Dear friends,


Thanksgiving is once again upon—a time to give thanks. There is rarely a week that goes by that I am not reminded of the ways so many of you have offered you help in support of all the ministries of our parish. I think about all the folks who bring food and served at our funeral dinners; to all the folks who helped make burgoo and sausage; to all those who helped



with our Fall festival Booths; to all our faithful lottery ticket sellers; to our catechists in the Sunday Morning Religious Education Program, the Children's Liturgy of the Word and RCIA; to all the men and women who offer their time as room mothers, playground supervisors, lunch time aides, coaches in our grade school, Mater Dei High School and our local public schools; to all those who bring communion to our homebound parishioners and those who are residents in nursing homes; to all those who serve in leadership positions on the parish council and in the Men's Club, Altar Society, PTO and Knights of St. John; to all those who offer their time to take care of maintenance items around the parish; to all those nameless people who reach out to a neighbor to offer them your help; to all those who work at the Food Pantry, the House of Bread and Peace, the Ozanam Family Shelter and various other not-for-profit agencies in our city. And the list could go on and on.

I am grateful as well for all the ways you have stepped up to provide the money needed to do all the work we do in our parish—our weekly collection, all of our outreach ministries, especially working with our brothers and sisters in Haiti, and doing our part to support the work of our diocese through our Catholic Ministries Appeal (only 1% to go to meet our goal!). And on top of all that you have responded so generously to our Rebuilding our Church Capital Campaign.

No doubt high on the list of things for which to be grateful would be the way so many folks have helped with all the work getting our church fixed up. This past week workers were able to blow in some insulation above the ceiling in the church. The pictures shows what that looks like. You can see some of the original roof rafters from 1888 as well as some of the new rafters tht we installed. And you can see the special walkway we installed so that we could get to the pully system that raises and lowers the chandelier.



The air conditioning vents were cleaned and we had a whole bunch of folks cleaning the inside of the church. Thanks to our friends at Fehrenbacher Cabinets, the altar and all of our sanctuary furniture got a make-over and a new coat of conversion varnish. They look brand new.

As I write this, they have begun to lay the carpet in the main body of the church as well as the sacristies and all the closets. We are still not sure when the special design carpet which will be installed in the center aisle and in the sanctuary will arrive. Because of that we will not be able

to install the pews in church.

The good news however, is that we can start having mass in our church this week. So, here's the plan. We want to move some chairs in church which we will use until the rest of the carpet comes in and is installed. Once that happens, we will be able to install the pews in church. We're hoping that this happens in the next few weeks, but that will depend upon when the carpet gets here.

We still have to install the west side entrance door which won't happen until early December. The door that is installed now is a temporary door. And we still have to fabricate and install the handrails along the handicapped ramp. Until all this work is complete, we'd like to limit this entrance to only those who really need to use it to get in and as an emergency exit. So, if you come to mass on Tuesday of this week, we will have mass with the students in our school and we will have mass in church. We will also have Thanksgiving day mass on Thursday in church. And then, beginning next weekend, we will start having mass in church.

For right now, we will continue to have our daily mass in our chapel in the rectory. One of the unexpected blessing of our church rebuilding effort has been discovering how nice and intimate it is to celebrate mass here. We will also have our weekly Eucharist Adoration here as well. So come and join us on Thursday (Thanksgiving Day) for mass at 8 am. We have much for which to be thankful.

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled *Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home*



Various convictions of our faith, developed at the beginning of this Encyclical, help to enrich the meaning of this conversion. Things such as the awareness that every creature reflects something of God and has a message to transmit to us, or the certainty that Christ has assumed in himself this material world and now, risen, dwells in the depths of every being, surrounding it with its affection and penetrating it with its light. As well as recognizing that God created the world by inscribing in it an order and a dynamism that the human being has no right to ignore.

When we read in the Gospel that Jesus speaks of birds and says that not one of them is forgotten before God, will we be able to mistreat them and harm them? I invite all Christians to make explicit this dimension of their own conversion, allowing the strength and light of the grace received to extend also to the relationship with other creatures and with the world around them, and arouse that sublime brotherhood with all of creation that heals them. Francis of Assisi lived so brightly.

IV. JOY AND PEACE

Christian spirituality proposes an alternative way of understanding the quality of life, and encourages a prophetic and contemplative lifestyle, capable of deeply rejoicing without being obsessed with consumption. It is important to accept an ancient teaching, present in various religious traditions, and also in the Bible. It is the belief that "less is more".

In fact, the constant accumulation of possibilities to consume distracts the heart and prevents you from appreciating everything and every moment. On the contrary, being present serenely in front of every reality, however small it may be, opens up many more possibilities for understanding and personal fulfillment.

Christian spirituality proposes a growth in sobriety and an ability to enjoy with little. It is a return to simplicity that allows us to stop and enjoy the little things, to be grateful for the possibilities that life offers without clinging to what we have or saddening ourselves for what we do not possess. This requires avoiding the dynamics of domination and the mere accumulation of pleasures.

Sobriety, lived with freedom and awareness, is liberating. It is not less life, it is not low intensity, but quite the opposite. In fact, those who taste the most and live every moment better are those who stop pecking here and there, always looking for what they do not have, and experience what it means to appreciate each person and everything, they learn to familiarize themselves with the simplest realities and they know how to enjoy it. In this way they are able to reduce unmet needs and decrease tiredness and anxiety. You may need little and live a lot, especially when you are able to give space to other pleasures and find satisfaction in fraternal encounters, in service, in putting your charisms to good use, in music and art, in contact with nature, in prayer.
