

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

Happy Easter! From all of us here at St. Pascal Baylon Church, I wish you and your family a joyful Easter Sunday and a wonderful Easter Season. In the Gospel reading this morning, Mary Magdalene reports to Peter and John that the body of Jesus has been taken from his tomb. When Peter and John go to see the tomb for themselves, they see the burial cloths in the tomb, and then we are told that John "saw and believed" (John 20:8). On Easter Sunday and every day of our lives, we are invited to believe in the risen Christ. The Apostles had difficulty believing in the risen Christ until they saw him in the Upper Room on Easter morning. When they saw the risen Jesus, they believed. We were not in the Upper Room on Easter morning when Jesus appeared. We have not seen Jesus in the flesh as the Apostles did. Yet, we are invited to believe. I believe that if we step out in faith towards Jesus and say, "Jesus, I believe in you", then we will see Our Lord in the Eucharist, in the Scriptures, in the assembly at Mass, and in each other.

Archdiocesan Synod Update. In November 2022, Archbishop Hebda released his pastoral letter entitled, "You Will Be My Witnesses: Gathered and Sent from the Upper Room." There are printed copies of the pastoral letter in the kiosk in our Gathering Space, or you can read the letter online at archspm.org/synod. In his pastoral letter, Archbishop Hebda established Synod Priorities for all parishes in the Archdiocese over the next three years:

Year 1 (July 2023 – June 2024): Small Groups

Year 2 (July 2024 – June 2025): The Mass

Year 3 (July 2025 – June 2026): Parents as Primary Educators

Each pastor in the Archdiocese has formed a Synod Evangelization Team at their parish to discern the best ways to implement the Synod priorities at their parish. The following parishioners accepted my invitation to join our Synod Evangelization Team: Jaci Bush, Nicole Fisch, Rich and Julie Moore, Kim Roering, John Scanlon, and Mary Weyandt. This team will work in collaboration with our parish pastoral council, other parish leadership groups and our parish staff to discern and implement the Synod Priorities. On April 29, our team will meet for a Small Group Visioning Day to equip our team to recruit potential small group leaders at St. Pascal Baylon parish over the summer and to begin preparations for the Fall 2023 Small Group Leadership Training Sessions. I already see active small group leaders and active small groups in our parish such as our Bible study groups, Just Faith group, Men's Club, Women's Club, Young at Heart group, monthly Merrick food distribution group, and our collaboration with Progressive Baptist Church in their weekly food distribution. These existing small groups can grow, and maybe there are new small groups we can develop. Please keep our parish in your prayers as we discern ways to implement the Synod Priorities over the next three years.

The Pope's Monthly Intentions. Each year, the Holy Father asks for our prayers for a specific intention each month. You are invited to answer the Holy Father's request and to join with many people worldwide in praying for this intention each month.

Prayer Intention of Pope Francis for April 2023: For a culture of peace and non-violence. We pray for the spread of peace and non-violence by decreasing the use of weapons by States and citizens.

St. Pascal Regional Catholic School was awarded the 2023 STEM Innovation Grant from Minndependent. The grant is worth \$1075 and will be used to purchase two high-quality engineering units. One of the units is called "Rockets and Rovers," developed by NASA. Students will play the role of engineers and design their own rockets and rovers. The other unit helps students learn how to design water filters to better clean dirty water. Both units provide engaging, hands-on experiences and satisfy state standards regarding engineering. Finance Council Meeting Update from March 23, 2023 *The Finance Council reviewed and discussed:*

- February Income was lower than budget.
- Cash reserves are still strong.
- Utility costs are high but close to budget. (Snow removal is much higher than budget.)
- Next year's budget is being prepared.
- We took a tour of the building to see the water damage and ongoing repairs. There was extensive damage but insurance will cover most of it.
- Plan is to upgrade both bathrooms to modern facilities (toilets first, then sinks). This will lower the chance of this happening again and make them more user friendly.
- Friends & Family Event and the Fund-A-Need (boiler replacement) were reviewed.
- Composting program will start soon. This will lower trash removal costs and be good for the environment.
- Recruiting for new members for Finance Council and Parish Council will be in April and May.

HEATING SYSTEM UPDATE

Currently we have two boilers which are used to heat the parish and regional school buildings. The Kewanee is 75 years old, and the Pacific is 60 years old.



The older boiler is only 75% energy efficient and is costly to maintain and use.

A group of parishioners (all experts in boilers) recently contacted three different companies—each one recommended that we replace this equipment as soon as possible due to the increased possibility of failure during the periods of heavy use.

A new boiler will be between 85-92% efficient and will require far less maintenance. The new equipment will be used as the primary heat source and the Pacific as a supplemental system during the coldest part of winter.

A new boiler will lower our heating and maintenance costs. It will also significantly lower the concern about boiler failure during our cold winter months.

This will ensure we can continue to be good stewards of our parishioners' donations and our building infrastructure.



Dear Friends, April 2023

Our aging boilers have provided heat for the community for many years. Both the main and backup units are nearing their end of lifespans, so it's time to look at modern alternatives.

