FEBRUARY 19, 2023 THE SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Dear friends,

Lent is upon us again and with it a fascinating list of rituals and traditions that have been passed on to us through the years. Lent was, and still is filled with days of fast and abstinence. Fasting has to do with partially or completely refraining from eating while abstinence has to do with refraining from eating certain foods. Traditionally Ash Wednesday and Good Friday were, and still are, days of fast (eating less than we normally do) and abstinence (in our case, not eating meat). Friday's during Lent were, and still are, days of abstinence. One of the great unintended consequences of this tradition is the introduction of a whole other tradition—"Lenten Fish Frys!"

Along with fasting, one of the other traditions of Lent was almsgiving. Almsgiving has traditionally been understood as sharing our resources, particularly our money, to help those in need. Now there are many ways and many places to share our resources with those in need. This Lent we are given two unique ways of doing this and both of them are responding to the needs of people who are especially hurting now. These opportunities come to us in the form of contributing to special collections. The first of these is a special collection to aid the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. This is an opportunity for us to show our solidarity especially with the people of Ukraine. The collection will help the Church in Ukraine bring the light of Christ to the faithful affected by the darkness of war, violence, and loss of families and homes and provide other essential funding in the region.

The second opportunity also comes to us by way of a special collection—the collection for Catholic Relief Services (CRS). Catholic Relief Services began in the early 1940's as a response by the Catholic Church in the United States to the refugee crisis that came about because of the devastation of World War II. Since that time, CRS has responded to people affected by floods, earthquakes, famine and war throughout the world. Today they are responding to dire situations in Yemen, Ethiopia, South Sudan, Haiti. And they are now helping provide aid to the people of Turkey and Syria where over 40,000 people have died as a result of the devastating earthquakes that have occurred in that region.

The work of Catholic Relief Services happens because Catholics from throughout the United States contribute to the annual CRS collection which is traditionally held on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. This year that day is March 19th. If you are wondering what you can do in the face of so much destruction we see in the world, making a contribution to the Catholic Relief Services Collection is a very practical way of doing something good.

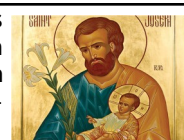

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled *Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home* and seeing the real presence of God in all things.



For this reason the human being and things have ceased to shake hands amicably, becoming instead contenders. From here we easily move on to the idea of infinite or unlimited growth, which has so excited economists, finance and technology theorists. This supposes the lie about the infinite availability of the planet's goods, which leads to "squeezing" it to the limit and beyond the limit. This is the false assumption that there is an unlimited amount of energy and usable means, that their immediate regeneration is possible and that the negative effects of the manipulations of nature can be easily absorbed. which has thrilled economists, finance and technology theorists so much.

This supposes the lie about the infinite availability of the planet's goods, which leads to "squeezing" it to the limit and beyond the limit. This is the false assumption that there is an unlimited amount of energy and usable means, that their immediate regeneration is possible and that the negative effects of the manipulations of nature can be easily absorbed. which has thrilled economists, finance and technology theorists so much.

The origin of many difficulties in today's world there is first of all the tendency, not always conscious, to set the methodology and objectives of technoscience according to a paradigm of understanding that conditions people's lives and the functioning of society. The effects of the application of this model to all reality, human and social, can be seen in the degradation of the environment. But this is



only a sign of the reductionism that affects human life and society in all their dimensions.

It must be recognized that the products of technology are not neutral, because they create a plot that ends up conditioning lifestyles and orienting social possibilities in the direction of the interests of certain power groups. Certain choices that seem purely instrumental,

One cannot think of supporting another cultural paradigm and using technology as a mere tool, because today the technocratic paradigm has become so dominant that it is very difficult to ignore its resources, and it is even more difficult to use its resources without being dominated by its logic.

It has become counter-cultural to choose a lifestyle with objectives that at least in part can be independent of technology, its costs and its globalizing and massifying power. In fact, the technique has a tendency to ensure that nothing remains outside its iron logic, and the man who is the protagonist knows that, in the final analysis, it is not a question of utility, nor of well-being, but of domination ; domination in the extreme sense of the word. For this reason he tries to grasp the elements of nature and at the same time those of human existence. This reduces the capacity for decision, the most authentic freedom and the space for the alternative creativity of individuals.

The technocratic paradigm also tends to exert its dominion over economics and politics. The economy assumes every technological development as a function of profit, without paying attention to any negative consequences for the human being. Finance suffocates the real and the lesson of environmental deterioration is being learned very slowly.

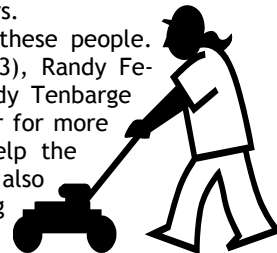
