JANUARY 8, 2023 THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD



Dear friends,

Today's Feast of the Epiphany reminds us that Jesus came to transform our human existence to make it possible for us to become His presence in our world. The Gospel of John tells us that "the word became flesh and dwelt among us." The greatest gift we are given is the invitation to be Christ in our world. Christ dwells in each of us and He invites us to allow the Christ within us to be life to those in our world.

This week is Vocation Awareness Week, a time when we are invited to think and pray for people to respond to God's invitation to serve others. There is a great connection between the Feast of the Epiphany and praying for vocations. Responding to the call to serve in the church is really all about letting the Christ within us bring life to the all people.

The fundamental vocation of each of us is to do what God asks of us. We use language like "doing God's will" to speak about this. Instead of asking "what will make me happy?" or "what would I like to do?", the real question for each of us is "What is God asking of me?" That's not an easy question to ask in our contemporary world which tends to see the fulfillment of each persons desires as the highest good that we should all strive for. When we are willing to put our needs aside and embrace what God is asking of us, we will find the fulfillment and peace we are seeking in life. Let's pray for each that we will have the courage to respond to God's call in our life.

We are familiar with the rhythms of life around us: winter gives way to spring which gives way to summer and then moves into fall before it become winter once again. There are rhythms to our life as a parish. The beginning of school in August, working in our booths at the Fall Festival, conducting our CPC campaign in the fall, selling lottery tickets, then making preparations for our fish fries, then beginning the lawn mowing season. All hands on board as we fix our famous chicken dinner in July. In between, we are baking kuchens, making burgoo and homemade sausage. There is a rhythm to our church year as well. On the Feast of the Epiphany, there is an ancient custom in the Church of announcing the dates for special feasts that are celebrated in the coming year. This year we begin the season of Ordinary time with the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time January 15th. The Season of Lent begins



with Ash Wednesday on February 22nd. The Feast of St. Joseph, our parish Feast-day, is normally on March 19th but since that day is a Sunday, the actual day for the Feastday is March 20th.

On March 21st, Bishop Siegel will be with us to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation. The Feast of the Annunciation is on Saturday, March 25th. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on April 2nd. Holy Thursday is on April 6th, Good Friday on April 7th, Holy Saturday on April 8th and Easter Sunday on April 9th.

We will celebrate First Communion on Sunday, April 30th. The Ascension of the Lord will be celebrated on May 21st.

The Feast of Pentecost will be on May 28th.

On August 15th we will celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of Mary. The Feast of All Saints will be on Wednesday, November 1. The Feast of All Souls will be on Thursday, November 2. The Season of Ordinary time comes to an end with the Feast of Christ the King on November 26. The new Liturgical years begins with the First Sunday of Advent on December 3rd.

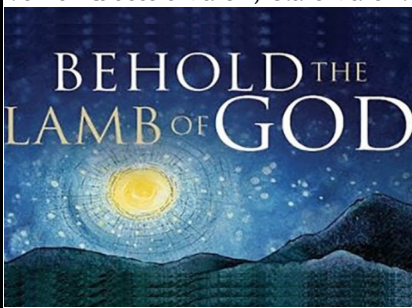

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled *Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common*



Home and seeing the real presence of God in all things.

A feeling of intimate union with other beings of nature cannot be authentic, if at the same time there is no tenderness, compassion and concern for human beings in the heart. The inconsistency of those who fight against the trafficking of animals at risk of extinction is evident, but they remain completely indifferent to the trafficking of people, they do not care about the poor, or are determined to destroy another human being who does not like them. This jeopardizes the sense of the struggle for the environment.

It is no coincidence that, in the canticle in which he praises God for creatures, St. Francis adds: "Praised yes, my Lord, for those whom they forgive for your love". Everything is connected. This requires a concern for the environment combined with sincere love for human beings and a constant commitment to the problems of society.

On the other hand, when the heart is truly open to universal communion, nothing and no one is excluded from this fraternity. Consequently, it is also true that indifference or cruelty towards other creatures of this world always ends up moving in some way to the treatment we reserve for other human beings. The heart is one and the same misery that leads to mistreating an animal does not take long to manifest itself in the relationship with other people.



Any mistreatment of any creature is contrary to human dignity. We cannot consider ourselves people who truly love if we exclude part of reality from our interests: Peace, justice and the safeguarding of creation are three completely connected issues, which cannot be separated in order to be treated

individually, on pain of falling back into the reductionism. Everything is related, and all of us human beings are united as brothers and sisters in a wonderful pilgrimage, linked by the love that God has for each of his creatures and which also unites us, with tender affection, to our brother sun, sister moon, brother river and mother earth.

Today, believers and non-believers alike agree that the earth is essentially a common heritage, the fruits of which must benefit all. For believers this becomes a matter of fidelity to the Creator, because God created the world for everyone. Consequently, any ecological approach must integrate a social perspective that takes into account the fundamental rights of the most disadvantaged.

The principle of subordination of private property to the universal destination of goods and, therefore, the universal right to their use, is a "golden rule" of social behavior, and the first principle of the whole ethical-social order. The Christian tradition has never recognized the right to private property as absolute or untouchable, and has emphasized the social function of any form of private property.

St. John Paul II recalled this doctrine with great emphasis, saying that "God gave the earth to the whole human race, so that it sustains all its members, *without excluding or privileging anyone*". These are pregnant and strong words. He remarked that "a type of development that did not respect and promote human, personal and social, economic and political rights, including the rights of nations and peoples, would not be truly worthy of man."

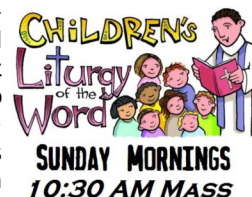
