

#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

I will be sending a letter to Archbishop Hebda expressing my desire that he assign me to a second term as the pastor of St. Pascal Baylon Parish. I will complete my first 6-year term as the pastor here on June 30, 2024. The Archbishop asks all pastors to write him a letter as they near the end of their first term to express their thoughts about serving a second term at their parish or receiving a new assignment. I wish to serve a second term as the pastor of St. Pascal Baylon Parish from 2024-2030. I think our parish is a good fit for my talents, gifts and personality. Over the last two weeks, I asked for input from the parish staff, trustees, finance committee and parish council about serving a second term here, and I received a favorable response from them. Some pastors are assigned to a different parish after their first term ends, and this happened to both Father Mike Byron and me in 2018. Father Mike was sent to Pax Christi Parish in Eden Prairie after serving as pastor of St. Pascal Baylon from 2012-18. I was sent here to this parish after serving as the pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish in Columbia Heights from 2012-18. I believe the Archbishop prefers to allow pastors, if possible, to stay a second term of six years in a parish if that is agreeable to both the parish and the priest. Sometimes a priest is assigned to another parish because his gifts, experience and talents are needed there. Sometimes the priest and parish would both be better served by a pastor change, and the pastor is assigned to another parish. At their ordination, priests give a promise of obedience to their bishop and his successors, so priests need to be open to the wishes of the bishop when it comes to an assignment. I encourage you not to worry. Let us place our lives in the hands of the Lord because "we know that for those who love God, all things work together for good" (Romans 8:28).

Retired Religious Fund Collection. Across the United States, hundreds of religious communities lack financial resources sufficient to meet the retirement and health care needs of aging members. Many elder religious worked for years for small stipends which resulted in a large gap in retirement savings. At the same time, fewer religious are able to serve in compensated ministry. Like many Americans, religious communities face the monumental challenge of funding eldercare. I invite you to offer a gift to the retired religious through one of these methods, and I thank you:

Take a flyer, purchase your gift(s), and then place the UNWRAPPED gift(s) in the bin located in the Gathering Space by *Monday*, *December 25*.

**Angel Tree**, a program of Prison Fellowship, provides Christmas gifts to children on behalf of an incarcerated parent. This year St. Pascal's will provide gifts to 18 children. Angel Tree tags listing suggested gift items will be placed on the Giving Tree in the Gathering Space.

Take a tag, purchase the noted gift, wrap it, and then place it in the Angel Tree box in the Gathering Space. Angel Tree gifts are to be WRAPPED and returned to the parish by *Sunday, December 17* with the tag attached to ensure the gifts get to the children by Christmas.



# Open Our Hearts

# Sunday, December 10, 2023 Prepare a Home for the Lord

Today's readings: Isaiah 40:1–5, 9–11; Psalm 85: 9–10, 11–12, 13–14; 2 Peter 3:8–14; Mark 1:1–8. The Lord is always coming toward us, seeking a home in our lives. Advent mindfully prepares our hearts as a permanent dwelling place for the Lord. The letter of St. Peter urges us to "conduct ourselves with holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the day of God" (2 Peter 3:11–12). Time is precious during this year's short Advent as it competes with the secular frenzy of the season. Stay attuned to the spirit of Advent as you prepare for the coming of our Lord.

Adorn your surroundings with reminders to keep your focus on spiritual preparation. Religious imagery forms us in powerful ways. The practice of setting up a nativity scene

at home begins in Advent and continues through the celebration of the Epiphany. St. Francis of Assisi began this custom in 1223 when he celebrated Christmas with his brothers at Greccio with a staging of the stable in Bethlehem that included live animals. This tradition quickly spread, and people began to construct nativity scenes in their homes, churches, and public spaces. You might set up your entire scene all at once, leaving the crib empty for the Christ child to arrive on Christmas Eve. Or set up the scene slowly, placing the figures far from the scene and moving them closer day by day with the Magi arriving on Epiphany with gifts for the child Jesus.



# THIS WEEK AT HOME

# Monday, December 11 Christ Will Come Again

Today's readings paint a hope-filled picture of the way Christ comes to us at the end of time, often referred to as the *parousia*. At this time, illness, disability, drought, hunger, sin, conflict, and every source of discord will be wiped away and the full glory of the Lord will be revealed. Prayerfully, reflect on today's readings, resplendent with the promise that our God comes to save us. *Today's readings: Isaiah 35:1–10; Psalm 85: 9–10, 11–12, 13–14; Luke 5:17–26.* 

# Tuesday, December 12 Our Lady of Guadalupe

Today we continue to celebrate Mary's radiant appearance to Juan Diego on Tepeyac Hill, Mexico, in 1531. Mary, whose features were those of a Mesoamerican Indian, offered hope to the oppressed native peoples, who in turn, named her Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe. The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe is widely celebrated around the world. Venerate our patron saint of the Americas in a special way today: place her image near the Advent wreath, prepare a special meal, pray the Rosary, recall the miraculous story of her apparition and all that followed. *Today's readings: Isaiah 11:1–10; Psalm 72:1–2, 7–8, 12–13, 17; Luke 10:21–24. Zechariah 2:14–17 or Revelation 11:19a; 12:1–6a, 10ab; Judith 13:18bcde, 19; Luke 1:26–38 or Luke 1:39–47.* 

# Wednesday, December 13 St. Lucy

The Church remembers St. Lucy, a fourth-century martyr whose name means "light," as the patron saint for those with eye disease. Many cultures celebrate St. Lucy with festive customs. In Sweden, this day is called *Luciadagen*. The eldest daughter of the family dresses up as St. Lucy and greets the family with special breads. Legends tell of St. Lucy's handing out bread in the time of famine. Make or purchase two loaves of braided bread and adorn them with

candles. Enjoy one and surprise a neighbor with the other. *Today's readings: Isaiah 40:25–31; Psalm 103:1–2, 3–4, 8, 10; Matthew 11:28–30.* 

# Thursday, December 14 St. John of the Cross

Today the Church commemorates this saint from sixteenth-century Spain: St. John of the Cross, whose spiritual writings continue to offer inspiration. Severe persecution and suffering in prison unlocked his poetic gifts. His memorial is placed in Advent because his writings so often highlight Christ as light penetrating the darkness. Light a candle to remember John of the Cross as a reminder that Christ, our light, illuminates our hearts especially in times of suffering. *Today's readings: Isaiah 41:13–20; Psalm 145:1, 9, 10–11, 12–13ab; Matthew 11:11–15.* 

# Friday, December 15 Follow the Lord

The response of today's responsorial psalm proclaims, "Those who follow the Lord will have the light of life." Catholics often celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation each Advent as an essential element of their spiritual preparation for the celebration of Christmas. We need help to resist the temptation to sin and to grow in holiness. Do not delay. Seek reconciliation this Advent and make room in your heart to welcome Jesus. *Today's readings: Isaiah 48:17–19; Psalm 1:1–2, 3, 4, 6; Matthew 11:16–19.* 

# Saturday, December 16 Las Posadas

Las Posadas (from Spanish meaning "the inns") is a widely observed Advent tradition celebrating Christian hospitality beginning December 16 and continuing for nine days until December 24. The posadas symbolize Mary and Joseph's difficult search for a place to stay. There are many creative ways to observe Las Posadas. Through the celebration we are reminded that by welcoming the poor and needy, we also welcome Jesus. Today's readings: Sirach 48:1–4, 9–11; Psalm 80: 2ac, 3b, 15–16,18–19; Matthew 17:9a, 10–13.
