

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The Book of Daniel. This Sunday and next Sunday in our First Reading, we will hear from the Book of Daniel. In the 3-year Sunday Lectionary cycle (Years A, B and C), we are currently in Year B, and this is the only year in the 3-year cycle when we hear from the Book of Daniel at Sunday Mass. I thought you might like to learn a little more about this biblical book, and the following excerpt comes from the Introduction to the Book of Daniel in the New American Bible:

This book takes its name not from the author, who is actually unknown, but from its hero, who was allegedly among the first Jews deported to Babylon, where he lived at least until 538 B.C. Strictly speaking, the book does not belong to the prophetic writings but rather to a distinctive type of literature known as 'apocalyptic,' of which it is an early specimen. Apocalyptic writing first appears about 200 B.C. and flourished among Jews and Christians down to the Middle Ages, especially in times of persecution. Apocalyptic literature has its roots in the older teaching of the prophets, who often pointed ahead to the day of the Lord, the consummation of history. For both prophet and apocalyptist there was one Lord of history, who would ultimately vindicate the chosen people... This work was composed during the bitter persecution carried on by Antiochus IV Epiphanes (167–164 B.C.) and was written to strengthen and comfort the Jewish people in their ordeal. Antiochus tried to force Jews to adopt Greek ways, including religious practices. Severe penalties, including death, were exacted against those who refused. The book contains traditional stories which tell of the trials and triumphs of the wise Daniel and his three companions. The moral is that people of faith can resist temptation and conquer adversity. The stories bristle with historical problems and have the character of historical novels rather than factual records. What is more important than the question of historicity, and closer to the intention of the author, is the fact that persecuted Jews of the second century B.C. would quickly see the application of these stories to their own plight.

If you would like to write the names of your loved ones who have died in our Book of Life, the book will be in the Gathering Space before Mass each weekend in November. The Book of Life is brought forward with the gifts of bread and wine at weekend Masses in November and placed upon the altar as we remember all of the faithful departed in a special way this month.

This year we ask you to wear a face mask to the prayer service for COVID safety precautions.

Thanksgiving Day Mass, November 25, will be celebrated at 9:00 AM. Come join us to give thanks to God for our blessings. We usually celebrate weekday Masses at 8:00 AM, and the 9:00 AM Mass time on Thanksgiving Day gives us an extra hour of sleep or an extra hour to prepare Thanksgiving dinner!

ARCHDIOCESAN SYNOD

We Appreciate You!

Thank you to all who participated in the Parish Consultation with Small Groups Process in anticipation of the Archdiocesan Synod Assembly. Data from the feedback forms has been submitted to the Archdiocese, and will be used to inform both the Deanery Consultation Process taking place in January and February 2022, and the Synod Assembly itself taking place in June 2022.

At St. Pascal's the data and ideas submitted are also being collated for the parish team and parish council to review in planning for the future.

Water Mitigation Project Update

Last week was very eventful in the parish office. Our roofing contractor arrived and expected to replace a few feet of roof decking due to our previously unmitigated runoff problems. Rain was running directly on the brick from the upper roof and found its way behind the flashing on the lower parish office roof.

Years of no gutters took a toll on the lower roof structure. The contractor uncovered mold and soggy insulation that spanned the entire office area. There was no integrity to the remaining decking; plywood fell apart in the workers' hands. Previously brown wood was black with mold and the insulation followed suit.

Thanks to your financial support, the parish office roof has new insulation, flashing, roof deck, and shingles. We don't expect further issues since the source of our problems above has been fixed. Gutters and algae removal from the brick ensure the building will be protected from our Minnesota elements and will shelter future generations of St. Pascalites.



e all depend on workers in America's meatprocessing plants and animal-feeding operations,
who are essential to the food supply chain.

Many of them are immigrants facing language barriers
that leave them at a disadvantage when they advocate
for safe working conditions, just wages, and fair treatment
from employers. The Rural Community Workers Alliance
(RCWA) in Missouri helps these essential workers by
advocating on their behalf for safe working conditions and
by promoting gatherings to address racial divisions in the
community as a way to help immigrants and nonimmigrants discover similarities and share their experiences.


The COVID-19 pandemic revealed working conditions at a pork-processing plant that placed workers at risk of infection due to shoulder-to-shoulder work areas and a lack of protective gear. Workers brought their concerns to RCWA and ultimately filed a lawsuit demanding that the company follow health and safety guidelines established by the federal government. Even before the court ruled

on the lawsuit, the company took action to protect workers by installing protective barriers, sanitizing stations, providing masks, and conducting temperature checks. When you support CCHD's mission of working on the margins, you help groups such as RCWA advocate for the health and safety of the essential workers that we all depend upon.



odos nosotros dependemos de los trabajadores de las plantas procesadoras de carne y de los procesos de alimentación de animales en los Estados Unidos, lo cual es esencial para la cadena de suministro de alimentos. Muchos de ellos son inmigrantes que enfrentan barreras idiomáticas que los ponen en desventaja cuando abogan por condiciones laborales seguras, por salarios justos y por un trato equitativo de parte de sus empleadores. La Alianza de Trabajadores de la Comunidad Rural, en inglés *Rural Community Workers Alliance* (RCWA), en Missouri, ayuda a estos trabajadores esenciales abogando, a nombre de ellos, por unas condiciones laborales seguras y fomentando reuniones para abordar las divisiones raciales en la comunidad a fin de ayudar a los inmigrantes y no-inmigrantes a descubrir lo que tienen en común y a compartir sus experiencias.

La pandemia del COVID-19 puso al descubierto unas condiciones laborales en una planta procesadora de carne de cerdo que ponía a los trabajadores en riesgo de infección debido a laborar hombro con hombro en las zonas de trabajo y a la falta de un equipo de protección. Los trabajadores presentaron su preocupación a RCWA y, al final, presentaron una demanda exigiendo que la empresa cumpla con las normas de salud y seguridad establecidas

por el gobierno federal. Incluso antes de que el tribunal dictaminara sobre la demanda, la empresa tomó medidas para proteger a los trabajadores instalando barreras protectoras, desinfectando estaciones, proporcionando mascarillas y realizando controles de temperatura. Cuando ustedes apoyan la misión de CCHD de trabajar desde la periferia, ustedes ayudan a grupos como RCWA a abogar por la salud y la seguridad de esos trabajadores esenciales de los cuales todos dependemos.
