MAY 7, 2023 FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Dear friends,

They say that the most repeated phrase in the Bible are the words: "Do Not Be Afraid." We hear them in the gospel today. "Do not let your hearts be troubled," Jesus tells his disciples. As much as they listened to Jesus and for as long as they were around him and saw how he related to people, the disciples still seemed to be controlled by their fears.

If it was so with the disciples, I guess we can't be too surprised that fear can have such a hold on us in our lives. Most of the angry outbursts from people and the quick rushes to judgment that seems so prevalent among people today have, I believe, their roots in a deep sense of fear. We are living in such a great time of transition and change. In many ways, the world that we grew up seems to be crumbling around us. We hear people all around questioning the way we looked at life and made sense of things. This whole experience can be very unsettling and fill us with great anxiety. And when we are filled with this kind of energy, it is no wonder that fear plays such a big role in our lives.

It's hard to admit that we are afraid. It's hard to say, "I don't know what is going to happen and I am scared." We'd rather think that we are beyond this. Somehow, admitting our own fears, is much too vulnerable. Men, especially, grow up in a culture that they are supposed to know the answers and be in control of every situation. When we face things like a change in jobs, an uncertain economic future, a sudden illness that rocks us on our heels, a child that is dealing with an addiction issue, the most normal response would be to say "I am scared and afraid. I don't know what is going to happen."

When these kinds of things happen, we try to go back to something that seemed to give us a sense of security. In the gospel today, Jesus doesn't tell the disciples to ignore their fears or pretend they don't exist. He says, "do not let your hearts be troubled." It's a bit like saying, "Yes, you are afraid and that is ok. But don't dwell there. Don't let the fear consume you and control your life. Take a deep breath. Feel the fear and then do the things that will help you move forward."

And then, Jesus ends his conversation with the disciples by telling them something pretty amazing. "Trust me and believe in me. And when you do this, you will do greater things than I have done." Now that is a far cry from shaking in our boots because of fear. And know this, the promise that Jesus gave to his disciples is the same promise he gives to each of us today. So, let's acknowledge our fears but also remember the great power God gives us.

Next week, we will begin offering people the chance to receive communion under the form of wine as well as bread. You may recall that we stopped offering this option when the covid pandemic began several years ago. So next week we will begin offering that option and my hope is that you will avail yourselves of this opportunity. I know there have been some legitimate concerns about sharing from the same cup. For what it is worth, there have been any number of studies done over the years that drinking from the cup does not spread disease.

Even before we went through the covid pandemic, I always thought it was a bit strange that everyone did not receive from the cup. It's like we hear Jesus say, "take and eat," and we say, "ok that is fine." But when he says, "take and drink," we often say, "no thanks, I'll pass on that. Interesting. Leaning into the journey of life Fr. Gene Schroeder

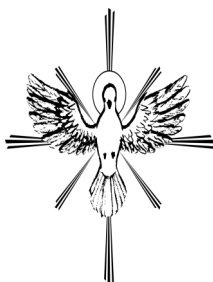

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled *Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home* and seeing the real presence of God in all things.



II. CULTURAL ECOLOGY

Along with the natural heritage, there is an equally threatened historical, artistic and cultural heritage. It is part of the common identity of a place and the basis for building a habitable city. It is not a question of destroying and creating new hypothetically more ecological cities, where it is not always desirable to live. It is necessary to integrate the history, culture and architecture of a specific place, safeguarding its original identity. Therefore ecology also requires the care of humanity's cultural riches in their broadest meaning. More directly, it asks to pay attention to local cultures when analyzing issues related to the environment, making

the technical-scientific language dialogue with popular language. It is culture not only understood as the monuments of the past.

The consumerist vision of the human being, favored by the gears of the current globalized economy, tends to make cultures homogeneous and to weaken the immense cultural variety, which is a treasure of humanity. For this reason, expecting to solve all the difficulties

through uniform regulations or with technical interventions, leads to neglect the complexity of local problems, which require the active participation of the inhabitants.

The new processes in gestation cannot always be integrated into models established from the outside but coming from the same local culture. Just as life and the world are dynamic, caring for the world must be flexible and dynamic. Purely technical solutions run the risk of taking into account symptoms that do not correspond to the deeper issues. *starting from their own culture*. Not even the notion of quality of life can be imposed, but it must be understood within the world of symbols and customs specific to each human group.

Many forms of intense exploitation and degradation of the environment can deplete not only local livelihoods, but also the social resources that have enabled a way of life that has long sustained a cultural identity and a sense of existence. and living together. The disappearance of a culture can be as serious or more serious than the disappearance of an animal or plant species. The imposition of a hegemonic lifestyle linked to a mode of production can be as harmful as the alteration of ecosystems.

In this sense, it is essential to pay special attention to Aboriginal communities with their cultural traditions. They are not a simple minority among the others, but rather they must become the main interlocutors, especially when they proceed with large projects that affect their spaces. For them, in fact, the earth is not an economic good, but a gift from God and from the ancestors who rest in it, a sacred space with which they need to interact to feed their identity and their values. When they stay in their territories, they are the ones who take better care of them. However, in different parts of the world, they are under pressure to abandon their lands and leave them free for mining, agricultural or livestock projects that do not pay attention to the degradation of nature and culture.
