

FEBRUARY 18, 2024 | FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

Turning to God in prayer. On the website for the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis (archspm.org), I found a good article on prayer entitled, "What does it mean to repent, and why is Lent such a powerful time to do so?" written by Fr. Michael Van Sloun. In the article, he describes Lent as an ideal time for us to draw closer to God. When John the Baptist conducted his preaching ministry in the desert he cried out, "Repent!" (Mt 3:1), and when Jesus began to preach in Galilee he said exactly the same thing, "Repent!" (Mk 1:15). On Ash Wednesday, when ashes are placed on our forehead, we hear the words, "Turn away from sin (i.e., repent) and believe in the gospel" (Mk 1:15). To repent is to turn away from sin and self-centeredness and to turn to God, and prayer is one of the best ways to turn to God.

If your prayer life has fallen on hard times or you are looking for a renewal in your prayer life, Lent is a wonderful occasion to start or restart a warm, communicative relationship with God. Prayer comes in two major forms: communal and private.

Communal prayer is needed for a well-balanced prayer life. We Catholics regard the Mass as our highest form of communal prayer, so I invite you to fully, consciously and actively participate in Mass each weekend. "The participation of each person in the Liturgy is important. Each person needs to do his or her part. Those who come together for Liturgy do not have the luxury of acting as spectators, waiting for all to be done for them. Full, conscious, and active participation in the Liturgy (as commended by the Second Vatican Council) is not only their right but also their duty and their responsibility. That responsibility includes full engagement throughout the liturgical celebration. The baptized faithful who form the congregation are called to join in praise and thanksgiving in song and spoken word, to listen attentively to God's Word, and to exercise their baptismal priesthood in prayer for the Church, the world, and all in need during the Prayer of the Faithful. In the Liturgy of the Eucharist the baptized faithful join their prayer to that of the priest celebrant, offering Christ the Victim, not only by means of the hands of the Priest but also together with him, and offer themselves as well (GIRM, no. 95). Their participation culminates in the reception of the Body and Blood of the Lord, the sacrament that unites them more fully with Christ their Head and with one another." (Liturgical Participation, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops newsletter, 2010). In addition to the Mass, other options for communal prayer include the Stations of the Cross on Fridays at 7:00 p.m. in church and morning prayer in our chapel on Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Communal prayer also happens at the dinner table, in the living room, offering prayers with one or more people through a morning offering or reading together the upcoming Sunday Gospel passage.

Private prayer is the other half of a well-balanced prayer life. Options include, but are not limited to, silent meditation, Scripture reading and reflection, the Liturgy of the Hours, the rosary, lectio divina, centering praying, spiritual reading including biographies of the saints, prayer writing in one's journal, singing sacred music, playing sacred music on a piano or other instrument, a prayer walk outside, studying a theological topic, or viewing or creating religious artworks. Regular communication is key to every quality relationship. If we hope to be close to God, regular prayer is indispensable. I hope you have a blessed Lent. You are in my prayers.

We Care Campaign: March 2 & 3

St. Pascal's parish will gather the loose change and bills from the weekend collection and donate them to the Social Justice and Caring Committee's We Care Campaign. The three options chosen by the committee for its winter project are:

Option 1: Joseph's Coat

An inner-city free store providing clothes and household items for the poor. This storefront community recognizes the need to supply physical necessities and the importance to increase people's self-worth. Joseph's Coat offers support and encouragement for persons in the midst of conflict, crisis and transition.

Option 2: Merrick Community Services Food Distribution Fund

A non-profit agency in Ramsey County that assists individuals and families become self-sufficient. St. Pascal's partners with this agency to run a monthly food distribution ministry at the parish. Money donated to this option will be used to supplement the supplies donated to the parish by Merrick Community Services to ensure that more people can be served by this ministry.

Option 3: 30-Days Foundation

A Twin-Cities based non-profit organization that provides financial grants (made payable only to the service provider requiring payment) for Minnesota residents. Through this program, residents can get assistance paying for such things as car repairs, rent, medical bills, utility bills etc.

We encourage you to consider making a personal contribution as well, using the envelope provided in the packet of envelopes sent by the parish every other month or found on the tables located near the entrances to the church.

If you prefer to give to one or more of these charities, please indicate this by writing your desired option(s) on the envelope provided in the packet of envelopes sent by the parish or marking the appropriate option(s) on the envelope located on the tables near the entrances to the church and your contributions will be distributed as requested. Any unmarked contributions will be divided equally among the three options. Thank you for your generosity.

