


We have come to the end of our 182nd year as a parish. In many ways the life of our parish this past year was filled with ordinary events—gathering at prayer each

READY TO BEGIN A NEW YEAR

It is hard to believe that we are almost ready to the start of the 2023-2024 school year. The teachers and staff have been working hard to prepare for a wonderful year ahead. We are so excited to welcome back our

returning students, families, and staff, as well as the new students, families, and staff members joining us. This summer the school is undergoing a deep cleaning of the floors and several classrooms are getting a new coat of paint.

One of the other projects that we hope will be finished by the beginning of the school year is the installation of security gates on the playground area south of the school. I know that making this area safe when our children are using this area for recess has been a big concern. As with everything that is new, it will take a little bit of adjustment on everyone's part in the coming weeks to make sure this works out the way we would like it to. The money to pay for this improvement comes from a school safety grant from the Indiana Department of Homeland Security. Our PTO has also contributed a \$7,000 matching fund for this project. They have also provided some money to help do some touch up painting in the cafeteria as We are truly thankful for their efforts as well as the many volunteers who have made this possible.

I am happy to tell you that we will also have some new faces among our teaching staff this year. Mrs. Jessica Kuester has accepted the position of Art and PE teacher. Mrs. Mallory Hoefling, who taught Art and PE last year was offered a similar position at Holy Cross. It was hard for her to turn that job offer down as it would mean she was just a few minutes away from where she lives. Mrs. Hoefling has been a great blessing to the St. Joe School community and while we understand her reasons for leaving, we will mss her. So, as we give thanks for the gift she has been for us and will surely be for the school community of Holy Cross, we also are excited to welcome Mrs. Kuester and the gifts she will bring in her role with us. Jessica comes to us from Westside Catholic School with several years of teaching experience. Before she joined Westside Catholic two years ago, she spent several years in the EVSC at Stockwell and Glenwood.

We're also happy to welcome Mrs. Candance McNabb as a resource teacher. She is taking the place of Mrs. Stephanie Tanner who will be teaching second grade. Candance previously worked in the EVSC school system and also worked at Riley Hospital

REMEMBERING Leonard Angermeier December 2, 1935 - June 26, 2023

Leonard was born on December 2, 1935, one of eight children born to Oscar and Wilfrieda (Rexing) Angermeier. His siblings, Sr. Carol Ann, Lucille, Rita, Mary Lou, Br. Andrew and Hank proceeded him in death. He has one brother, Walter who

lives in Indianapolis.

Leonard's family were longtime members of St. Joseph Parish. Leonard attended grade school here and then graduated from Mater Dei High School in 1953, the first class to attend all four years of high school at the new Mater Dei High School. Leonard also attended the Mechanical Arts School (later to be known as North High School) where he learned the tool and die trade.

Leonard worked at Windsor Plastics for a time before staring his own company, Accurate Tool and Engineering which he operated for forty-five years.

The love of Leonard's life was his wife Susann. The first time he saw Susann, Leonard was smitten! "She was 14 at the time, and she was walking down the sidewalk in front of the convent on St. Joe Road. She was wearing a beautiful brown dress and I thought she was the prettiest girl I had ever seen." It would take another eight years, but Leonard was persistent and they were married at St. Benedict's Church on May 20, 1961. "She told me at the end of her life that she could not have found a better husband," Leonard remembered. And that pretty much summed up his feelings as well.

Leonard and Susann built a home on Neu Road close to where he had grown up. There they welcomed two children into their family, a daughter Cindy and a son Stan. Even with the demands of running a business, his children remember that he always had time to be part of their activities. "He was always our biggest supporter in all the endeavors we took part in.

When he wasn't working, Leonard enjoyed going fishing and sharing that passion with his children. Later in life, Leonard and Susann enjoyed traveling throughout the United States as well as trips to Venezuela and Spain.