- The main boiler, a Pacific model 972-A was manufactured in 1960. The backup, a 1949 Kewanee installed in 1950, each have an estimated 75% efficiency rating.
- \$29,000.00 was spent in maintenance and repairs for the system during the last fiscal year.
- The January gas bill was almost \$9,000 this year. The gas usage in October 2022 was 136 therms while November's bill showed a usage of 2,353 therms. (January 2023 was 7,271 therms).
- The new boiler will have a controller (thermostat) that ties in with our existing air conditioning and fan system enabling targeted heating times and temps. Currently the 1949 and 1961 technology allow for on/off and nothing else.
- A group of parishioners and staff explored the many new options on the market. They contacted three contractors and are in the process of comparing bids.
- Depending upon the type of boiler chosen, efficiencies will increase to 85%, 89% or 92%. The group will weigh the cost/benefit before determining the boiler system and contractor.
- We will replace the old 1949 Kewanee with the new boiler. The "newest" unit, the 1960 Pacific has been recently refurbished and will provide backup heat if needed during our coldest months. This is standard procedure for many buildings in our cold climate. The backup boiler will sit idle and will be fired up only when necessary, thereby saving energy and maintenance costs.
- Initial estimates are ranging from \$150,000 to over \$200,000, depending upon type. Asbestos removal will be quoted separately.

The time is now to start saving for the future. Fr. John, the Trustees and Finance Council are all in agreement that a proactive approach is best. Last year's roof project had a phenomenal response, and we are very grateful for your support. Please thoughtfully consider supporting this vital infrastructure project. Due to the cost, this will be a multi-year fundraiser.





EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD



Alleluia! Alleluia!

Infuse our hearts with joy as we pray, sing, and dance in celebration. Bless our Easter worship and time gathered with family and friends this day.

Today's readings: Acts 10:34a, 37–43; Psalm 118:1–2, 16–17, 22–23; Colossians 3:1–4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b–8; Sequence Victimae paschali laudes; John 20:1–9 or Matthew 28:1–10 or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13–35. Celebrating Easter is like watching the sunrise in the most beautiful place ever visited. All along our journey through Lent our eyes have been tuned for directional arrows in the Scriptures pointing our steps toward God, who summons us unceasingly.

At Easter we open our hearts fully as the Son rises gloriously and his rays fill us with joy. Together with the community of faith, we renew our baptismal vows. Like a long-married couple renewing their marriage vows, we baptized Christians renew our commitment to Jesus Christ and the Church. We welcome sprinkles of blessed baptismal water as a symbol of our bond in faith. It is a joyous response to God's invitation to return to him with ready hearts. The resurrection is celebrated with our jubilant renewal of faith as the Gloria and Alleluia are sung and trumpets and bells resound. Our sanctuaries and homes are filled with fragrant flowers and our tables hold choice foods to share with those we love. The Son is alive and with us always! Alleluia!



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 10 Do Not Be Afraid

In Matthew's resurrection account, the first appearance of the risen Lord is to Mary Magdalene and "the other Mary." The encounter is utterly unexpected. The women were looking for the disciples. They could not imagine seeing Jesus. The first words Jesus speaks are "Peace" and "Do not be afraid." With their fear dispelled, the women embrace their call to be the first witnesses of the risen Christ. *Today's readings: Acts* 2:14, 22–33; *Psalm 16:1–2a and 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; Matthew* 28:8–15.

Tuesday, April 11 Called by Name

John's resurrection account mirrors Matthew's in that the first appearance of the risen Lord is to Mary Magdalene. Consumed with grief and confusion, Mary is unable to recognize Jesus until he calls her by name. At the sound of her name, Mary is forever transformed. With certainty, she announces the good news. On the day of our baptism, and continually throughout our lives, God calls us by name and sends us as living witnesses to the world. *Today's readings: Acts 2:36–41; Psalm 33:4–5, 18–19, 20 and 22; John 20:11–18*.

Wednesday, April 12 Be Alert

There is so much good news to unpack and celebrate about the resurrection of Jesus that the Church gives us fifty days in the Easter season to do this. Today is one of the many times when we hear about the time Jesus appeared to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. He approaches and walks with them, first listening, then teaching, and ultimately revealing. Jesus does that with each of us, day by day, through the Easter season. Be alert for when he shows up! *Today's readings: Acts 3:1–10; Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:13–35.*

Thursday, April 13

Go Deeper

As Jesus ate and spoke with his disciples in Jerusalem, Luke tells us that "he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures" (Luke 24:45). He reinterpreted sacred Scripture in light of his birth, death, and resurrection, revealing a new layer of meaning about the plan of God. How might we allow our daily reading of the Scriptures through this Easter season to bring us to a deeper understanding of the paschal mystery in our time? *Today's readings: Acts 3:11–26; Psalm 8:2ab and 5, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:35–48.*

Friday, April 14 Fifty Days

Today we hear from John about Jesus' third appearance to his disciples, this time on the beach of the Sea of Tiberias. The disciples have returned to their occupation of fishing. Jesus will be sending them back to the vocation to which he called them as evangelists. Jesus did not give up on his beloved disciples; he does not give up on us. Easter is not over; it has just begun. During these fifty days of Easter, we have time to contemplate how the Lord draws us close, feeds us, and empowers us to be living witnesses of joy. *Today's readings: Acts 4:1–12; Psalm 118:1–2 and 4*, 22–24, 25–27a; *John 21:1–14*.

Saturday, April 15

Go Out to the Whole World

The octave (eight days) of Easter concludes with Mark's account of how Jesus appeared first to Mary Magdalene. She immediately went to announce the good news. But, alas, she was met with resistance and disbelief. Witnessing the truth of Jesus Christ in today's culture requires confronting skepticism and rejection. But as Jesus instructed the disciples then, he commands us now to persist and "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Today's readings: Acts 4:13–21; Psalm 118:1 and 14–15ab, 16–18, 19–21; Mark 16:9–15.
