Funerals at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church

Policies for Funerals:

- Funerals may be celebrated Mondays through Fridays. We do not schedule funerals on weekends or on other special liturgical days in the Church calendar (Holy Days of Obligation). Funerals are celebrated during normal office hours and in consideration of the availability of clergy.
- Funeral Masses may be celebrated by a priest for any baptized Catholic and member of St. John the Baptist Catholic Church. A funeral service outside of Mass is celebrated by either a deacon or priest from the parish. The stipend for the priest or deacon celebrant is \$200.
- A visiting member of the Catholic clergy would be welcome to participate in funerals at the parish provided that he is in good standing with his own diocese/religious community. Any visiting member of the Catholic clergy who wishes to participate should contact the pastor directly. In addition, clergy from outside of the Diocese of Lansing should contact their bishop or superior who will communicate to the Bishop of Lansing their suitability for participation in the funeral.
- During a funeral Mass, all practicing Catholics are invited to receive Holy Communion. Normally, the Precious Blood is not distributed to the congregation. All non-practicing Catholics and guests of other faith traditions are welcome at mass but are extended a special blessing during the distribution of Holy Communion rather than reception of the Body of Christ.
- Funeral celebrations for a non-Catholic adult are not normally celebrated at the parish but rather a funeral home. Parish clergy may be contacted to inquire as to their availability to help with such a celebration.
- The parish clergy and staff do not act as replacements for a funeral director. All arrangements for a funeral at St. John the Baptist should begin by contacting a local funeral home that has the ability to assist in properly planning a funeral. Those inquiring about funeral planning at the parish will be referred to a funeral home. A funeral director would normally be responsible for contacting the parish to arrange for any assistance with a funeral service by a member of the clergy or staff.
- Music for funeral celebrations must be sacred in nature. Secular music is best reserved for private celebrations or remembrances. Any questions or concerns about music selections should be directed to the parish Music Director at music@ypsicatholic.org. A list of recommend hymns is provided in this policy manual.
- Musicians apart from those provided by the parish should be arranged with the parish Music Director well in advance of the funeral celebration.
- Due to scheduling and facility limitations, vigils cannot be celebrated at the parish and should be arranged to take place at a funeral home.
- Readers for a Mass are selected by the family. Remembrance Mass Cards are also supplied by the family.
- Family and friends of the deceased are encouraged to share personal stories or remarks at the vigil service or during the visitation time. Given the emotional nature of funeral services and the difficulty that many have speaking at such an occasion, we do not allow for a Eulogy during or after a funeral as they often distract from the solemn celebration of the liturgy and the sacred remembrance of the deceased.
- All stipends and fees for any part of the funeral celebration will be managed/arranged with the funeral director and not a member of the parish staff. It is the responsibility of a funeral director to arrange for the payment of stipends and fees and to see to their proper distribution on the day of the funeral. All stipends and fees must be paid for ahead of the funeral.

Music for Funeral Liturgies at St. John the Baptist

- The music team of St. John the Baptist offers our sincere condolences to you and your loved ones. We are committed to providing all funeral liturgies with reverent, beautifully delivered music.
- A typical funeral liturgy has one music minister, leading the songs from voice and guitar or piano. The stipend for this music minister is \$200. If you wish to have a fuller ensemble (with string players, additional vocals, etc.), please notify the parish office as soon as possible, to allow the music director ample time to schedule these players. An additional stipend of \$100 per added musician will apply.
- At funeral liturgies, some families ask that a musical friend or family member be included on the music team. Such requests must be approved by and coordinated with the music director.
- Please select your music from the songs provided in the following page. Please make four selections and include one alternate selection. This list includes our most requested hymns and songs for funerals
- Once you have made your selections, please enter them into the **Liturgy Plan form** on the last page.

Please contact the parish office with the Liturgy Plan and selections as soon as this is available. The readings will be printed off and available on the ambo for the readers ahead of the service.

Funeral Luncheons

- Funeral luncheons are not provided by the parish.
- <u>Use of the Annex space to bring in a catered lunch is available for those who have been registered and active members of the parish.</u> There is a minimal cleaning charge of \$100. Please contact the parish office to find out more and the availability for a luncheon. Should a luncheon be available, please note that the fee for the space is collected, along with stipends, by the funeral director ahead of time.
- The parish requires a minimum of 48 hours to prepare the space for funeral luncheons.
- Due to scheduling and facility limitations, luncheons are restricted to funeral celebrations occurring during business hours on Monday through Friday of a normal week. Weekends and holidays do not allow for a funeral luncheon to be planned, even if the funeral celebration were to occur on such a day.
- Due to health codes and policies, use of the parish kitchen is prohibited.
