

JUNE 18, 2023 THE ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Dear friends,



The work on our church continued this week. Brick masons have been hard at work rebuilding the brick along the edge of the roof and beginning to do the tuck pointing of the exterior brick.

Now we need to do the work of raising the money to pay for all the things we want to do to get our church building in good shape. All told it will take \$1.3 million to do this work. We know that our insurance policy will cover about \$700,00 of these costs which means we have to raise an additional \$600,000.

There is no doubt that this is a big challenge. But nothing compared to the challenge that faced the 140 families in 1888 as they faced the prospect of building a whole new church. It took all their efforts to raise the \$15,000 needed to build the new church. This cost was seven times the amount of money they spent in building the first church that was dedicated in 1851. That church cost \$2,200. Even more remarkable is that it was twelve times the amount of money they spent to operate the church in 1886. If we had to do the same thing today it would be the equivalent of raising \$20 million.

Consider, for a moment, what faced these parishioners. In a typical year, 1886 for example, the parish operating budget was \$1,200. That meant that on average, each of the 140 families contributed \$8.50 through their weekly offerings for the daily operation of the parish.


Now they would also have to come up with an average of \$107 if they were to raise the \$15,000 needed to build the new church. That is 12 times what they gave in an average year through the collection..

The financial commitment that our ancestors made took a lot. They had to make their contribution to the church a priority. And, no doubt, other things in their life had to sacrificed for that to happen. And we have benefitted from their generosity.

Now it is our time to do the same. The financial commitment of raising \$600,000 will take all of our efforts. And it will require a willingness to back up our love for our church with the dollars it will take to repair it. So we will all have to think and pray about how much we are willing to build this new legacy for our church.

In the coming weeks, I will be sending you a letter with a pledge card asking you to make a financial commitment to help rebuild our church. And, just as our ancestors did for us, now we our putting our money on the line so that future generations of our parishioners will benefit from our efforts.





THE DIALOGUE ON THE ENVIRONMENT IN INTERNATIONAL POLICY

Since the middle of the last century, the tendency has been to conceive the planet as a homeland and humanity as a people living in a common home. An interdependent world does not only mean understanding that the harmful consequences of lifestyles, production and consumption affect everyone, but, above all, ensuring that solutions are pro-



posed from a global perspective and not only in defense of the interests of some coun-

Interdependence forces us to think of a single world, of a common project. But the same ingenuity used for enormous technological developments cannot find effective forms of international management in order to solve

the serious environmental and social difficulties. In order to tackle the underlying problems, which cannot be solved by actions of individual countries, a global consensus is essential. It leads, for example, to planning sustainable and diversified agriculture, to developing renewable and low-polluting forms of energy, to encourage greater energy efficiency, to promote a more adequate management of forest and marine resources, to ensure access to drinking water for all.

We know that technology based on highly polluting fossil fuels. especially coal, but also oil and, to a lesser extent, gas, must be replaced progressively and without delay. Pending a broad development of renewable energies, which should already have begun, it is legitimate to opt for the less harmful alternative or to resort to transitional solutions.

However, adequate agreements have not been reached in the international community about the responsibility of those who have to bear the major costs of the energy transition. In the last few decades, environmental issues have given rise to a wide public debate, which has made spaces of considerable commitment and generous dedication grow in civil society.

Politics and industry respond slowly to global challenges. While the humanity of the post-industrial period will perhaps be remembered as one of the most irresponsible in history, it is to be hoped that the humanity of the early 21st century will be remembered for having generously assumed their serious responsibilities.
