

IT'S OUR TURN TO BUILD A LEGACY FOR THE FUTURE

One of the first funerals I had shortly after I arrived here at St. Joe in 2000 was that of Wilfred Will, a life long member of St. Joseph Parish. Like many other parishioners, Wilfred left a last-

ing impression on our parish. One of his tireless efforts on behalf of our parish was to mow the grass of the cemetery each week. He did it mostly by himself. When he died, one of his grandchildren shared this poem which Wilfred had hanging above his work bench. It's a poem by John Ruskin.

When we build, let us think that we build forever.

Let it not be for present delight or for present use alone. Let it be such work as our descendents will thank us for. And let us think, as we lay stone on stone, that a time is to come when these stones will be held sacred because our hands have touched them, and people will say, as they look upon the labor



and wrought substance of them, "See, this our Father did for us." Wilfred was just one of many people who, through the years,

made their mark on our parish and created something that we benefit from today. The hundred and forty families who came together in 1886 to build our church are certainly among this group. What a challenge they faced as they cleared the smoldering ruins of their church that had been completely destroyed by fire and then built a new church. It took all their efforts to raise



the \$15,000 needed to build the new church. This cost was seven times the amount of money they spent in building the first church that was dedicated in 1851. That church cost \$2,200. Even more remarkable is that it was twelve times the amount of money they spent to operate the church in 1888. In today's economy, that would be the equivalent of raising \$20 mil-

These families not only provided the money needed to

build the church, they also took part in clearing the ground and preparing the foundation and they used their teams of mules and


letter. We know many of you will want more tickets than that. We'll be happy to get them to you. Just call the parish office (812- Britt and Patrick



Here in our parish we have two special opportunities for people to spend some time in prayer at church. Each Monday, from 7 am to 7 pm we have Eucharistic Adoration. In addition, once every six weeks we have a 24 hour time for Eucharistic Adoration, from 6 am on Tuesday till 6 am on Wednesday. This 24 hour day of prayer is part of our an effort throughout our diocese to be praying each day for vocations.

This is what our weekly day of Eucharistic Adoration and every six week 24 hour day of adoration are all about.

Our goal is to have two people come for each hour of prayer. This is especially wise for those late night and early morning hours through the night when some people might feel a little anxious about being the only person in church. Over the years, we have been blessed with many people who have come to pray during these prayer times. However, many of these faithful people have died. Others, because of health reasons, are no longer able to come to church. So now we are asking people in the parish to prayerfully consider coming to spend an hour in prayer for both our weekly day of prayer and our 24 hour day of prayer. HERE'S SOME EXCITING NEWS ABOUT TAX CREDITS

529 plans savings plan school

529 education savings plans can now be used to fund private schooling. 529s allow anyone, regardless of age or income, to contribute. Earnings accumulate tax free and contributions are eligible for an Indiana state tax credit of

20%. As the owner of a 529 plan, you control the funds and can change beneficiaries to another eligible family member at any time. Even better is that withdrawals for many educational expenses are free from federal state income tax.

A simple example would be a parent who contributes \$5000 into a 529 account would receive 20% or \$1000 as a state tax credit. The \$5000 could then be used to pay St. Joe tuition.

These 529 accounts can be created online, at banks or with a financial planner. If you would like more information about a 529 Plan, call us (812-963-3273 or 812-499-9074) and we'll get you connected with folks who can help you set up your own 529 plan.

Here's another exciting opportunity that can benefit you as well as needy families in our parish and ultimately our parish school. The State of Indiana now enables you to reduce your state tax liability while at the same time helping low and middle income families send their children to our school. Donors (individuals or corporations) are eligible to take advantage of a 50% credit against their state tax liability for contributions made to Choice Scholarship, the qualifying scholarship granting organization (SGO) that we deal with. If you make a contribution of \$100 to an SGO, you can take \$50 off your state taxes. It's important to remember that there is no minimum necessary contribution. Just remember that however much you give, half of that amount can be deducted from your state taxes. In addition, your full contribution can also be deducted from federal taxes. Contributions that are made to an SGO can be designated for a spe-

cific school (in our case, St. Joseph School). That way the money you contribute will definitely go to providing a grant for a needy family here at St. Joseph. The great thing



about this opportunity is that it can be a win/win for everyone involved. If you would like more information about this opportunity, call us at the parish office (812-963-3273).

