FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Welcome to our children receiving their First Holy Communion this weekend. As we see your joy and excitement to receive the Body and Blood of Christ for the first time, we are renewed in our appreciation of the gift of the Eucharist. We believe that the Body and Blood of Jesus are present in a real way in the Eucharist. Through our reception of Holy Communion, we have union with Jesus and all the members of the Mystical Body of Christ (Catechism, 1396). Saint Paul wrote, "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Corinthians 10:16-17). Since we are members of the same body, we are called to love one another. Thus, the Eucharist draws us closer to Jesus and to one another. Thank you, Lord, for the gift of the Eucharist.

The feast day of Saint Pascal Baylon is Tuesday, May 17. Happy feast day! From our parish website: "Saint Pascal Baylon was born May 24, 1540 on the Feast of Pentecost at Torre-Hermosa in northeastern Spain. He was the son of virtuous peasant farmers. In early childhood, Pascal began to display signs of exceptional devotion to the Holy Eucharist. While tending sheep as a youth, Pascal spent countless hours in meditation on the Blessed Sacrament. When he was twenty-four, he applied for admission as a lay brother to the Franciscan community of Lorento in eastern Spain. He was accepted into the community and was given humble jobs including cook, gardener and porter. He carried these out faithfully, but what truly impressed his community was his dedication to the mystery of the Holy Eucharist. His joy in life was to pray before the tabernacle, often spending the night in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. Pascal revealed the love of God through his many acts of kindness. To the poor and sick that came to the monastery, he showed himself to be patient, gentle and very generous in distributing supplies that were put at his disposal...Pascal died on the same feast on which he was born - the Feast of Pentecost - in 1592."

Next weekend, May 21-22, we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at all the weekend Masses. Jesus Christ gave us the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick to bring us healing in body, mind and spirit. Each time a person falls seriously ill, they may receive the Anointing of the Sick. Even if there is no physical healing after being anointed, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness. The Anointing of the Sick can be repeated if the sick person, having recovered, again becomes gravely ill or if the condition becomes more serious during the same illness. People who are preparing for surgery may be anointed. Children may be anointed if they have reached the age of reason and would not feel afraid to be anointed. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present. Sometimes the Anointing of the Sick is referred to as "extreme unction" because the person being anointed is in grave danger of dying. However, a person does not have to be dying to receive the Anointing of the Sick: "The anointing of the sick is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time to receive this sacrament has certainly already arrived" (Catechism, 1514). If you wish to receive anointing but prefer to not be anointed during Mass, you may schedule a time with me to celebrate the Anointing of the Sick in your home or in our chapel.

Merrick Community Services

On April 25, St. Pascal's hosted our first curbside food distribution in collaboration with Merrick Community Services. Over 20 volunteers from St. Pascal Baylon and Progressive Baptist packed and distributed food to 26 households. *Our next curbside food distribution is on Monday, May 23.* We will continue with food distributions on the 4th Monday of the month (with June 20 as an exception).

If you'd like to join this amazing group of volunteers, please email Mary Weyandt at mlweyandt@mac.com to sign up for one of two shifts. The first shift (1:30 - 3:30 PM) to unload the food from Merrick and pack the bags; the second shift (from 3:00 - 5:00 PM) to distribute the food curbside.

We also continue to collect clean paper and plastic grocery bags for food distribution at both St. Pascal's and Progressive. The grocery bags can be left in the donation closet near Brioschi Hall.

The St. Pascal's Men's Club Executive Board would like to thank its members, volunteers and parishioners who supported and patronized our fundraising events this past year including Booya, Christmas Tree sales and Lenten Fish Frys.

Your support and patronage allowed the Men's Club to disburse over \$30,000 to the parish community and St. Pascal Regional Catholic School.

The disbursements to the parish community included \$2,500 to the St. Pascal Baylon Endowment Fund, \$14,200 for the parish to upgrade all the lighting in Brioschi Hall and Extended Day Room and \$3,500 for other parish group requests.

