

MARCH 19, 2023 THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Today is the feast of St. Joseph, our Patron Saint. Being a carpenter, he would feel right at home as we do all the repairs on our church. His example of courage in the face of challenges is a

good model for us as we deal with the challenges in our life.

Our friends from Helming Brothers in Jasper were here this week to do some repairs on the steeple. I took this picture and I felt dizzy just looking at high these men

were! I don't think I would do well working in high places. And they had the convenience of working on a lift. Imagine how hard it was for the folks who built the steeple in 1888.

As we proceed with the work on our church, I wanted especially to thank Matt Bishop and all the different crews that worked so hard to get a protective covering over the roof of the church. The fact that they could get this done in such a short time was just absolutely amaz-

ing.

We met with the insurance adjustors from Travelers insurance on Monday. They have been great to work with and are teaching me a lot of new things about insurance and the tools they use to help do an assessment of property damage. Using satellite images and computer

programs, they produced a 3-D image of church. The wonders of technology. Over the next month they will be doing an assessment of all the damage that was sustained to determine what it will cost to do all the repairs. We'll be working with them and our local contractors to determine just what the next steps will be. As we learn more, I'll be sharing it with you.

As I write this letter, all the folks have finished all the preparation work for our second fish fry. By the time you read, this, I am hopeful that lots of people have had the chance to enjoy another great fish dinner. I can't say enough about the great spirit of cooperation that has been present throughout our two fish frys. Another example of people stepping up to the plate to make things happen in our parish.

This coming Tuesday Bishop Siegel will be here to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation with twelve young men and women from our parish. This service will be held in our gym and will begin at 6 pm. All the members of our parish are welcome to join us for this mass.

While we pray for these young men and women, we also pray that they will find in us examples of how to live in our world with courage and confidence. Learning how to become a disciple of Jesus is really something that is "caught" much more than learned. And the best way to "catch" the full meaning of being disciples is to see it lived out in the lives of others.

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME




In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home and seeing the real presence of God in all things.



In order to have an adequate relationship with creation, there is no need to diminish the social dimension of the human being. In fact, one cannot propose a relationship with the environment apart from that with other people and with God. It would be a romantic individualism disguised as ecological beauty and a suffocating to shut oneself up in immanence.

Since everything is related, the defense of nature is not compatible with the justification of abortion either. An educational path for welcoming the weak beings around us, who at times are troublesome or intrusive, does not appear feasible when a human embryo is not given protection, even though its arrival causes discomfort and difficulties. If one loses one's personal and social sensitivity towards the acceptance of a new life, other forms of acceptance useful for social life wither.

The development of a new synthesis that overcomes the false dialectics of the last centuries is still awaited. Christianity itself, remaining faithful to its identity and to the treasure of truth it has received from Jesus Christ, always rethinks and re-expresses itself in dialogue with new historical situations, thus allowing its peren-





A deviated anthropocentrism gives rise to a deviated lifestyle. In the Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* I referred to the practical relativism which characterizes our age, and which is even more dangerous than the doctrinal one. When the human beins place themselves at the center, they end up giving absolute priority to their own contingent interests, and everything else becomes relative.

It should therefore come

as no surprise that, together with the omnipresence of the technocratic paradigm and the worship of limitless human power, this relativism develops in subjects, in which everything becomes irrelevant if it does not serve one's immediate interests. In this there is a logic that allows us to understand how different attitudes feed each other which at the same time cause environmental degradation and social degradation.

The culture of relativism is the same pathology that drives one person to take advantage of another and treat him as a mere object, forcing him to hard labor, or reducing him to slavery due to a debt. It is the same logic that leads to sexual exploitation of children, or to abandoning the elderly who do not serve their interests. It is also the internal logic of those who say: let the invisible forces of the market rule the economy, because their effects on society and nature are inevitable damage.

If there are no objective truths or stable principles, apart from satisfying one's aspirations and immediate needs, what limits can trafficking in human beings, organized crime, drug trafficking, the trade in blood diamonds and endangered animal skins? Isn't it the same relativist logic that justifies the purchase of organs from the poor in order to sell them or use them for experimentation, or the discarding of children because they do not respond to the wishes of their parents? It is the same "disposable" logic that produces so much waste just for the disordered desire to consume more than what is really needed.
