"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God." (John 3:16-18)

When we try to explain the mystery of the Holy Trinity, we find ourselves being challenged by some of the greatest philosophical and theological questions. Today as we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Trinity, I will try to give us all something we can relate to, rather than explain the mystery. No, I will not give you the perfect, down-to-earth explanation of the Holy Trinity. I only hope and believe that one day, through the mercy of God, I will be able to grasp this concept. In the meantime, I would like us to focus on the things that do make sense. The union of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit has in its core principle of the good each person of the Trinity brings to our salvation. We can understand it more easily when we take a look at the principle attributes of the Holy Trinity.

First, we have God the Father who is the Creator. Because he is the creator, he is the source of everything including our existence. Out of love we were created and for love and goodness we are destined. We know this is the principle of our life, but we also like to challenge it as we use the gift of free will. As we challenge our creation, we make this creation imperfect, "chipped" away by our sins.

Second, it is in this moment that the second person of the Holy Trinity, Jesus Christ, comes to our rescue. Jesus is referred to as the Redeemer who came to "fix" what was broken by our disobedience. Jesus, who follows the pattern of human existence, overturns the consequences of sin by his total obedience to the Father and his love. As the Son of God, Jesus has knowledge of true love and of God's creation. He chose to follow this pattern even if it meant to die to himself as an act of total trust in the Creator.

Third, as creation is restored by the Redeemer, the Creator sends the one who will maintain the integrity of the creation, the Holy Spirit who is also referred to as the Sanctifier. It is the Spirit that continues to guide us and teach us. As Sanctifier, the Holy Spirit nurtures us, the Church, with the gifts of wisdom and understanding, piety and fear of the lord, with counsel, fortitude and knowledge. These gifts not only sanctify us, but also give us life. As we celebrate the Holy Trinity let us not only try to understand Three Persons as One God but let us also focus on the mission each of us has. Our journey to heaven is our Catholic Way of Life – are you part of it yet??? Are excited, or do you still search. Are you ready to choose between the cruise ship or the battle ship?

Celebrating the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

The dogma of faith which forms the object of the feast is this: There is one God and in this one God there are three Divine Persons; the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. Yet there are not three Gods, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is not more God than the Son, neither is the Son more God than the Holy Spirit. No mortal can fully fathom this sublime truth. But I submit humbly and say: *Lord, I believe, help my weak faith.*

Why is this feast celebrated at this particular time? It may be interpreted as a finale to all the preceding feasts. All three Persons contributed to and shared in the work of redemption. The Father sent His Son to earth, for "God so loved the world as to give His only-begotten Son." The Father called us to the faith. The Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, became man and died for us. He redeemed us and made us children of God. He ever remains the liturgist *par excellence* to whom we are united in all sacred functions. After Christ's ascension the Holy Spirit, however, became our Teacher, our Leader, our Guide, our Consoler. On solemn occasions a thanksgiving *Te Deum* rises spontaneously from Christian hearts.



This feast, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost, should make us mindful that actually every Sunday is devoted to the honor of the Most Holy Trinity, that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall in a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Blessed Trinity is bestowing upon us. The Father created and predestined us; on the first day of the week He began the work of creation. The Son redeemed us; Sunday is the "Day of the Lord," the day of His resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us His temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, therefore, is *the* day of the Most Holy Trinity.

Things to Do:

- Research symbols of the Trinity and create something for the centerpiece of your family table, or something for your family altar, such as a small banner or poster. It can be as little as a 4 x 6 photograph or something to use every year as a backdrop or wall hanging.
- Think of different foods to serve that can reflect the symbolism of the Trinity. One example is clover leaf rolls. These rolls are formed with three balls of dough put into one hole of the muffin tin for each roll.
 Search on the Internet for one of many examples.
- The Directory on Popular Piety explains some of the pious exercises related to the devotion of the Holy or Blessed Trinity. Three very simple prayers are the Sign of the Cross, *Gloria Patri* (Glory be to the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, etc.) and the *Trisagion* (meaning "thrice holy"): "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, Have mercy on us." This is just one version, there are many others.
