# Light Breaking Forth: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus came among us as light to scatter the darkness of a fallen world.

As His disciples, we too are called to be "the light of the world," He tells us in the Gospel this Sunday (see John 1:4–4, 9; 8:12; 9:5).

All three images that Jesus uses to describe the Church are associated with the identity and vocation of Israel.

God forever aligned His kingdom with the kingdom of David and his sons by a "covenant of salt," salt being a sign of permanence and purity (see 2 Chronicles 13:5, 8; Leviticus 2:13; Ezekiel 43:24).

Jerusalem was to be a city set on a hill, high above all others, drawing all nations towards the glorious light streaming from her Temple (see Isaiah 2:2; 60:1–3).

And Israel was given the mission of being a light to the nations, that God's salvation would reach to the ends of the earth (see Isaiah 42:6; 49:6).

The liturgy shows us this week that the Church, and every Christian, is called to fulfill Israel's mission.

By our faith and good works we are to make the light of God's life break forth in the darkness, as we sing in this week's Psalm.

This week's readings remind us that our faith can never be a private affair, something we can hide as if under a basket.

We are to pour ourselves out for the afflicted, as Isaiah tells us in the First Reading. Our light must shine as a ray of God's mercy for all who are poor, hungry, naked, and enslaved.

There must be a transparent quality to our lives. Our friends and family, our neighbors and fellow citizens, should see reflected in us the light of Christ and through us be attracted to the saving truths of the Gospel.

So let us pray that we, like St. Paul in the Epistle, might proclaim with our whole lives, "Christ and him crucified."

#### **Packing Hope**

The Rapid City Catholic School System is currently in the midst of its 13th annual Packing Hope fundraising campaign. The purpose of our Packing Hope program is to answer Christ's call to help the poor and vulnerable by bringing hope to our brothers and sisters who are starving or malnourished. Feed Just One is the name of a non-profit organization located in LeMars, Iowa that distributes highly nutritious food to hungry children in the United States, Honduras, and around the world. With the money we raise through our fundraising campaign, we purchase meal ingredients in bulk from Feed Just One and then work as Jesus' hands and feet as we carefully funnel the ingredients into individual packages that we weigh, seal, and ship to children in need on behalf of the Rapid City community. Our students and parishes donate close to \$20,000 annually for this cause, and to date we have packed well over 1,300,000 meals. STM Sophomore students will be speaking at all Masses on February 8th and 9th, and collecting donations at the doors. Please prayerfully consider donating to this cause. ## **Religious Life**

As we recall the celebration of World Day for Consecrated Life last weekend, let us take a moment to learn more about the different aspects of religious life.

### More about Sister Mary Catherine...

Sister Mary Catherine entered the religious life in 1970. She took her first yow in 1972.

Sister Mary Catherine lives the Carmelite charism of contemplation but is not a Carmelite. She lives as a hermit with the permission of the Diocese of Rapid City.

Carmelites The were organized as mendicant friars by Saint Simon Stock: they were "white nicknamed the friars" because of the color of their habit. They were displaced from Mt. Carmel and became Mendicants. They have always retained their hermetical spirit living solitarily in community.

Sister Mary Catherine accepts all prayer requests through her box in the Narthex.

#### **Religious Order**

Generally, a community of men or women (usually under solemn vows as priests, brothers, or nuns) living a stable manner of life in which they observe the evangelical counsels by means of the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Usually not attached to a diocese (as a diocesan priest is), they usually live a communal life with a specific apostolate and a particular charism and spirituality. Traditionally, they have been either active or contemplative, and have worn a distinctive habit. Exclaustration is permission for religious to live outside the community for a specified time (with vows still binding).

#### **Brother or Nun (Sister)**

A member of a religious order or community who has taken solemn vows. Technically, one bound only by simple vows is called a "Sister."

#### Vows

Solemn vows include those taken by members of religious orders after a period of temporary, simple vows. Solemn vows are absolute, irrevocable vows under which ownership of property is prohibited and marriage is invalid. Simple vows, whether temporary or perpetual, allow ownership of personal property. Nuns either live cloistered lives or have limited ministries outside the convent, while sisters usually pursue ministries outside the convent.

#### **Traditional Religious Life**

#### **Anchorites (Contemplatives)**

Anchorites (from the Greek for recluse) retire from worldly activity to spend their days in contemplation. They are the original "monks" (Greek: *Monachos*, living alone, solitary). Hermits — withdrawing to desert places, living in essential simplicity, subsisting on manual labor; for example, St. Anthony, the first famous hermit. Anchorites - Most radical, solitary, with only the essentials of food and cover.

#### **Cenobites (Monastics)**

A monk or nun living in a religious community. Examples of Cenobite orders include the Benedictines (the Sisters of St. Martin are Benedictines), Carthusians, Cistercians, Trappists, Basilians, Premonstratensians, and Augustinian Canons.

#### **Mendicants**

Latin for *mendicus*, meaning beggar; an infirm, wretched person. Members of a mendicant order are required to work or beg for their living; they are also not bound to one monastery by a vow of stability. Originally the name applied only to Franciscans and Dominicans. The name and privileges were extended to Carmelites (1245), Hermits of Saint Augustine (1256), and Servites (1424). Later, other orders were also accorded the title. Members of mendicant orders are called friars from the Latin *frater*, brother.

#### **Jesuits**

Latin: Jesus plus –ite suffix meaning "associated with." The Society of Jesus (SJ) was founded by Saint Ignatius Loyola in 1513. First purposes were defending the faith in the wake of the break-up of the Church and evangelization among the unchurched. Their leader has been referred to as the "black pope," very influential the Church, wearing black in contrast to the white worn by the Pope.

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
