not accidental vocabulary; it was fought over for a few centuries because it was believed to be just that important to get it right.

But what does a resurrected body look like, exactly? Now there's the question! You will notice a lot of haziness in the gospels during these coming weeks of the Easter season about that question. We will be hearing stories, for example, of Jesus' risen body that can pass through locked doors, or that can walk for miles with his closest friends without being recognized until dinner time. We will also hear stories about a risen Jesus who gets hungry and asks for food, and who has recognizable wounds left over from Good Friday that can be seen and touched. Whatever a resurrected body is, it is not simply the re-assembly of our skin and bones and blood. (I think most of us of a certain age will be relieved to learn that!) Yet it is not exactly something other than that either. We are dealing in profound, wonderful mystery here, which is why it can be so constricting to read resurrection stories about Jesus too literally. But at minimum it will mean that every bit of our true "us" will survive beyond the grave. We will know and recognize and love each other in eternity as complete beings, not just as disembodied souls. I don't want to hang out with the souls of my beloved dead once I see them again. I want all of them. How will all that work out? Who needs to know? But that is the astonishing promise of Easter.

**Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!**



*Today's Readings: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Colossians 3:1-4; Sequence Victimae paschali laudes; John 20:1-9.* Coming to the tomb early in the morning, Mary Magdalene is expecting to spend time in the quiet in the darkness before dawn to mourn the death of Jesus. But she finds that the stone has been removed. Peter and other disciples come to the tomb, with their own expectations, and find only the burial cloths. Christ, the Paschal Victim, has been raised from the dead. Where is the stone?

Have you removed the stone that has been blocking your heart? Have the cloths that have covered your buried goodness been set aside? Resurrection is the joy of living fully in Christ. New life in Christ must be celebrated. It is all good news.

Christ, who is our hope, our Redeemer, and our life, is with us.

Easter is an opportunity to begin anew. The joy of the Resurrection should be unabashed joy, bold and unafraid. Christ has removed our burial cloths, and our renewal of baptismal promises reminds us that life in Christ is lived in the assembly of the faithful. The whole community shouts for joy: Alleluia! Find your newness of life and name it. Celebrate that new life with wholehearted singing and laughter. What has died within you has been changed into new life for the future. Throw open the windows, let in the light, and sing Alleluia! The Sequence today announces it firmly: Christ is risen from the dead, by this he has given us new life.

### Let Us Rejoice and Be Glad!

We hear in today's Gospel that the Apostles took hold of Jesus' feet and worshipped him. This week is full of the joys of the Resurrection. Let this be reflected in your home with flowers, white cloths, and any kind of light, from natural sunlight to candles. May your environment reflect the Alleluia brought to our lips with the Risen Christ. *Today's Readings: Acts 2:14, 22–33; Psalm 16:1–2a, 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; Matthew 28:8–15.*

**Tuesday, April 18**

### I Have Seen the Lord! Alleluia!

"I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." In Jesus' words to Mary Magdalene, we are reminded that we are united with Christ through our belief in him. Through the Risen Christ, we are joined to the Father. In being joined to Christ, we are also joined to all who believe. *Today's Readings: Acts 2:36–41; Psalm 33:4–5, 18–19, 20, 22; John 20:11–18.*

**Wednesday, April 19**

### Our Hearts Were Burning

When Jesus is walking with us, we can discern the true path. When Jesus is in our conversation, our hearts burn with the understanding that the Holy Spirit brings. When the bread that we break reveals God in our midst, we proclaim: Alleluia! During this Easter season, we may want to seek to open our hearts to the ways Christ is present to us. *Today's Readings: Acts 3:1–10; Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:13–35.*

**Thursday, April 20**

### Faith in the Name of the Lord

Peter and John heal not by their own power but in the name of the Lord. That faith and that name are our inheritance. Repentance, healing, preaching to all nations—all are to be "in his name." Carry with you this day that joyful message: that it is God working through us that accomplishes our salvation. *Today's Readings: Acts 3:11–26; Psalm 8:2ab, 5, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:35–48.*

**Friday, April 21**

### God of Surprises

In today's Gospel, we hear that Jesus provided an abundant number of fish for the disciples when they cast their net as he directed. As these disciples came ashore, he surprised them further with a breakfast that had been cooked over coals. How open are you to the surprises that God has prepared for you? *Today's Readings: Acts 4:1–12; Psalm 118:1–2, 4, 22–24, 25–27a; John 21:1–14.*

**Saturday, April 22**

### Rejoice, Believe, and Proclaim

Have you found joy in your encounters this week? We carry our Easter joy especially throughout the Octave of Easter, finding daily opportunities to discover light, happiness, and good news in daily tasks, encounters, and experiences. It is not a time for hardness of heart, as Jesus reminds us in the Gospel today. Let your attitude spread the Good News of Christ, who has died and risen for us. Alleluia! *Today's Readings: Acts 4:13–21; Psalm 118:1, 14–15ab, 16–18, 19–21; Mark 16:9–15.*
