#### CHURCH ROOF REPAIR UPDATE

As I have listened to people in the parish and sought their advice about repairing the damage to our church, two main concerns have emerged. The first is a desire to repair the church so that it looks like it did before the tornado came through and tore off the

roof. Since this would involve some pretty extensive repair work, a second desire is to take this time to find out if there are any other issues that need to be addressed so that our church building will be in good shape for the years ahead.

This has been the focus of the work undertaken by our church roof committee. We've been working with folks dealing with our property insurance to determine the extent of work that will be covered through our property insurance. That has taken a little time, especially since our property is just one of the properties in our diocese that our insurance company is working with to take care of tornado damage to their properties.

We think we now have an understanding of what things need to be done in order to get our church building in good shape. Here is where things stand now.

Obviously the biggest issue is putting a new roof on the church, with all the related construction issues that go with it. We've called upon the folks from Hafer and Associates Architects to draw up the needed plans for the roof repair. Tom Blythe and Bob Gibson have been busy getting this work done. While we are installing a new roof, we also want to build a

walkway which will be suspended above the new insulation. This walkway will allow us to access the hoist that lowers and raises the chandelier hanging above the altar. Currently we have been accessing this by walking along the rafters, which is not the best or safest way to do this.

It seems best that the new roof be the same kind of roof that was on the church. This standing seam roof was installed in 2013. As you know, the roof areas above the east and west sacris-

## ....FAREWELL

Nathan Winstead PRINCIPAL

Many say that teaching is the best way to create change and growth in others. This is something that isn't taken lightly to those that teach, and I am blessed to be in this profession and surrounded by amazing teachers in our St. Joe School community. When I



was first hired as principal at St. Joe, they didn't hand me a book that laid out everything that needed to be done because that would just be too easy. I was reminded of this at this year's First Communion where the reading was from Matthew: "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few."

We are all called to walk this path and it is never easy. I have been blessed with five wonderful years at St. Joe and we have definitely been through some tough times whether it be COVID, our church roof, or the smaller pieces that just take time

ties, as well as the sanctuary area of the church, are all intact. So, the intent is for the new standing seam roof to match what we already have in place as close as possible.

There will be some challenges to getting the roof work done

as we are dealing with the original construction work that was done in 1888. The repair work will also involve a lot of brick repair and repair to the copper lined wooden gutters. Matt Bishop, from Empire Contractors has been putting a plan together to take care of all these repairs.

Looking at the interior of the church, there are several sections of the ceiling where bricks fell through, that need

to be repaired. Since these areas are scattered throughout the church, it seems best that the entire interior of the church be repainted. We've talked to Mark Fehrenbacher, who did the painting of the church in 1990 for his advice. His expertise has been a big help to us.

The stenciling that separates the side wall from the ceiling and the gold leaf highlighted painting in the sanctuary as well as around the stations of the cross and the circular saint pictures along the side walls are all in good shape and do not need to be repainted. The areas around the stained glass windows will need to be recaulked as needed and then painted white as will the base boards and sacristy doors. We've noticed that some of the cracks that came about because of the earthquake damage in 2002 will also require additional work to repair them.

We believe that the other areas of the church should be

painted with the same or similar color scheme as is presently being used so that it compliments the stenciling and gold leaf painting already in place. We've been working with some design professionals to give us some ideas about the best colors to use. Some people have asked about using entirely different colors for the interior of the church. While that could be done, it will be more expensive as it will require applying additional coats of paint as well as redoing any stencil work which is pretty labor intensive. We believe the most cost effective solution is to have a color scheme tht matches what is already in place.

In order to paint the interior of the church, we need to remove the pews and install scaffolding to facilitate painting the interior.

This is a good time for us to repair any of the pews and kneelers that

need it. And it is a good time for us to apply a conversion varnish to the pews. We did this on one pew already and we like the results. Our thinking is that we may be able to do this work while the pews are still in church since that is the cleanest environment we have. Once they are repaired and refinished, we

will store them in our storage building until they are ready to be reinstalled in the church.

We are not planning to remove any of the pews from the church balcony. Removing them would be a very difficult task. There is enough room there to install scaffolding to do the painting of the church ceiling.

When the roof of the church was torn off, it caused some plaster to fall into the pipes of our church organ. These pipes are actually located in the interior of the bell tower. The pipes you see when you look up into the balcony of the church are actually decorative pipes. The debris needs to be removed from the organ pipes and then the pipes need to be cleaned. This is not the kind of work that any ordinary company can do. We've been in touch with folks who take care of church pipe organs and they have come up with a plan to do this work.

