

BEARING WITNESS SO THAT WE CAN BE LIFE FOR THE WORLD

Lately I've been thinking of a song we often sang during my years in the seminary. Fr. Tobias, a monk of St. Meinrad wrote this song. I

remember especially the refrain: "we carry in our bodies the death of the Lord, that ours might be the gift of his life." It's based on words that St. Paul spoke to the community of Corinth (2 Corinthians 4:10). In speaking these words he was reminding the community of our calling to stand and bear witness to all the things around us and that includes the pain and suffering we see happening. Sometimes that suffering comes from the challenges people face in their life from sickness, family issues or money challenges. Sometimes that suffering comes from just living in the world today and hearing story after story about war and the resulting displacement of people. Stories about families dealing with floods, and droughts and the aftermath of tornadoes. Most recently we have been hearing about the terrible times our friends in Haiti have been going through because of government unrest and dire poverty. We've learned recently that even trying to get much needed financial resources to our friends has become increasingly difficult.

This is our calling.....to recognize the Christ in everyone...to reach out a hand of hope, to speak a word of love, to share a tear of joy or pain, to murmur a prayer, to stand together against those forces that would divide us, isolate us, and block our flow toward home.

It can be difficult to be present to all this suffering. Who hasn't wanted to throw up their hands in despair or cover their eyes and ears so they don't have to listen to any more of it.

REMEMBERING

Susann Angermeier
May 9, 1939—Sept. 28, 2022

The first time he saw Susann, Leonard was smitten! "She was 14 at the time, and she was walking down the sidewalk in front of the convent on St. Joe Road. She was wearing a beautiful brown dress and I thought she

was the prettiest girl I had ever seen." It would take another eight years, but Leonard was persistent and they were married at St. Benedict's Church. "She told me at the end of her life that she could not have found a better husband," Leonard remembered. And that pretty much summed up his feelings as well.

Susann Frazier was born on May 9, 1939, one of two daughters born to Phillip and Katharine (Mueller) Frazier. Her sister, Kathleen Mooney preceded her in death.

Susann initially attended St. Joseph School and then graduated from St. Mary's School. She went on to attend Mater Dei High School where she graduated in 1957. After high school, Susann pursued a career in nursing and attended St. Mary's Hospital School of Nursing.

During her nursing career, Susann worked at the Evansville State Hospital for a short time, but spent the majority of her time working at Welborn Baptist Hospital and also at St. Mary's Medical Center. During much of this time Susann served as an emergency room nurse.

After their marriage, Leonard and Susann set up housekeeping at a new home they built on Neu Road, near the place Leonard had been born. There they would welcome two children in their family—a daughter, Cindy and a son, Stan.

Susann devoted her considerable energy to raising her children and being a part of their lives as they were growing up. When she wasn't busy with that and all her work as a nurse, she also spent time keeping the books for Leonard's Tool and Die Machine Company.

One of the great passions in Susann's life was her work with Sigma Alpha philanthropic sorority. During her years as a member of the sorority, Susann served as treasurer and later national president of the sorority.

Over the years, Leonard and Susann were able to travel to various parts of the United States as well as trips to Venezuela and Spain.

During much of her life, and especially her last years, Susann suffered from physical limitations that prevented her from getting out as much as she once was able to. Over the years, she underwent several surgeries for hip and knee replacements.

REMEMBERING OUR FAITHFUL DEPARTED

Two years ago, Leonard and Susann left their home on Neu Road and moved to a condominium in Indianapolis which was close to where their son Stan lived.

Susann died on September 28. Her family gathered together on October 4 to celebrate the Mass of the Resurrection. She was laid to rest in the holy ground of our parish cemetery. We pray that she will now know the fullness of God's life in his kingdom and we pray that His peace will be with Leonard, Cindy and Stan and all the members of their families.



Kurt Forcum

Kurt is the son of Mike and Julie (Haller) Forcum. He has three older brothers an older and a younger sister. His older brothers Nick and Steve both served in the military. His older brother Carl lives at home. His older sister, Gretchen, is now serving with the Army Reserve and is currently getting ready to deploy to northern Iraq. His younger sister, Gretchen is in the eighth grade here at St. Joe.

Kurt attended St. Joseph

School and graduated in 2019. He has a lot of memories of his teachers through the years. He remembers especially that it was Mr. Wilson who gave him the nick name, "Mr. Forcunator." It was in grade school that Kurt began to play in the band. In junior high he was able to march with the Mater Dei band. During band competitions, he also served as part of the "prop crew" where he made sure that all the different props got moved on and off the field at the designated times.

For the last four years, Kurt has been attending Reitz High School. He's taken some interesting classes ranging from German, to computer to environmental science. Understandably, some of the biggest influences have been his teachers, especially his German teacher, Ms. Christi Adams and his Band teacher, Mr. Grimm.