One of the other passions in Leonard's life was his study of the sacred scriptures. For over twenty-five years, he faithfully attended Bible Study classes led by Fr. Don Dilger. Through the years he developed a good friendship with Fr. Dilger and he and Susann often shared meals together with him. Leonard always had questions to ask. We remember him as a person who held some pretty strong views and was not above sharing those views with others. Next to his love for Susann and his children was his love for his kitten. And his most ardent wish was that when he died he would join Susann and his kitten in heaven.

Through the years Leonard devoted much of his time to caring for Susann who faced many health challenges through the years. For Leonard, it was simply a labor of love.

In 2020 Leonard and Susann moved to Fishers, Indiana to be near their son, Stan. They lived in an assisted living community and Leonard was able to continue to care for Susann. Her death in September of 2022 left a big hole in Leonard's life. Leonard died very peacefully on June 26. Leonard's faith, which had always been a great consolation to him throughout his life, enable him to embrace this final journey with grace and dignity. We give thanks for the gift Leonard was to his family and to our parish. We pray now that he will now experience the fullness of life in the kingdom of heaven.

dents also participated in special service opportunities at some of our local nursing homes and homeless shelters. Each Sunday we provided an opportunity for the young children of our parish

to gather for Children's Liturgy of the Word. This gave them the chance to talk about the Sunday scripture readings at a level they could understand.

We provided formation sessions for our high school young men and women as they prepared to be con-



firmed by Bishop Siegel last January. We also provided formation sessions for the young children who celebrated First Reconciliation in February and First Communion in April. Throughout the year, members of our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) met with several individuals and led them as they were baptized and received into the Catholic Faith. This past June, we worked in conjunction with Resurrection Parish to provide an opportunity for the young children of our parish to participate in Vacation Bible School.

Members of the parish gathered for Bible Study Groups, "That Man is You" faith sharing group for men and book study groups. Members of the parish also took advantage of the opportunity for weekend retreats here locally and at other retreat centers in the tri-state area. Several members of the parish made a Cursillo Weekend and other members of the parish served as members of the team putting on the Cursillo Weekend. Likewise, other young members of the parish participated in a TEC (Teens Encounter Christ) weekend and the Source and Summit Retreat.

We continued to keep in touch with the 80+ members of our parish who are in college by providing a care package of assorted goodies for them to help them through semester exams. We continued to highlight the achievements of our high school seniors through our "Up Close and Personal" stories in our monthly newsletter.

CATHOLIC EDUCATION AT ST. JOSEPH GRADE SCHOOL AND MATER DEI HIGH SCHOOL

Much of our money and human effort of our parish have been spent on providing a Catholic education for our students

through St. Joseph School, an endeavor that has been going on in one form or another since the very beginning of our parish in 1841.

Our school faculty and staff continue to work at providing an environment where our students can not only gain academic knowledge but learn how to live in this world by being centered on the values of the Gospel that Jesus challenges us to embrace. The school year was full of pursuits-math, academic science, history, English, music, art, I-Step and I-Read testing, spelling bee, geogra-

phy bee, science fair, art fair, robotics competition, Young Authors, library week, Catholic schools week festivities, and the book fair.

Prayer time with our faculty and students is a central part of our education experience. Each week our students, faculty and staff gathered for Mass. We continued our special Holy Week services with children for Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter.

Flowing from this prayerful center were numerous efforts by the students to reach out to the world beyond the walls of the school. Throughout the year our students were involved in



a number of fundraisers to benefit Riley Children's Hospital, Santa Clothes Club, and the Evansville Rescue Mission Thanksgiving dinner for the community. In addition, students collected food items for the St. Vincent DePaul Food Pantry and they helped support the children in Haiti by adopting students in school in Haiti. Groups from the school also worked with the residents of Jacob's Village and visited residents at local nursing homes.

Not only do we try to teach that caring for other people is important, but caring for the world around us is important as well. Throughout the year, we continued to challenge our students to develop a consciousness for recycling, by collecting cardboard, glass, plastic or paper, and recycling aluminum cans.