There are some structural issues with the floor joists along the west side of the church that need to be repaired. If you have ever walked down the west aisle of the church you may have noticed that it is a bit like walking up and down a valley. This is the area that needs attention. Since there is just a small crawl

space underneath the floor and much of this is taken up with air conditioning ductwork, we'll have to access these floor joists from above.

Several folks have commented through the years that the carpet in the church needs to be replaced. This will be a good time to do that. carpet that we have in church was installed in 1990. It has served us well. While some folks have talked about different kinds of flooring options, we think the best option is carpeting the church. It is quieter and less prone to cause people to slip and fall. But the biggest reason is that our church is 137 years old and old buildings tend to have uneven spots in the floor. You don't notice them with a carpet floor but you would notice them if you tried to install a tile, marble or wood floor. All things considered, it seems the best option is to install new carpeting in the church. We want to get a really good quality carpet in a color that compliments the color scheme in the church. Here also we are seeking the advice of design professionals to pick out the best quality and color of carpet that will match the color, pews and other furni-

ture in the church.

Our thinking is that we would only carpet the main body of the church. We would not install new carpeting in the balcony of the church. Currently the carpeting in this area is not the same as the rest of the church. We believe it is still in good shape and does not need to be replaced.

There are also some minor electrical related issues that need


our attention. First would be replacing the current circuit panel in the east sacristy. We've actually been using the circuit breakers to turn the lights on and off in church. That is really not the best thing to do. Over the years, since that circuit panel was installed, new fans were installed as was the new chandelier above the altar. The result of all this is that we have a hodgepodge of switches and controls. Installing a new circuit panel and dressing up all these electrical switches seems like a good idea. The exhaust fan by the vigil lights on the east side of the church also needs some repair.

As to the exterior of the church building, the biggest issue that needs to be taken care of is to tuck point the side walls of the church as well as the steeple. As you might imagine, the brick mortar joints have deteriorated over the years. We have, in the past, done some tuck pointing work on various areas of the exterior of our church. We believe this is a good time to make sure the mortar joints on the entire exterior of our church are repaired as needed. Once this work is done, the entire brick surface needs to be sealed to prevent moisture from getting into the church. This will be a major undertaking.

You may recall that the south louver in the bell tower was damaged by the tornado. Our plan is to replace this louver with another white aluminum louver. Since we are doing this, we think it is also a good time to replace the other three wood louvers with white aluminum louvers as well. We believe they will last for a long time and will require little if any maintenance.

Since we will need to have a mechanical lift to do this work, we think this will also be a good time to repaint the smaller redwood louvers near the top of the steeple. This is also a good time to regild the gold cross at the very top of the steeple.

One other area on the north side of the steeple needs

That is the scope of the work that addresses the two issues I spoke about in the beginning: restoring the church to the way it was before the tornado damage and addressing the issues that will keep our church building in good shape for years to come.

Now of course the big question is "How are we going to pay for all this?" Among the items we have outlined above, we know that our insurance policy will cover most, if not all the costs involved. We also know there are items we think are necessary to do which will not be covered by insurance.

Here are the items that we are being told will be covered (in part or in whole) by our insurance policy:

- Cleaning the debris and installing a temporary roof that was all done the week after the tornado.
- Installing a new roof with the related masonry work involved
- Cleaning the pipes of the church organ
- Repairing the holes in the plaster ceiling and painting the interior of the church
- Costs associated with installing scaffolding necessary for painting the interior of the church
- An allowance for removing the pews in the church
- Repairing the portion of the cemetery wall destroyed by the tornado
- Replacing one of the outdoor lights along the front sidewalk of the church that was destroyed by the tornado
- Replacing/restoring the west door and handicapped entrance ramp
- Replacing the south louver in the church steeple

Here are the things we do not believe will be covered by insurance

- Tuck pointing and sealing the brick exterior of the church
- New carpet in the church. (We believe that our insurance policy will give us an allowance for cleaning the carpet which we can use toward the purchase of a new carpet.)
- Costs associated with installing new aluminum louvers on the east, west and north sides of the steeple.
- Painting the four redwood louvers at the top of the steeple as well as regilding the gold cross at the very top of the steeple
- Updating the circuit panel in the east sacristy
- Shoring up the floor joists along the west wall of the church