Sunday, February 18, 2024 Abundant Mercy

Today's readings: Genesis 9:8–15; Psalm 25:4–5, 6–7, 8–9; 1 Peter 3:18–22; Mark 1:12–15. "See, I am now establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you and with every little creature." With these words, God shows his love as he promises anew to be in relationship with creation. In the reading from the First Letter of Peter, we hear that God saved the eight who were aboard the ark through the waters of the flood and now saves us through the waters of baptism. God, whose love brought us into being, seeks relationship and communion with us. To reconcile us with him, he sent his Son, who prepared for his mission by fasting for forty days in the desert.

During the forty days of Lent, many of us give in to temptation and find ourselves repenting time and again. Knowing that God is merciful and understands our shortcomings, we can always resolve to begin anew. God yearns for relationship with us and does not give up on us.

As one of your Lenten practices, you may have chosen to read the day's Scriptures attentively. Try to approach the readings with fresh eyes willing to allow the text to relate to your life today. Familiar texts can speak to us in the new circumstances, challenges, joys, and sorrows of our lives. All we need is an openness to the Word. God's Word is always relevant.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, February 19 The Neighbor

In Matthew 22:36–39, Jesus tells the scholar about the two greatest commandments: loving God and loving neighbor. Today's passage from Matthew depicts how our actions show love for both God and neighbor. Inviting the sheep on his right to the kingdom, the Son of Man recounts that their feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and welcoming the stranger also fed, clothed, and welcomed Christ. When a reminder is needed on how God expects us to treat our neighbor, return to this passage. *Today's readings: Leviticus 19:1–2, 11–18; Psalm 19:8–10, 15; Matthew 25:31–46.*

Tuesday, February 20Patiently Waiting

Both the psalm and Gospel show us how to pray. Portraying the need for trust, the psalmist sings, "I sought the LORD and he answered me, / delivered me from all my fears." In the Gospel, Jesus tells his followers that they need to come to God with humility as they pray that his will be done. Instead of expecting instant gratification from prayer requests, keep in mind that God acts in his time, not ours. Be patient and trust; God will not leave you alone. *Today's readings: Isaiah* 55:10–11; *Psalm* 34:4–7, 16–19; *Matthew* 6:7–15.

Wednesday, February 21 Grateful Hearts

Jesus comments in today's Gospel on the generation's desire for a sign. How many times have you prayed and asked for a sign? Many of us want proof that God will come through for us. Remember that God knows what is best for each of us. During this Lent, seek to discern and appreciate what you have been given and thank God for what he has provided. *Today's readings: Jonah 3:1–10; Psalm 51:3–4, 12–13, 18–19; Luke 11:29–32.*

Thursday, February 22 The Chair of St. Peter the Apostle

Upon Peter's assertion that Jesus is the Messiah, we hear Jesus tell Peter that he is the rock upon which the Church shall be built. As Christ's followers, we too must voice that Jesus is our Savior. Our faith can be the foundation upon which others' faith can grow. Pope Francis implores us to go out in mission so that through encounters with others, the Church will grow. Our faith is not a secret but a wonderful gift. This Lent, how will you contribute to strengthening the foundation of the Church? *Today's readings: 1 Peter 5:1–4; Psalm 23:1–3a, 4–6; Matthew 16:13–19.*

Friday, February 23 Continuing the Mission

On the optional Memorial of St. Polycarp, Bishop and Martyr, the Church recalls a second-generation Christian who was a disciple of the apostle John. Before St. Polycarp was burned at the stake, he put his trust in God. He was unafraid of what would happen to him. Pray to be able to trust that God is with you, no matter the trial you face. *Today's readings: Ezekiel 18:21–28; Psalm 130:1–2, 3–4, 5–7a, 7bc–8; Matthew 5:20–26.*

Saturday, February 24 Learning to Love

"If you love those who love you, what recompense will you have?" we hear in today's Gospel. To love without conditions can be difficult. Yet this is what Jesus asks from us. When we have been wronged, it is tempting to seek revenge. Yet, Jesus shows us a higher path. Instead of revenge, Jesus loves everyone and instructs us to forgive. What would it mean for you to love your enemy and to forgive someone who has hurt you? *Today's readings: Deuteronomy 26:16–19; Psalm 119:1–2, 4–5, 7–8; Matthew 5:43–48*.