Franz Jägerstätter: The Austrian farmer who said no to Hitler

In Braunauam Inn in upper Austria, some curious people stop to gawk at the "Hitlerhaus" where the infamous man was born and raised. They would be wise to continue on a few more kilometers to the little village of St. Radegund, where a far different sort of person lived. The place is very small: only a beer house, a few houses and a modest church. It is considered so insignificant that the village does not even appear on some detailed maps of Austria. But this may change considerably in the near future. St. Rade-



gund's most famous citizen, Franz Jägerstätter, was named an authentic martyr by Pope Benedict XVI in June 2007.

Does being a martyr make one, ipso facto, a saint? Certainly the young Franz did not appear very saintly. He was a rowdy type, known for getting into brawls with the other young men of the area. It would seem that he fathered a child out of marriage and then disappeared for a year or so, going to another part of the country to work in the mines.

When tempers had cooled he returned, fell in love with a local girl and married her. The lovely Franziska was just what



this undisciplined young man needed. She was lively and full of fun, but also mature and deeply devout. For their honeymoon they traveled by motorcycle all the way down to Rome and back, a trip unheard of in rural Austria. Franz was, as everyone said, a *lustiger Mensch* ("lively fellow"), who had found the perfect partner.

He became quite devout himself. Neighbors said they could hear him singing hymns as he worked the family farm. He became friends with the Rev. Josef Karobath, the pastor, who named him sacristan and put him in charge of training the altar servers, planning the holy day celebrations and caring for the church.

But some serious political changes were taking place at the time. Franz was the only one in town who voted against the annexation of Austria by Germany. The German army entered the country and was greeted with wild enthusiasm. Hitler made a triumphal entry into Vienna and was met by the Cardinal Archbishop. Franz was one Austrian who was not pleased.

A year later Poland was invaded. Franz decided he could not in conscience serve in such an unjust war. Poland had not invaded Germany; Germany had invaded Poland and, very soon, other countries. Many of his friends were enlisting; others waited to be drafted. Franz told his wife, his mother and his pastor that he would not serve.

Father Karobath was understanding. In fact, soon he would be removed from his parish for having delivered a less than totally patriotic homily. But he reminded the younger man that his widowed mother, his wife and now his three tiny daughters depended on him. Franz decided to seek advice from the bishop in Linz.

But the bishop simply lectured him about the other young men who were fighting and dying in Russia in defense of the fatherland. He should do the same.

Franz's determination would not be eroded. For a long

time the induction notice did not come. The government needed farmers like Franz for the war effort. But as the war took more and more lives, older men and even boys were being sent to the front. The notice came in the mail: Franz was needed in the army. There could be no such thing as a conscientious objector.

Franziska remembers that she and Franz got up early in the morning while the grandmother and the three girls were still asleep. Would she ever see him again? They said their farewells and he walked off into the pre-dawn darkness toward the induction center. He refused to take the oath of obedience to Hitler and was quickly put into jail in Linz. He was held there for some time and sent some truly beautiful letters to his wife. Eventually he was sent to a dreaded prison in Berlin.

Franziska very much wanted to visit him. The new young priest who had taken the place of Father Karobath said he would accompany her. They set off by train although the Americans and the British were bombing the rail lines. At the prison they could see through a window that Franz was brought in a van, pulled out and knocked to the ground. Yet he was allowed to visit with them. The priest repeated some of the old arguments: there was still time to change his mind; he could still be saved. But Franziska knew that to her strong-willed husband, saving his body was not as important as saving his soul. For him it was a clear case of right and wrong: the war was unjust; he could not serve.