So we know that we will have to have some sort of capital campaign to cover the costs of the work that will not be covered by insurance. In the past when we have done capital campaigns we have also asked the question: If we are going to do a capital campaign, are there other things in the parish that need to be taken care of as well? To this extent we have identified several issues to consider:

• PARKING LOT: Even before the tornado struck, we had been gathering information for repairing and restriping the parking lot. Obviously we only would do this work once the repairs on the church have been completed. After all we don't want trucks and other construction equipment causing damage to a newly repaired

- RECTORY GARAGE UPDATES: If you have looked at the garage roof lately, you've probably noticed more and more shingles have come off. We also need to eplace the four overhead doors and two service doors.
- DITCH WORK ALONG ST JOE ROAD: We want to install a culvert and fill in the ditch along the north end of the cemetery


• SCHOOL CLASSROOM STORAGE: We have five classrooms that need additional classroom storage. Enabling this to happen would involve removing the old radiators in the classroom. These radiators are no longer in use. Removing them would allow us to build more storage space along the outside walls of each classroom. It would also involve reworking the storage units the students used in the past to hang their coats and other belongings. The students now have

individual lockers located in the hallway for this purpose. These units could then be refitted for storage space.

• BUILDING A COLUMBARIUM FOR CREAMATION BURIALS IN OUR CEMETERY There has been a growing interest among parishioners for cremain burials. Additionally we are getting closer to filling up the spaces available in our current cemetery. While we have additional room for in-ground burials, we also think that building a structure which would contain spaces for above ground cremain

burials would extend the life of our current cemetery. What we are thinking about is building a brick wall along the east end of our

cemetery which would

contain niches for cremain burials. This brick wall would be built to blend in with the brick in the church. Building this brick wall would also dress up this area and eliminate a lot of the issues involved with maintaining the landscape currently in place in this area.

- PLAYGROUND SECRUITY GATES A growing concern voiced by parents and school staff is the importance of ensuring that the blacktop area of the campus south of the school is secure when the school children are using this area for recess. We have been investigating what it will take to install a system of gates that could be closed during school recess hours for playground safety. We believe there is grant money for school safety issues that can cover this cost.
- WATER TREATMENT PLANT: We are beginning the lengthy process of determining the life expectancy of our current water treatment (septic) plant. We want to explore the possibility of installing a new septic system to replace our current treatment plant/sand trap method.

So where do we go from here? We have already spoken to many different contractors about the work that needs to be done. It is my hope that, by the time you are reading this, we will have gotten final word from our insurance folks about how much of the work will be covered by our insurance policy. Then we will have a good idea about how much money we will have to raise to complete all the work in church and the other related items that we want to take care of in the parish.

Once this is done, we will be able to conduct our capital campaign to raise the needed funds. My hope is that this campaign will be conducted this summer. I am hopeful as well that sometime this month we can begin to have the different contractors begin their work. What I am hearing is that work on both the outside and inside of the church can be done at the same time.

One thing that we need to remember is that there are a lot of different parts to our plan and no plan goes exactly as we hope it will. Given the fact that we are working on a building that is 134 years old, there are likely to be issues that come up that we have not foreseen. The key is being patient and flexible as the work unfolds. We want to get back into our church as soon as possible but we also want to ensure that everything we do is done well for years to come.

### PARISH BUDGET FOR 2023-2024

For one hundred and eighty-two years, the people of our parish have come together to answer this question: "How is God calling us to be a community of Faith? What is God calling us to do?" The answer they came up with would demand from them their time, energy and resources.

It would be great to think that there was unanimous agreement among the people in each generation on just what to do. A little bit like we hear in the Acts of the Apostles when we are told that "the community was of one mind and one heart and there was no one in need." We smile when we hear these words and say "yeah, I bet it was like that." Truth be told, it's hard to get any group of people to agree completely on anything. It's more likely that in every generation we had some of the folks who agreed wholehearted with the things that parish did, some of the folks who agree with most of what was done, some who agreed with a little bit of what was done and some who didn't agree with anything.

While there was never a total "buy in" by everyone, there has been a consensus for what should be done. That consensus is reflected in the attitude that says "while I may not agree with everything, I will offer my support because I am a member of the parish and I am willing to do my part."