The disbursements to the St. Pascal's Regional Catholic School included \$5,150 for school financial aid, \$1,400 for Washington DC trip and \$3,500 to help with other school field trips (buses, fees and expenses) next year.

Sunday, May 15, 2022 God's Dwelling among Us

Today's readings: Acts 14:21–27; Psalm 145:8–9, 10–11, 11–13; Revelation 21:1–5a; John 13:31–33a, 34–35. Have you ever noticed something wondrous for the first time and then learned that it had been present for quite a while? That occurs in our relationship with God and his work in our lives. Often, people are so absorbed with the many events in their lives that they miss the goodness and love that God sends their way.

The reading from Revelation tells us that God has made his home among us: "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race. . . . God himself will always be with them as their God." In his place among us, God is present through

the most difficult times. "He will wipe every tear from their eyes," we are told. But there is more. "There shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain."

In the Gospel, Jesus tells us that it is by our love that we will be recognized as disciples. Through our love the presence of God becomes known to family, friends, and the community. Who in your life noticeably manifests the love of God? Make it a point this week to stop for a moment to appreciate God's presence in your life. Pray for the grace of awareness to be God's presence for those who most need to know they are loved today.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, May 16 A Healing Love

Jesus tells his followers that those who keep his commandments love him. The love that Jesus proclaims is rooted in the reality that all of us are created in the image of God. This love recognizes our frailty and failures and our need for healing. This love also recognizes the best of who we can be for one another. Such love forgives and provides for healing. How will you show the love of God today? *Today's readings:* Acts 14:5–18; Psalm 115:1–2, 3–4, 15–16; John 14:21–26.

Tuesday, May 17 The Gift of Peace

What does it mean that Jesus offers the disciples peace? Peace doesn't mean the absence of challenges, conflicts, or worry; the power of peace is that it exists in the midst of all these things. The person who is at peace trusts that someone greater holds your life as precious in every moment. Peace can help you put matters in perspective so that, rather than worrying or being fearful, you remember, as Sr. Thea Bowman said, "who you are and whose you are." *Today's readings: Acts 14:19–28; Psalm 145:10–11, 12–13ab, 21; John 14:27–31a.*

Wednesday, May 18 Remain in Jesus

Jesus tells us that he is the true vine and we are the branches. Jesus' entire life and ministry was rooted in his relationship with his Father and his desire is to share that relationship with us so that we can nourish others. The simplest way to maintain our viability as a life-giving branch on the vine is to remain rooted in our relationship with Christ. Prayer and the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, are ways we can remain in Jesus. *Today's readings: Acts 15:1–6; Psalm 122:1–2, 3–4ab, 4cd–5; John 15:1–8.*

Thursday, May 19

Joy

"Joy is the infallible sign of the presence of God," said Teilhard de Chardin, sj. In today's Gospel, Jesus offers love as the simple ingredient for joy. This love is grounded in Christ. Consider how your life would be more joyful if you allowed yourself to rest in the love of God. Sometimes it is difficult to accept that God offers us his love unconditionally. When we accept that, it is easier to love ourselves and God. *Today's readings: Acts 15:7–21; Psalm 96:1–2a, 2b–3, 10; John 15:9–11.*

Friday, May 20 Loved and Chosen

The Gospels this week have focused on being rooted in our relationship with God. Love, peace, and joy are only possible because of that relationship. Today Jesus adds another layer: he sends his followers out to continue his mission. Today it would be good to pray for the grace to be courageous to accept that we are chosen and loved, and to share the love we have known through him. *Today's readings: Acts 15:22–31; Psalm 57:8–9, 10 and 12; John 15:12–17.*

Saturday, May 21 Reality Check

Today's Gospel offers a reality check regarding discipleship. Not everyone will appreciate the Christian message that you share, and some may rebuke you for spreading the Gospel. Living as a Christian can mean facing persecution. Jesus tells us to remember that he experienced these challenges. When discipleship is the hardest, take comfort in knowing that your witness provides a source of life and hope. *Today's readings:* Acts 16:1–10; Psalm 100:1b–2, 3, 5; John 15:18–21.