Being part of the band has been a big part of Kurt's high school years. He's part of the percussion group. Right now, the band is in the midst of their band competition season and most recently they finished first at the North High School Invitational. "We're trying to make our way to state band finals this year. That takes lots of hard work and dedicated efforts. And that involves lots of early morning and late evening practices."

Going to Reitz was a big change for Kurt. "It was a lot bigger than my grade school class." One of the things that helped Kurt in this transition was becoming part of the band community. "I've spent a lot of time with the band over the years and that is where most of my high school friends are. Being part of the band also meant going to band camp each summer. That's a lot of hard work especially when it is hot like it usually is in the summer. Lots of times I thought I would rather be somewhere else, but then I thought if I wasn't here I would just be wasting time somewhere else."

One of the other big influences in Kurt's like has been his involvement with the Germania Maennechor. His mom and dad have been long time members of this German Club. Actually it was the place they met. Over the years, Kurt has helped out at a number of the different events, including the Volkfest. He's become known as the "Kraut Ball Runner." His job was to make sure that the inside and outside areas were stocked with their famous Kraut Balls. He's also been part of the crew that prepared all those delicious treats.

Food has also been a big part of the different jobs Kurt has had over the years. He's worked at the Ford Center, Bosse Field and Burdette Park. At all these places he's developed his skills at being master of the grill where he has learned how to fry hamburgers, brauts, and hot



HAITI MISSION TRIP REPORT some are comfort. Nou Fe Yon Sel Nan Jezikri



This past May, a group of six people travelled to Haiti to spend a week working with the people of St. James Parish Prior to the trip hosted а Hearts and

Hand for Haiti Dinner and Dance on May 7. This event was held on May 7. The event had a number of purposes: an opportunity to gather family, friends and parishioners after being cooped up far too long by the effects of covid; a chance to rekindle relationships with past travelers and supporters of our Haiti mission, as well as share our hearts and stories with new supporters; and finally, to raise funds to expand our high school and the addition of a computer lab complete with computers, furnishings and solar power.

The event was a huge success with over 350 guests and volunteers were in attendance A live auction followed the dinner with

many great items being auctioned along with acceptance of cash donations to purchase specific furnishings for the computer lab. We had over 100 silent auction items and baskets that were awarded to the highest bidders. Simply put, it was an amazing display of love and support by our church family, our Haiti Outreach supporters and our community. The event, raised around \$90 K and along with the generous \$100K donation in by the Angermeir's we have enough to completely fund the building project, which has already begun on our high school campus in Plaine du Nord.

They held a meeting with Fr. Dubois, the pastor at St. Jacques, and Ednel the engineer Father has selected to construct the school improvement project. learned of Fathers commitment to the success of the project and desire to directly oversee the work. Father explained that he would utilize skilled contractors for the technical work but would solicit help from the parish for some of the common labor work. The engineer seemed to be knowledgeable and experienced. They both expressed their goal to start construction on the project as soon as school exams were complete and try to substantially complete the project during the summer break. We brought some startup funds so materials could be secured and not be delayed by the slower process of wiring funds to Cap Haitian.

STUDENT INTERVIEWS

Our group was able to conduct student interviews of all the sponsored students in the elementary school (Ecole St. Pierre). This is always an enjoyable portion of the trip as our participants get to set with an interpreter and personally meet with and speak with the students as we try to bring back information for their sponsors. Just like here, we find some are shy, some are outgoing,

HOME VISITS

Olur mission team made about ten home visits during our time in Plaine du Nord. Edwin, our local Haitian sponsorship coordinator always works hard on a short notice to try to find us sponsored students homes to visit. These visits

front porch playing with the kids. One day while sitting on the porch playing games with the kids one little boy walked up and sat right next to me, almost like we were best friends already. Within only a few hours this little boy, Jules, became so attached to me I couldn't even go get a drink without him. Later we found out he was a student who needed a sponsor for the upcoming school year. A family friend of ours said they would like to sponsor a little boy and I knew instantly he was the one. We asked Jules if he could take us to his house so we could talk to his family and he hopped right into the truck. Telling Jules's family that we have found him a sponsor was something I will never forget and it is crazy the lasting impact this little boy has on my life. The rest of the trip I would see Jules every day and he would make sure of it. One morning before school he even snuck back into where we were staying and stood in the doorway waving to us. are performed so we can bring more information back to our sponsors about their student's family and home conditions. We meet the student and their families at their home and try to take photos and interact with the family to learn about who lives in the home, what they do to care for their family, etc. For those who get to participate in these visits it is usually an awesome experience and we learn about various neighborhoods, culture, living conditions and most importantly are always amazed at the hospitality shared with us by our Haitian friends, we are welcomed into their homes, offered seats to sit and share with them and personally get to witness the joy of their family unit. Here in America if six strangers came to your door unannounced and who didn't speak our language we would probably lock the door and ask them to leave, in Haiti we are welcomed as friends into their homes with open arms and warm

construction, with the planned addition of a new medical lab and an optometry wing. Several new buildings have been added with the addition of private rooms for patients & families and lodging facilities for local Medical Staff and administrators. During our visit, we met a group of US optometrists who were performing eye exams and procedures



and training Haitian optometrist who will staff the new optometry wing at the hospital.