Throughout the year, students also had the chance to participate in various St. Joe Bobcat athletic competitions. The work of the school athletic committee has been invaluable in these efforts by providing the funds needed for equipment, uniforms, and fees, as well as providing coaches for the various sports: volleyball, football, soccer (boys and girls), basketball

(boys and girls), wrestling, track, tennis, baseball, and archery. As the students move into middle school, they are invited to be part of feeder league teams for Mater Dei High School.



This past year we continued our support of Mater Dei High School. Our parish, as do all the other parishes in the Evansville area, provides financial support for the operation of Mater Dei and Memorial High School through our high school assessment. Our assessment this year was \$96,000. In addition, many of our parishioners have given financial support to Mater Dei through contributions to their capital campaign, the Friends and Alumni Annual Fund, the Catholic Education Foundation, and contributions to various endowments established to benefit Mater Dei. Untold hours of volunteer service have also been given by parishioners to various projects throughout the year.

PARISH ORGANIZATIONS

Throughout our parish's history, different organizations have played a vital role and that continued to be true this past year. The Altar Society, Men's Club, PTO, Knights of St. John, Athletic Committee, not only provided opportunities for people to gather for food and fellowship, but also provided vital services for our parish.

The Altar Society continued it's long standing role of providing money to pay for altar breads, missalettes, altar wine, candles and various other items we use at Mass. They used their baking skills to make and sell kuchens and cinnamon rolls to raise money for these efforts.

The Men's Club continued a long tradition of providing money for ongoing maintenance projects in the parish. One project they are looking at right now is repairing, sealing and restriping the parking lots on our parish campus. They have also



continued a long history of supporting athletic programs for the youth in our parish. Burgoo sales, homemade sausage and brauts and chicken dinners have been some of the ways they have raised money to support the work they are undertaking on behalf of the parish.

The school PTO continues to play a vital role in the functioning of school. Working with our school principal, teachers and staff, they have provided money for new textbooks, computer

upgrades, playground security gates and school painting projects. In addition, they have provided money for numerous classroom and teacher needs, as well as providing countless number of volunteer hours as playground supervisors, class room aides and school office help. SCRIP sales, operating a booth at the Fall Festival and a dinner, dance and auction were some of the ways they raised money for the projects they undertook.

The Knights of St. John have always been a big supporter of the work of the Marian Day Program. This past year they provided money to advance the work our school teachers are undertaking to help students with special needs. To help fund their work, they operated their booth at the Fall Festival.

The school athletic committee continued their work of providing money for coaches, uniforms, supplies and entry fees for the twelve different team sports offered through the school. Operating a concession stand and basketball league are some of the ways they use to raise money.

ST. JOE CEMETERY REPORT

The cemetery board had its annual meeting in January. A Financial Report for the period of January 1, 2022 thru December 31, 2022 showed an income of \$20,405 from the sale of grave lots and restricted donations. Expenses for the year, primarily related to lawn mowing expenses were \$6,421.39. As of December 31, 2022, the cemetery reserve fund had a balance of \$47,252.23.



Board members also affirmed the policy of asking people to put a tombstone on their lot within six months of the purchase of the grave lot. This policy is designed to give families additional assurances that the lot they purchased for their grave will be available when

the time comes for a burial on that lot.

Board members also established the costs for cemetery plots at \$1450 for a double plot and \$725 for a single plot. For non parishioners a double grave is \$2,900 and a single grave is \$1450.00

Board members also acknowledged the many years of service that Mark Schmitt gave to taking care of our lawn mowers . Jerry Happe agreed to coordinate the our lawn mowing crews and oversee the maintenance of our equipment.

Board members are also working to install a culvert along the north end of the new section of cemetery along St. Joseph Road. They are also beginning to investigate the costs for building a columbarium crypt for cremation burials along the east end of our current cemetery. Both of these projects are part of our Rebuilding our Church Campaign.

