#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Welcome to our children receiving their First Holy Communion this weekend. We extend our prayers and best wishes to you. As we see your joy and excitement to receive the Body and Blood of Christ for the first time, we are renewed in our love of Jesus Christ. We believe that the Body and Blood of Christ is present in the Eucharist. Through our reception of the Eucharist, we are more closely united to Christ, and Christ unites us more closely to one another in the Mystical Body of Christ (Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraph 1396). As members of the Body of Christ, we are called to love one another. As St. Paul wrote, "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Corinthians 10:16-17).

Archbishop Hebda will visit our parish on Sunday, May 16 to celebrate our 10:30 AM Mass. The weekend of May 15-16 is the beginning of the 75th Anniversary Year (1946-2021) of St. Pascal Baylon Parish. Looking back at our history, on May 28, 1946, Archbishop John Gregory Murray assigned Father John Vincent Ryan as the first pastor of the Church of Saint Pascal Baylon. Therefore, the year 2021 marks our 75th anniversary. As pandemic protocols allow during the year ahead, we will celebrate our parish history and parish life through worship, service and social activities

Who was St. Pascal Baylon? Saint Pascal Baylon was born in 1540 and died in 1592 in Spain. He was a peasant, a shepherd and a lay Franciscan Brother. Pope Alexander VIII canonized him in 1690. His chief loves in life were Christ in the Eucharist and Christ's poor.

Throughout this school year, every staff member has taken to heart the message of Saint Francis of Assisi and worked towards "being the change they wish to see" at school and in the world. Principal Collier Paske wrote about the school staff saying, "I would like all of my staff to receive an award this month for being flexible and going above and beyond their job descriptions to pull off in-person learning all year during the COVID-19 pandemic. This year has been so successful because they have all been so loving, patient, and hard working. I just want them all to know how proud I am and what an honor it is to work with them all!" We are so blessed to have such a dedicated faculty and staff at St. Pascal Regional!

#### **Thank You**

The St. Pascal's Men's Club Executive Board would like to thank its members, volunteers and parishioners who supported and patronized our fundraising events this past year including Booya and Christmas Tree sales.

Even without our annual Lenten Fish Fry, the results of that support and patronage allowed the Men's Club to disburse over \$32,000 to the parish community and to St. Pascal's Regional Catholic School.

Disbursements to the parish community included \$3,500 to the St. Pascal Baylon Endowment Fund, \$13,000 for the parish to upgrade all the lighting in the school classrooms and gym and \$2,000 for other parish group requests.

Disbursements to St. Pascal's Regional Catholic School included \$10,000 for school financial aid, \$600 for school athletics and \$3,500 to help with school field trips (buses, fees and expenses) next year.

### Help Us Remain

Father.

you are the vine grower, who cultivates the true vine, nourishing it and pruning it and keeping it in good health. You graft us onto the vine on the day of our baptism, and you sustain us.

Help us to keep the commandment to remain in your love.

Bring about much fruit in us.

And united by the divine love we receive, bring us more deeply into relationship with you and one another.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Today's readings: Acts 9:26–31; Psalm 22:26–27, 28, 30, 31–32; 1 John 3:18–24; John 15:1–8. "Remain in me as I remain in you." These words from the Gospel relay that the same life that flows through the vine is also in the branches.

Through the sacraments we receive the gift of God's own life. The image of the branches, sustained by the life of the vine, enables us to meditate more deeply on what that life means. Nourished by grace, we bear fruit. The healthier the vine, the more fruit it will bear. Yet none of us is in isolation. Each of us is intimately close to Jesus and to one another. What happens to one affects all.

When we build up the vine, the Body of Christ, we are doing what Jesus has asked: we are remaining in his love. The key question is how to do so.

When one part of the vine is suffering, all parts suffer. When one person among us is without food or medical care or companionship, all are affected. When one person rejects participation in the life of the vine, the vine itself is lacking. When we love, we create space for the other person to grow. When we love self-sacrificially, as Jesus does, we are like the grain of wheat that dies to itself so as to bear fruit.

Meditate on the image of the vine and the branches. Consider what it means to be so closely connected to one another as a vine is to its branches. Does that change your image of your relationship with Christ and other members of the Body of Christ? Perhaps you might choose to copy the Scripture or to draw the vine. This may help you consider what it might mean for your life to bear fruit.



## THIS WEEK AT HOME

### Monday, May 3

### Feast of Sts. Philip and James

Sts. Philip and James were apostles, and in their example we see what it means to follow Jesus. In the Gospel, Jesus' response to Philip's statements help us come to a greater understanding of our discipleship. After the resurrection, Jesus appeared to the apostles and commissioned them to go out to spread the Good News. How can your life, like theirs, be a witness to the Gospel? *Today's readings: 1 Corinthians* 15:1–8; Psalm 19:2–3, 4–5; John 14:6–14.

### Tuesday, May 4

#### A Path of Love

"Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." These words of Jesus seem particularly relevant to our world, where there appear to be dangers everywhere. When decisions are based on fear rather than love, we often find ourselves led to places we do not want to go. Jesus' life was guided by love. He instructs us that this is the map for us as well. *Today's readings: Acts 14:19–28; Psalm 145:10–11, 12–13ab, 21; John 14:27–31a.* 

# Wednesday, May 5 There with Us

Consider the words of Jesus: "ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you." Does this mean that we will always get our heart's desire? In Psalm 23, we hear that, because the Lord is our shepherd, there is nothing that we lack. Do you have everything you need? Be assured, God will be there whenever a person turns to him in their trouble. How can you accompany others in their time of trouble, as Jesus accompanies us? *Today's readings: Acts 15:1–6; Psalm 122:1–2, 3–4ab, 4cd–5; John 15:1–8.* 

### Thursday, May 6 Remain in My Love

Jesus invites us into relationship. He invites us to remain in his love, and he tells us how: keep his commandments. By doing this, he says, "your joy will be complete." Joy is different than happiness. Joy endures while happiness is fleeting. Our joy will be complete when we choose the way of love. *Today's readings: Acts 15:7–21; Psalm 96:1–2a, 2b–3, 10; John 15:9–11.* 

### Friday, May 7 Love One Another

How can we love as Jesus loves? Jesus tells us what we must do: lay down our lives. Do you think he means this literally? Some might be called to martyrdom, but many will not be. Jesus tells us that self-sacrifice is at the heart of what it means to love. When we turn away from selfishness and self-centeredness, even in small ways, when we act with mercy and forgiveness, we are loving as Jesus loves. *Today's readings: Acts 15:22–31; Psalm 57:8–9, 10 and 12; John 15:12–17.* 

### Saturday, May 8

### Challenging the World's Values

Jesus predicts that his way of love will challenge those who place first the things the world values. Christianity is countercultural. How can you help others to make decisions based on love, not fear? Supporting women in crises pregnancies is a way for love to cast out fear. Standing up for the rights of immigrants also rejects fear because it says that the goods of creation are intended for all. We do not have to worry that there will not be enough. We do not need to be afraid of people different from us. *Today's readings: Acts 16:1–10; Psalm 100:1b–2, 3, 5; John 15:18–21.*
