

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APRIL 9, 2023 EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

The great physicist, Albert Einstein once said that after all his study of

Dear friends,



the universe left him with one fundamental question. "Is this world that we live in a friendly universe?" Easter is our resounding "yes" to this question. God is on our side. And yet there are many people who think life is

some great contest in which God is testing them. It becomes hard to think that there can be a good outcome in life if we think God is against us. In such a view the spiritual life can become drudgery if we see nothing good, no happiness or joy. In the midst of all that is happening in our world, it can be easy for such a view of life to take hold. Fear, panic and anxiety can rule the day.

But the message of Easter says differently. The words we read from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians give us a clue: "You have been raised with



Christ...now seek what is above not what is here on the earth." Words often fail to adequately express what we believe to be true. Great works of art can help us better understand. The picture above is an icon from the Eastern Orthodox Catholic Church which depicts the Resurrection. When I saw this for the first time, I remember thinking "this changes everything." So often we have been used to images of the resurrection which are all about Jesus being raised from the dead. But this images suggests there is more to the story. Here we see Jesus literally pulling people out of their graves. All the broken chains scattered about are telling us that Jesus resurrection is about freeing us from all the things that keep us bound up in fear.

What's the point of this? Recall the words of St. Paul. "You have been raised with Christ...now seek what is above not what is here on the earth." To put it another way, you are now resurrected, now go out and live and act as people who know this. Our resurrection is not something that is going to happen at the end of time. It has happened already. And it is happening everyday when we choose trust over fear, confidence over panic, and compassion over anxiety. If we have already been resurrected, then we don't have to spend our time and energy trying to get enough so that God will let us go to heaven. He has already done that. And if this is the case, then our role in life has to change. If "we have been raised in Christ"

then perhaps the most fundamental aspect of who we are is that we are each anointed and appointed by the Holy Spirit to preach good news to the poor, liberty to the captives and sight to the blind. And that means we have to take seriously that we are the Body of Christ-we are the hands, feet and heartbeat of the living God.

When we begin to realize that this is the starting point for us, it changes everything with regard to how we live and what we focus on in life. It's a lot to take in, I know. This Easter let's remember that that we have been anointed to bring life to the world. Perhaps the best thing we can do is just let this reality sink into the depths of our souls. That is the way we give our "yes" to allowing God to use our lives. And that is a pretty awesome role to play. And just know that God will do great things with our Leaning into the journey of life.

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home and seeing the real presence of God in all things.

Biological innovation starting from research

In the philosophical and theological vision of the human being and of creation, which I have tried to propose, it is clear that the human person, with the peculiarity of his reason and his science, is not an external factor that must be totally excluded. However, although human beings can intervene in the plant and animal world and use them when necessary for their life, the *Catechism* teaches that animal experiments are legitimate only if they are kept within reasonable limits and help to cure or save human lives. He firmly remembers that human power has limits and that it is contrary to human dignity to make animals suffer unnecessarily and to dispose of their life indiscriminately. Any use and experimentation requires a religious respect for the integrity of creation.

I would like to accept here the balanced position of Saint John Paul II, who highlighted the benefits of scientific and technological advances, which show how noble is the vocation of man to participate responsibly in God's creative action. But at the same time he recalled how any intervention in one area of the ecosystem cannot

ignore its consequences in other areas



He affirmed that the Church appreciates the contribution of the study and applications of molecular biology, complemented by other disciplines such as genetics and its technological application in agriculture and industry. Although he also said that this must not give rise to indiscriminate genetic manipulation who ignores the negative effects of these interventions.

Human creativity cannot be held back. If an artist cannot be

prohibited from expressing his creative capacity, neither can those who possess special gifts for scientific and technological development, whose abilities have been given by God for the service of others, be hindered. At the same time, one cannot help but reconsider the objectives, effects, context and ethical limits of this human activity which is a form of power with great risks.

Any reflection on human intervention on the plant and animal world, which today involves genetic mutations produced by biotechnology, should be placed within this framework, in order to exploit the possibilities present in material reality.

Respect for faith in reason requires paying attention to what biological science itself, developed independently of economic interests, can teach about biological structures and their possibilities and mutations. In any case, the intervention that acts on nature "to help it develop according to its essence, that of creation, that willed by God" is legitimate.

It is difficult to make a general judgment on the development of genetically modified organisms (GMOs), plants or animals, for medical purposes or in agriculture, since they can be very different from each other and require separate considerations. On the other hand, the risks are not always attributed to the technique itself, but to its inadequate or excessive application. In fact, genetic mutations have been and are produced many times over by nature itself. Not even those caused by the human being are a modern phenomenon.