SEWING HOPE PROJECT

One of the important items on our trip list, was to meet with Sendia the sewing coordinator and with Pascal the sewing school teacher to discuss progress, graduation, and new enrollments.



We met with Pascal the teacher on several occasions to get familiar with him and to get an update on the program. Although we found that preparations for graduation was behind and that new enrollment pro-

gress was slow, we gained confidence that Pascal is passionate about his job and truly wants to educate students with good sewing skills. We met with Sendia our local sewing coordinator and learned that she had chosen to end her commitment as co-

ordinator due to her busy schedule and new time commitment needed for her new printing and copy micro -finance business. She committed to fulfill her duties through the end of July and introduced us to a potential replacement coordinator who we interviewed for Monie. We also reviewed the sewing supplies in the ware house and learned that for use by the school and students.

On Sunday, July 3, we celebrated our first Sewing Hope honored. It was an amazing celebration as we reached this milestone with Sewing Hope, 3 years after restructuring the program and moving to a student sponsorship funding model for this Technical School. challenges, covid and continued incidents of unrest in Haiti, we have a solid program with a talented tailor leading the classes.

There was a short summer session in July to introduce our incoming students to basic sewing techniques. After a month of rest during August, the new school year will begin in September with 12 new students and 10 continuing second year students. We plan to ence it." introduce a new program next sum-

mer that will allow students to work for pay during the summer months.

WATER SPIGOTS AND FOOD

We want to offer a short positive note that the water spigots in the elementary school courtyard have been repaired and the students are again receiving clean water from the parish clean water system. They cook rice and beans in large pots over charcoal and propane stoves. The students receive their food at their desks in the classrooms, one class at a time.

Our group was the first group to be able to stay in the new dormitory recently completed over the top of the new cooks/caretakers guarters. The facility was really nice with large rooms, ceiling fans, tiled floors, a




new bathroom with shower, and glass windows with screens. The cooks now have their own bathroom and a place to sleep that is not subject to the flooding as in the past.

MICRO FINANCE

We have been providing micro-finance loans to various individuals and groups over the last several years. We believe that helping people help themselves is an important part of our mission. To be eligible for a loan the individual is required to submit a business plan to us for review. Our first and largest loan was to provide funds to the Fann-Vonyan women's group in Plaine du Nord for a chicken farm, over fifty percent of this loan has be repaid to date. We have also provided funds for phone charging business, funds for another small chicken farm, funds for a retail beverage business,

and a restaurant/bar business. We recently approved a loan for a copy/printing business and have a loan for a tap-tap (taxi type) business under review. The loans are interest free loans with an individualized pay back plan. Most of our loans are around \$2000 USD in value. We have about \$4,000 available for loans currently. 



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

The interesting thing that can happen when we are willing to do this, is that we can see that there is something beyond the immediate suffering we first notice. Being able to see beyond the immediacy of the pain around us can help us see great moments of compassion.

I saw this happening recently at one of our weekend Masses. During this Mass we prayed for the daughter of a family in our parish who was dying. As people came forward for communion they passed this family. And what I saw was how folks reached out to them. It was simple gestures—a knowing glace, a simple pat on the shoulder, a few words of comfort. They were beautiful gestures. And each one conveyed a message to this family that they were not alone, that here were people who loved them and cared for them. And I know these gestures meant a great deal to the family.

In a way they were conveying the words we hear in Psalm 91. You may be more familiar with this psalm because it is the basis for the words of the song "On Eagles Wings." That song is one of the five most popular hymns sung in church. I think it's popularity comes from he fact that it touches such a deep cord in all of us.

Remember the words? "And he will raise you up on eagle's wings, bear you on the breath of dawn, make you to shine like the sun and hold you in the palm of his hand." The song uses these words to speak about bearing witness to the suffering we see around us. "The snare of the fowler will never capture you, and famine will bring you no fear. You need not fear the terror of the night nor the arrow that flies by day. For to his angles he's given a command to guard you in all your ways; upon their hands they will bear you up lest you dash your foot against the

Standing with people in the midst of their suffering does not

make the suffering go away. Nor is it an end in itself. We bear witness so that our efforts will be the gift of God's life. That is what we do when we reach out a hand of hope, speak a word of love, or share a tear of joy or pain. And in the process, we take away the power the suffering and pain have for so many people in their lives.