This sense of pulling together for the common good that has been a hallmark of our parish. It is rooted in the basic belief that when each of us is willing to do our part, to offer what we can, God takes these efforts, large and small, and does great things with them. St Paul reminds us of this in the words from the letter to the Ephesians: "We give thanks to God whose power now at work in your lives can do far more than you can ask or even imagine."

- We want to continue to support Mater Dei High School as we have done since we have had Catholic high schools in Evansville

While I'm sure not everyone is 100% on board with everything that is represented in this budget, I do believe they reflect the will of the majority of folks. Raising the \$1.831 million dollars necessary to make this budget a reality will take everyone' support. I'm sure the seven families that gathered together in 1841 to start this parish could scarcely comprehend such numbers. 

## RECIEVING THE BLOOD OF CHRIST.....BECOMING A MINISTER OF COMMUNION....ALL PART OF KNOWING WHAT THE REAL PRESENCE OF JESUS IN THE EUCHARIST IS ALL ABOUT

This month, we celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi. That's Latin for "The Body of Christ." Understandably, during our recent covid pandemic, offering people the opportunity to receive from the cup was suspended. But now, once again people will have the opportunity to receive both the body and blood of Christ at Mass.

Over the years, we have had a number of people who served as Eucharistic Ministers. For one reason or another, some of them are no longer in a position to serve our community in this manner. So now is a good time to extend an invitation to people to consider being a minister of communion.

Being a minister of communion is not just a matter of making things flow more smoothly and quickly at Mass. I think there is something powerful that happens when we take on the simple act of feeding one another. We use ordinary acts like eating and drinking to help us understand something much deeper. Jesus used these actions to tell his



disciples that they were being fed not by ordinary food, but his life, his courage, his perseverance in the face of difficulties. And he reminded them that each time they remembered what he had done by gathering

share a simple meal, they were feeding each other not with ordinary food but with His life. This is the idea we are trying to get at when we talk about believing in the real presence. The fact that eating and drinking are such ordinary events that we engage in everyday, is a reminder, too, that the real presence of Jesus is to be found in all the ordinary, even mundane experiences of life.

One of the real challenges in speaking about things like the "real presence," is that we tend to look at the symbol as the end rather than to where the symbol is pointing. So when we speak of the real presence we often think that this means the bread and wine that is consecrated at Mass or the consecrated bread that is kept in the tabernacle in church.

The challenge facing us is to see what these ordinary things are pointing to. And what they are pointing to is that the real presence of Jesus is everywhere and in all created things. So to honor the real presence is to honor that presence in all things. This is why we have such a profound respect for the unborn-because that is the real presence of Jesus. But it can't stop there. The real presence is also in the death row inmate, the person who finds themselves in our country without legal status, the people we consider our enemies, and the millions of people who have been left homeless throughout the world because of war, famine and violence. We hold them as sacred because they too are the real presence of Jesus. Beyond this we hold sacred the created world around us because it too is the real presence of Jesus. And this is why Pope Francis has called upon all of us to care for our common home.

So there is a lot going on when we come together to re-

ceiving communion at Mass. The "amen" we say when the minister says "The Body of Christ," and "The Blood of Christ" has some pretty profound implications. We feed each other. We strengthen each other with our courage and perseverance. And what can be more profound that having to give communion to someone I may not like or someone I don't see eye to eye with? What greater invitation is there to see the face of Christ in others?

All of this gets me back to my original invitation to people to consider becoming a minister of communion at Mass. I really think everyone should be a minister of communion. This is not a call for "special people." Most often when I ask people to consider being a minister of communion the comment I get is "I'm not worthy to do that." Well the truth is, you are not worthy. But then again, no one is worthy enough. Truth is, this is not about worthiness.

The second thing I hear from people is "I'm might do something that really messes things up and would be a real embarrassment to me and to others." I guess a certain amount of uneasiness at doing something we don't normally do is to be expected. But what I also know is that we think people are paying more attention to what we do than they really are. And, having been through some embarrassing situations in public over the years, I can tell you that life continues. Nothing has every happened that has stopped everything in its tracks.

So what is required to be a minister of communion? Quite simply, a willingness to serve. We're not looking for perfect people. And we are not looking to do things in a perfect way. We are ordinary people who are coming together to pray and when we do that, there is no way that we can do that wrong.

So take some time to think and pray about my invitation. Call (text) me (812-499-9074) and let me know. There will also be a sign up sheet at our weekend Masses that you can use.