He was taken away, and the two visitors made the dangerous trip back to St. Radegund. Franz was beheaded by the prison guillotine. When the war ended, the prison chaplain, who knew where the body had been buried, had the bones put in a box. A nun agreed to take them back to St. Radegund for burial. Father Karobath had returned as pastor and he announced that Franz would be given a solemn funeral and buried in a place of honor directly next to the church.

Many did not agree, however. Their sons, brothers and husbands had fought and died in Russia, Italy, France and Germany. They were the heroes, not Franz, a man who had refused to serve. When his name was carved with those of other war dead into a village war memorial, the name was defaced. But Father Karobath would have none of it. Franz was worthy of solemn burial. The monument would be repaired and flowers planted on his grave.

As the years have passed, the local people have taken a more positive view of Franz Jägerstätter. A little museum has been opened in the old farmhouse. Some photos, a rosary and a prayer book are on display there and, of course, his motorcycle helmet. People have started to come as pilgrims. They pray in the church where he prayed and stop by his grave, which is in an honored place just outside.

There were, I think, two priests in Germany who were executed as conscientious objectors, but Franz seems to have been the only layman. It was a dangerous and risky business to say no to Hitler's insane war. Could he have done it without the support of a strong and loving wife? Now, however, his three daughters know that their father was a martyr. And martyrs are saints. The beatification ceremony for Franz Jägerstätter took place on Oct. 26, 2007, in Linz, Austria

(Continued from page 1) Building a Legacy for the Future (cont) horses to make the trip into Evansville to haul loads of brick that were used to build the church. Clara Baumgart recalls hearing stories from her father, Frank Will (and father of the same Wilfred Will mentioned above), about hauling wagon loads of brick. "Many times the wagon would get stuck in the mud and sometimes it would take six teams of mules to pull the load out."

I can't help but see parallels to these stories as we begin the work of rebuilding our church. In many and varied ways, people have already stepped forward to offer their help. Putting together the blueprints to guide the workers in building a new roof; finding places to store fall festival booths so we can store pews in our storage building; refurbishing and repairing our pews and kneelers; coming up with just the right color scheme to paint the church and the right kind of carpet to install; shoring up the floor joists; and updating electrical circuits. All these tasks and more have been taken up by parishioners. Even among the folks from our general contractors, you will find parishioners who are helping to rebuild our church.



If you came upon the job site in 1888, no doubt you would have found fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, sisters and brothers, aunts and uncles, each offering their help with the task at hand. And you see the same thing today. What a beautiful legacy of stewardship!

Of course, it took more than

hands on help and "sweat equity" to make the new church a reality. They had to come up with the money as well. And it is the same way for us. So now we are embarking on a "Rebuilding our Church" capital campaign to raise the money needed. Our goal is to raise \$600,000. Together with the money we are receiving from our insurance company, we believe it will cover the approximately \$1.3 million it will take to do all the things we want to do.

As we conduct this campaign, we are trying to be conscious of all the other financial commitments we are asking people to make on behalf of our parish. Chief among these is making sure we continue to receive the money needed in our collection each week to meet all of our day to day expenses. And right now we have been asking people to financially support our summer social and chicken dinner. In the fall, once again, we will be asking folks to help do our part to support the work of our diocese through our annual Catholic Parishes Campaign.

Given all these things, we have a window of opportunity in July and August to conduct our "Rebuilding our Church" campaign. I am confident that we will be able to meet this financial challenge. Many people have already asked about when we will have a campaign and are anxious to make their contributions. Judging from the reactions I heard when they first heard the news about the damage to our church, I know people have a great love for our parish and want to ensure

Our plan is for this campaign to run over the next couple of years, basically from August, 2023 through December, 2025. This month I will be sending you a pledge card which you can use to make your pledge.