CARPENTER SOCIETY REPORT

From very humble beginnings in 1995 with the establishment of one endowment, we now have grown to 33 different endowments. These endowments are held in trust and managed by the Catholic Foundation of Southwestern Indiana. They are among the over six hundred endowments managed by the Catholic Foundation.

Two new endowments were established this past year: The Herman & Catherine Schmitt Parish Endowment and the Herman & Catherine Schmitt School Endowment. A total of \$114,390 was contributed to the thirty-three endowments in the Carpenter Society.

While 2022 was not a particularly good year in the stock market, the Catholic Foundation still made available \$47,859 in distributions from our endowments. This amount has been added to previous years' available distributions for each endowment.



As of December 31, 2022, we had a total of \$332,132 in available distributions from our endowments. Right now, this money is being kept in unrestricted accounts for each endowment. The wisest move for us, in terms of money management, is to continue to allow the Catholic Foundation to manage these funds.

We were also able to use some of the distributions from each of our endowments for various projects in our parish. Here are just a few of the ways money generated from our endowments is being used: helping needy families in school to pay for book and supply fees and day care fees; paying for the upkeep on our cemetery and parish property; providing money to help the communication efforts of our school alumni association; providing

money so that we can respond to requests for assistance with rent and utility payments from folks in our area; and providing money for our friends in Haiti so that they can have food to eat and schools to attend.

Individual Endowments can be established with an initial donation of \$5,000. Gifts to the Carpenter Society can be made in a number of ways

- Naming the Parish in your will
- Naming the Parish as a full or partial beneficiary of a life insurance policy
 - Naming the Parish as a beneficiary of a charitable remainder trust
 - Naming the Parish as the owner of personal property subject to the requirements of the donor's life estate
 - Establishing a Charitable Gift Annuity

tion of reaching out to our brothers and sisters in need. Through efforts, large and small, these efforts touched lives locally and throughout the world. Here are a few examples: One of the most unseen, but still important efforts is through our participation in a wide variety of special collections that were taken up throughout the year.

Each week we collected food which was delivered to the St. Vincent DePaul Food Pantry. In addition, several members of the parish worked at the food pantry answering calls for help and putting together food packages for families and individuals in need. Our school students and religious education students also provided food items for the Food Pantry through their various programs throughout the year.

Working with the St. Vincent DePaul Coordinator's Office and through parishioners' contributions to our Parish Needy Fund, we also helped provide money for food, utilities and other necessities for individual families located within our parish boundaries.

In conjunction with our Men's Club yearly sausage sale, parishioners provided the money to give 500 lbs of sausage to the St. Vincent DePaul Food Pantry and some of our local homeless shelters. We also conducted our annual Diaper Bag Express through which we provided items for newborn infants. They were given to our local Birthright group for distribution to young unwed fathers and mothers for their new born children. In addition, several members of the parish also work at the local Birthright organization.

Three times during this past year, we invited parishioners to give blood at our blood drives. These drives were held in conjunction with our local Red Cross organization. Parishioners also had the opportunity to contribute money for our local Catholic Build for Habitat. Several members of our parish also helped out as members of the weekly building crews for Habitat homes. We continued our support the work of Mary, Mother of God Parish in Vladivostok, Russia through our quarterly special collections.

Our work with our sister parish, St. James, in Plaine du Nord, Haiti, also continued this past year. This past year that work has been especially difficult given the political and economic turmoil that is going on throughout the country of Haiti. Despite this, we continued our strong focus on providing education on the grade school and high school levels by sponsoring over 300 students. We continued to expand our efforts to provide the financial resources for students to attend college and trade schools where they can learn a trade that will give them a chance to have a better life. We continued to provide the financial resources to provide a hot meal for the 600 children in our grade school and high school. With all the political turmoil going on in Haiti, it has been difficult for schools to be in session as they normally would. This is especially sad because when school in not is session as it would normally be, many of the children loose out on the chance to have at least one meal a day.

