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

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

God so loved the world, but does God love me?

In our Gospel reading this weekend from John, chapter 3, we hear an often quoted saying of Jesus, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (John 3:16). Some people call John 3:15 "the Gospel in a nutshell" because it succinctly summarizes in Jesus' own words the reason God sent him into the world. That is, God loves us and wants to save us.

As I reflected on John 3:16, I asked myself, "How many people believe that God loved the world but question whether God loves them personally?" In my ministry as a priest, I meet and talk with people from various walks of life who experience the joys, sorrows, successes, losses, achievements and struggles that are part of life in this world. Sometimes I hear people question whether God loves them personally and individually. Personal suffering, grief and pain can lead to deep questions about God and wondering if God loves us now or could we have done something to cause God to stop loving us. To these deep questions, I offer these personal insights:

God is love. In 1 John 4:16, we read these words: "God is love". In those three words, we have a definition of who God is and what God does. God is love, and God loves.

God's love is everlasting. In Isaiah 49:15, we read, "I will never forget you. See, upon the palms of my hands I have engraved you."

We might feel small, but God knows us intimately. One of my favorite psalms is Psalm 139 which begins with these words: "Lord, you have search me, and you know me: you know when I sit and stand; you understand my thoughts from afar. You sift through my travels and rest; with all my ways you are familiar. Even before a word is on my tongue, Lord, you know it all. Behind and before you encircle me and rest your hand upon me."

God's love is shown to us through other people. We may struggle to feel God's direct love because God can be mysterious, and God's ways and actions can be difficult to see. At the same time, God loves us personally and individually through the people who love us and show us kindness: family, friends, spouse, children, grandchildren, grandparents, and more. In those times we feel unloved by God or that God is not listening to our prayers, look at the people in your life who are showing love to you, the people who are listening to you and helping you, the people who express concern and kindness to you. In each of those people, God's love is being shown to you through them.

Monthly Prayer Intention of Pope Francis for March 2024: For the new martyrs. We pray that those who risk their lives for the Gospel in various parts of the world inflame the Church with their courage and missionary enthusiasm.

Light of the World

Sunday, March 10, 2024 Light of Hope in the Darkness

Today's readings: 2 Chronicles 36:14–16, 19–23; Psalm 137:1–2, 3, 4–5, 6; Ephesians 2:4–10; John 3:14–21. Hope and joy are recurring themes in the readings and prayers on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Midway through Lent, just as we begin to weary in our resolve, the readings remind us of God's love and the eternal life that awaits, and the prayers relate the Christian response of joy. The entrance antiphon begins, "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her," recalling for us that Lent is also a season for joy.

The liturgical color varies from the season's violet to rose today to visually encourage us. This day points to the reconciliation that is ours because of Christ's death and resurrection. And we have merited none of this. Only by the mercy of God do we live in Christ. As the reading from Ephesians states, "It is the gift of God; it is not from works so no one may boast."

Some accept the gift of faith, but as the Gospel states, "The light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light." At baptism, we received the light of Christ and, with that light, join Christ in dispelling darkness. This week, be aware that you carry the light of Christ within you and can bring others to it.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, March 11 Blind Faith

John tells the story of a man pleading for Jesus to cure his dying child. The miracle of the cure convinced this man and the others present that Jesus was the Messiah. But what about those of us who have never witnessed such a miracle? Take some time to journal about your faith in Jesus. On what do you base your belief? How much do you trust in the Lord? *Today's readings: Isaiah 65:17–21 Psalm 30:2, 4, 5–6, 11–12a, 13b; John 4:43–54.*

Tuesday, March 12Journeying Together

Asking for or accepting help shows courage because it implies that we are not self-sufficient. Recognizing our dependence on God and one another is a virtue. Being in relationship with others requires listening. Today, await the answer when asking someone how he or she is doing. Then really listen. Similarly, make sure that you leave space and time in your prayer for God's voice to bubble up inside of you. *Today's readings: Ezekiel 47:1–9, 12: Psalm 46:2–3, 5–6, 8–9; John 5:1–16.*

Wednesday, March 13 Blind Faith

While the Lord is a just judge, people are not always so fair or righteous. Are you your worst critic? The idea of self-compassion might seem hedonistic or selfish, yet it can be hard to give what we do not possess. If we desire to extend God's kindness to others, we need to express compassion toward ourselves. Examine how well you practice patience and mercy toward others. To improve, begin with yourself. *Today's readings: Isaiah 49:8–15; Psalm 145:8–9, 13cd–14, 17–18; John 5:17–30.*

Thursday, March 14 Taking a Pause

During every Mass, we encounter Christ in the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. He is present especially in the consecrated bread and wine, in the Scriptures, in the ministers, and in the assembly. God does not want us to continue wandering in the desert; he beckons us to the promised land of eternal life. This week, meditate on a part of the Mass. Practice being truly present during Mass to allow space for conversion and transformation. *Today's readings: Exodus 32:7–14; Psalm 106:19–20, 21–22, 23; John 5:31–47.*

Friday, March 15 Genuine Encounter

What does it mean to truly know someone? Have you followed a famous figure or professional contact and felt that you knew everything about him or her without having even met the person? Or perhaps you met the individual and encountered someone different than you had imagined. In today's Gospel, the inhabitants of Jerusalem think that they know Jesus, but their knowledge is on a surface level. They do not know the One who sent him. When you read the Scriptures, invite the words to fill your heart so that you can know the Lord. *Today's readings: Wisdom 2:1a, 12–22; Psalm 34:17–18, 19–20, 21, 23: John 7:1–2, 10, 25–30.*

Saturday, March 16 The Body of Christ

Many things can distract us as we seek to become closer to God and spread the Good News. How can you stay rooted in a life of discipleship? What are some of the things you can do in your community to continue the ministry of Jesus? Can you read to children at the library? Or volunteer in a soup kitchen? Does your community have a cleanup day for which you could sign up? Strive to be walking testimonies of Jesus' love. *Today's readings: Jeremiah 11:18–20; Psalm 7:2–3*, 9bc–10, 11–12; John 7:40–53.
