JULY 30, 2023 THE SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN



Dear friends,

It's scientific name is *Gallus gallus domesticus*. We know it today as the humble chicken. It traces its origins to the Red Junglefowl in Southeast Asia and Oceania. It was domesticated some 10,000 years ago. You'll find chickens in ancient Egypt and Rome. From the fall of the Roman Empire in 476AD until the 1700s chickens survived in relative obscurity.



During the late 1800's chicken ownership and breeding of chicken became incredibly popular due in no short part to Queen Victoria of England. In the late 1800s she acquired Cochin chickens from China and they were an excellent addition to her of strange and exotic animals. Queen Victoria adored them and often sent the eggs of these exotic chickens to other royalty making them immensely popular across England.

In the early 1900s the industrialization of chickens began with Mrs. Wilmer Steele. She is widely considered the pioneer of the commercial broiler industry. She raised 500 broiler chickens and made so much money she built a chicken house big enough for 10,000 chickens. That pales in comparison to the billions of chickens raised each year.

Today, that humble chicken is the center piece of our famous fried chicken dinner. Simple put, we think the chicken is one of God's greatest creations. It is not an exaggeration to say that each chicken, when it is doing what it was meant to be, simply being a chicken, it praises God and is a reflection of God's love for the world.

I keep thinking of the words we read in the Gospel when Jesus tells his disciples, "there is no great love than to lay down one's life for another (John 15:13). In this year of Eucharistic renewal we reflect upon the fact that Jesus took simple things, like eating and drinking, and used them to reveal a great mystery—that God is always feeding us with his life so that we, in turn, can be that life for the world.

One of our great spiritual masters was the humble Brother Lawrence, a Carmelite lay brother (1611-1691). He encouraged



others to take brief moments of pause during the daily events of our life to enhance our awareness of God's presence around us. He kept reminding us that

God is present with us in all times and circumstances.

So as we go about preparing meals for all our guests who are joining us for our chicken dinner, let us remember that God is present among us. And in these ordinary gestures of preparing food and feeding people, part of the great mystery of God feeding us so that we can be his life to the world is being played out.

Everyone and everything is a part of this great mystery. Even and especially the humble chicken.

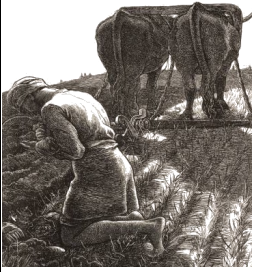

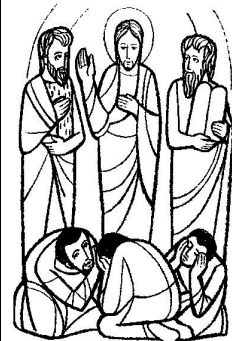

CARING FOR OUR COMMON HOME



In this year of Eucharistic Renewal, we continue reading Pope Francis's teaching letter (encyclical) entitled *Laudato Si—Caring for Our Common Home*



The same logic that makes it difficult to take drastic decisions to reverse the trend of global warming is that which does not make it possible to achieve the goal of eradicating poverty. We need a more responsible global reaction, which involves tackling the reduction of pollution and the development of poor countries and regions at the same time.

The 21st century, while maintaining governance typical of past eras, it witnesses a loss of power of the nation states, above all because the economic-financial dimension, with transnational characteristics, tends to predominate over politics. In this context, the development of stronger

and more effectively organized international institutions becomes indispensable, with authorities designated impartially through agreements between national governments and endowed with the power to sanction.

As Benedict XVI affirmed in the line already developed by the social doctrine of the Church,

“for the governance of the world economy; to heal the economies hit by the crisis, to prevent worsening of the crisis and consequent greater imbalances; to bring about timely integral disarmament, food security and peace. In this perspective, diplomacy acquires an unprecedented importance, in order to promote international strategies to prevent the most serious problems that end up affecting everyone.

THE DIALOGUE TOWARDS NEW NATIONAL AND LOCAL POLICIES

Not only are there winners and losers among countries, but also within poor countries, in which different responsibilities must be identified. Therefore, issues relating to the environment and economic development can no longer be set only on the basis of differences between countries, but require attention to be paid to national and local policies.

Faced with the possibility of irresponsible use of human capacities, the functions of every State cannot be postponed to plan, coordinate, supervise and sanction within its own territory. How does society order and safeguard its own future in a context of constant technological innovations? One factor that acts as an effective moderator is the law, which establishes the rules for conduct permitted in the light of the common good. The limits that a healthy, mature and sovereign society must impose are related to foresight and precaution, adequate regulations, supervision of the application of the rules, fight against corruption, operational control actions on the emergence of unwanted effects of production processes, and intervention appropriate in the face of undetermined or potential risks.

There is a growing jurisprudence aimed at reducing the polluting effects of entrepreneurial activities. But the political and institutional structure does not exist only to avoid bad practices, but to encourage good practices, to stimulate creativity that seeks new ways, to facilitate personal and collective initiatives.

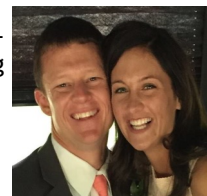

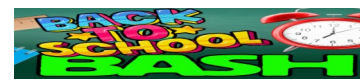