One of the big focuses this past year has been working with the parish to build a computer lab/school addition for the parish high school. Despite the enormous logistical and material challenges involved with this project, we can report that much of the work on the computer lab has been completed.

Another area is to redouble our efforts to operate a sewing school through which we hope to provide members of the Haitian community with the skills to make clothes which can be sold to the community. This is one of several micro finance projects we are involved in. We had several small groups of folks travel to Haiti for mission trips as well. We have been blessed to have many people from our sister parishes in the diocese as well as other folks in the Evansville area join other us in supporting our work with our brothers and sisters in Haiti.

MAINTENANCE OF OUR PARISH

If you have buildings, as any homeowner knows, you are going to

have on going maintenance issues to deal with. And so it is true in our parish. We have a long history of being good stewards of the buildings and property of St. Joseph Parish. We are blessed with lots of



folks who are skilled in various trades who have offered their expertise to keep our buildings in good shape. This past year was no exception.

In the course of the year there were all manner of plumbing issues, heating and air-conditioning issues, electrical issues, and all manner of lights that needed to be changed, PA systems to be maintained, painting various areas of buildings, installing new doors, ad-

justing panic hardware on doors, annual and ongoing maintenance of our water treatment plant, all of which got taken care of, many of them in which the labor costs were donated by parishioners. Most of these go on without anyone even knowing that they are being taken care of. But these efforts resulted in thousands of dollars saved had we been forced to have outside firms do this work.

Perhaps the one area where people notice the efforts of volunteers is the work done by our lawn mowing crews. It's a lot of work to mow the lawn and trim around all the tombstones in our cemetery. We are grateful, as well, for the work that Jerry Happe has done in keeping all our mowers and weed eating equipment in good order.

Painting different areas of the school and installing security gates were two of the main things that we focused

on this past year. For the last several months of the year we have been focusing on repairing the tornado damage to our church. Along with this we have also begun to take care of other areas of the church that needed attention.

YEAR END FINANCIAL REPORT

It takes a great deal of commitment from a lot of people who take seriously our obligation to provide the money needed to do the work we do in our parish. Over the years we have been blessed by their financial generosity. Because of that, we can report that the state of finances in our parish is very sound. You can see a summary of our financial report on page 8. If you would like a more detailed report, call the parish office and we'll make a copy available to you.

A look at our financial report reveals that 70% of our money is spent on salaries and benefits for our teachers, and parish staff, less than 1% is spent on worship related expenses, about 2% is spent on various aspects of running the parish office, about 9% is spent on building maintenance, utilities and insurance, .002% is spent on Religious Education Programs, 6% is spent in



support of Mater Dei High School and 12% is spent on expenses related to the operation of our school program, beyond the cost of salaries and benefits for teachers and staff.

We were blessed again this year with so many people helping on parish fundraising projects—our summer social, rummage sale, fish fry, and catered dinners. We are blessed as well by the in-kind contributions from so many people. It's difficult to calculate the total dollar value of such services but it is in the thousands of dollars. Their help is also one of the reasons we have a positive financial report.

We are able to operate our parish in the black financially in large part because we have a very dedicated parish and school staff that has learned how to get the most from the money we receive. Our staff is pretty bare bones and



most of these people wear several different hats when it comes to job descriptions. It is these efforts that have enabled our parish to break even each year.

Our year end report tells us a lot about the thing we "did." To a large extent, we are a "doing" parish. Like most parishes we find it easier to do the "hands on" tasks that make up the life of our parish. All that is important, of course, but even more important is who we "are." Buildings and programs help us, but ultimately what matters is whether we are becoming people who allow our hearts and minds to be shape by the teachings of Jesus. This job does not have a lot to do with success but it has a lot to do with faithfulness. And when we are willing to be a part of that journey, than all the things that we do, all the programs and events that we are part of, will all take their proper place.