All of us have different financial situations. The great thing is that no one person has to provide all the money themselves. Of

course, if there is a person who can do this, I certainly won't say "no" to their offer!

Truth be told, however, this is a "we" project, not a one person project. And, honestly, we have the financial re-



sources to meet this goal. Now we just have to have the "will" to do it. I'm confident that we do!

So, look for your pledge card in the mail in the coming weeks. Take some time to think and pray about how God is asking you to be part of this parish endeavor. This is truly "our" special moment in the life of our parish. As we think and pray about making our pledge, let us remember that a time is to come, when our efforts will be held sacred, because our very life has been in it. And people will say, as they look upon these efforts, "See, this is what our ancestors did for us."

HERE'S AN OPPORTUNITY TO IMPACT THE LIFE OF A CHILD BY BECOMING A FOSTER CARE FAMILY

More than 1,000 children in Vanderburgh County experience abuse or neglect every year. This number continues to increase, and not all of these cases end in triumph. Right now there are over 1000 kids in Vanderburgh County in foster care but only 150 foster families.

There is a great need for **Foster Care Parents**. a trained foster parent through the Department of Child Services or the Villages, and then take children into your home until they are returned to their families or placed in an adoptive home. Foster parents have complete control over who they decide to take in and how many children they choose to care for at once.

There is also a need for Respite Care Families. These families undergo the same training and preparation as a fulltime foster parent, but only take in children who have already been placed with a full-time foster family to allow those families a short break.

You can also Become a FOST Sitter. Watching a child who's in foster care requires a simple background check, which the Villages provides at no cost, and it allows foster parents to go out on dates for much-needed rest and mar- Watto Now, Where to (20, Watto Do) riage building.

JOIN US IN CHANGING LIVES IN HAITI ONE STUDENT AT A TIME

One of the foundations of our work with our brothers and sisters in Haiti is a "community based" student sponsorship For \$25/ program. month (\$300 annually), a sponsor would be assigned a student from St. Jacques elementary (Ecole St. Pierre - ESP) or high school (College



St. Pierre - CSP). This gift would cover the student's tuition, uniform and cost of supplies. The majority of each gift would go toward the teachers' salaries. All 400 ESP and 300 CSP students would benefit from having dedicated teachers who were being paid consistently and the daily lunch program being provided. For many students, this is the one certain meal they will get each day!

What began with 10 ESP and 10 CSP students in 2007 has grown to nearly 100 ESP and 100 CSP students being sponsored annually. The senior year -- Phylo as they call it in Haiti -- was added to the curriculum in 2012 and the enrollment in both schools has grown tremendously. The students are receiving excellent instruction and routinely exceed Haitian education standards. We typically graduate about 20 CSP students each year - a remarkable achievement in a country where less than 1% of the population ever go to high school.

In recent years, we have expanded the sponsorship program to include university education if the student qualifies, meets strict criteria to enter and remain in the program, and if the sponsor agrees to continue providing financial support



(approximately \$1,500 annually rather than \$360 for ESP and CSP students). We make no promises to the students but tell them if they are willing to make the commitment and do all that is required of them. we will do our best to help find sponsorship. The student is responsible for housing, supplies, books and travel expenses while we cover tuition. We closely monitor the student's academic progress and, when necessary, remove a student from the program for noncompliance.

Today, we are proud to have 45 students attending universities in Haiti, studying Engineering, Administration, Medicine, Medical Technology, Computer Science, Nursing, Agriculture, and Diplomacy. If there is ever to be a true change in a country torn by political turmoil, natural disaster, and lack of resources it will be through the education of its youth. With commitment, along with financial support they cannot gain elsewhere, these young people will become the leaders that Haiti needs. What an awesome opportunity we have to provide support and HOPE for Haiti's future!

We are now in the process of inviting people to renew their student sponsorships for the new year. This is a great time to begin sponsoring a student as well if you have not done that in CONTACT ERIC REFFETT the past.


