My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Please accept, on behalf of our whole parish family, and for myself, our most sincere condolences as you experience this time of loss. Know that the prayers of our entire community are with you as you grieve for your loved one who has passed from this life. At the same time, be sure that God is near to you at this difficult period and will sustain you with his grace and mercy.

In the Church's Rite for a *Vigil for the Deceased* we are reminded that "*we believe that all the ties of friendship and affection which knit us as one throughout our lives do not unravel with death.*" As you pass through this necessary period of mourning, be comforted by the hope that we have as Christians that our friends and family who have gone before us are not lost to us inasmuch as all of us have faith in the Lord Jesus. Let us take this opportunity to renew our faith in him. This is a faith that will sustain you in your grief and console you as you pray for the repose of the soul of your loved one.

This brief manual is intended to assist you as you prepare for the liturgy in which we will pray together for your loved one and it is my hope that you will find comfort in the Church's beautiful and powerful prayers. Again, be sure of our prayers and sympathy for you in this time of grief.

May God grant eternal rest to your loved one and to all of our dearly departed brothers and sisters.

Policies for Funerals:

- Funerals may be celebrated on any day of the week except for Sundays and other special liturgical days in the Church calendar (Holy Days of Obligation) and are normally celebrated during business hours.
- Funeral Masses may be celebrated by a priest for any baptized Catholic. A funeral service outside of Mass is celebrated by either a deacon or priest from the parish. The stipend for the priest or deacon celebrant is \$200.
- A visiting member of the Catholic clergy would be welcome to participate in funerals at the parish provided that he is in good standing with his own diocese/religious community. Any visiting member of the Catholic clergy who wishes to participate should contact the pastor directly. In addition, clergy from outside of the Diocese of Lansing should contact their bishop or superior who will communicate to the Bishop of Lansing their suitability for participation in the funeral.
- During a funeral mass, all practicing Catholics are invited to receive Holy Communion. Normally, the Precious Blood is not distributed to the congregation. All non-practicing Catholics and guests of other faith traditions are welcome at mass but are extended a special blessing during the distribution of Holy Communion rather than reception of the Body of Christ.
- Funeral celebrations for a non-Catholic adult are not normally celebrated at the parish but rather a funeral home. Parish clergy may be contacted to inquire as to their availability to help with such a celebration.
- The parish clergy and staff do not act as replacements for a funeral director. All arrangements for a funeral at St. John the Baptist should begin by contacting a local funeral home that has the ability to assist in properly planning a funeral. Those inquiring about funeral planning at the parish will be referred to a funeral home. A funeral director would normally be responsible for contacting the parish to arrange for any assistance with a funeral service by a member of the clergy or staff. ***If the services of a funeral home are not utilized, you are required to use the services of St. John's funeral coordinator.***
- Music for funeral celebrations must be sacred in nature. Secular music is best reserved for private celebrations or remembrances. Any questions or concerns about music selections should be directed to the parish Music Director. A list of recommend hymns is provided in this policy manual.
- Musicians apart from those provided by the parish should be arranged with the parish Music Director well in advance of the funeral celebration.
- Vigil services are normally arranged by the funeral director. They may contact parish clergy to participate in vigils as availability permits. Due to scheduling and facility limitations, vigils cannot be celebrated at the parish and should be arranged to take place at a funeral home.

- Readers for mass may be selected by the family or provided by the parish at the request of the family.
- Family and friends of the deceased are encouraged to share personal stories or remarks at the vigil service. One brief address may be delivered at the end of mass at the request of the family. However, given the emotional nature of funeral services and the difficulty that many have speaking at such an occasion, these remarks should be kept very brief and be written out ahead of time. Extemporaneous remarks or multiple speakers are discouraged as they often distract from the solemn celebration of the liturgy and the sacred remembrance of the deceased.
- All stipends and fees for any part of the funeral celebration, apart from a funeral luncheon, should be managed with the funeral director and not a member of the parish staff. It is normally the responsibility of a funeral director to arrange for the payment of stipends and fees and to see to their proper distribution.

Music for Funeral Liturgies at St. John the Baptist

- The music team of St. John the Baptist offers our sincere condolences to you and your loved ones. We are committed to providing all funeral liturgies with reverent, beautifully delivered music.
- A typical funeral liturgy has one music minister, leading the songs from voice and guitar or piano. The stipend for this music minister is \$150. If you wish to have a fuller ensemble (with string players, additional vocals, etc.), please notify the parish secretary as soon as possible, to allow the music director ample time to schedule these players. An additional stipend of \$100 per added musician will apply.
- At funeral liturgies, some families ask that a musical friend or family member be included on the music team. Such requests must be approved by and coordinated with the music director.
- Please select your music from the songs below. Please make four selections and include one alternate selection. This list includes our most popularly requested hymns and songs for funerals. If there is a hymn you are attached to that is not on this list, please contact the funeral coordinator as soon as possible. All special requests must be received at least 48 hours in advance of the liturgy, and must be cleared by the music director as liturgically appropriate, and learnable within the given time window.
- Once you have made your selections, please enter them into the **Liturgy Plan form** on page 7.

Funeral Luncheons:

- Funeral luncheons may be available for those who have been registered and active members of the parish.
- As volunteer members of the parish community provide funeral luncheons, availability rests completely upon their ability to provide for the meal and cannot be guaranteed in every instance.
- The volunteer committee asks for no less than 48 hours to prepare and gather the resources for funeral luncheons.
- There is a small cost associated with funeral luncheons and the parish staff can help arrange for its payment.
- Due to scheduling and facility limitations, luncheons are restricted to funeral celebrations occurring during business hours on Monday through Friday of a normal week. Weekends and holidays do not allow for a funeral luncheon to be planned, even if the funeral celebration were to occur on such a day.
- Due to health codes and policies, outside food and beverages are not permitted for funeral celebrations at the parish.
- If a funeral luncheon cannot be arranged, parish staff can direct those planning a funeral celebration to contact a local restaurant, or similar venue, to arrange for a meal to be provided at that location.
