"I am with you always"

Over the past several months, I have heard and seen a few things about people questioning where God has been with the coronavirus pandemic. I find those questions interesting because that is not my experience with God. My questions have been more along the lines of "what is God trying to teach me" or in this case "teach the world?" Today we celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. The last line in the Gospel reading is "And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." Jesus is always present to us. If we are Christians, we must believe that is true. However, it does not stop us from asking questions. But it helps to if we ask the right questions. Because when we do not, we can remain lost and confused.

For two months, attending Mass together in the church was not possible. Some of us did have opportunities to gather in small groups to celebrate the Triduum and Sunday Liturgies so they could be streamed online. It was a blessing for us to be able to receive the Eucharist at those liturgies. And now, most of us have the opportunity to attend Mass as a community once again. To receive the Eucharist. Even though there continue to be restrictions, limited numbers thus the need to "sign up" for a Mass, the need to wear a mask in the church when we can't maintain "social distancing" from others, perhaps a time slot that isn't convenient to us, are you taking advantage of the opportunity?

There are places in the world, even in our own Diocese, where daily or even weekly Sunday Masses are not available in parishes. For example, in the Eagle Butte area, for several years, and continuing going forward, there is only one priest available to serve eight parishes. It is impossible for a single priest to provide a Mass in every parish on every weekend. For those parishioners that are able to, they must travel to a neighboring parish in order to attend Mass. All of us now have experienced what is normal in those parishes.

So if you are able to, but have not yet taken advantage of one of the many Masses available in our parish, call the office, sign up for Mass, even if it is not at the most convenient day or time for you, and go to Mass. As we hear Jesus say in the Gospel reading, that he is always with you, are you making yourself present to Jesus? We certainly can do that every day, no matter where we are, in our prayer life, in our actions. But we bring Jesus most joy, when we present ourselves to him, at the Mass. And when you are at Mass, ask God to reveal to you, what He is trying to teach you?

- 3. Health care providers in the family whose employment has resulted in financial hardships for the family.

- 5. Members with pre-existing medical conditions that has caused them to self-quarantine, resulting in financial hardship for the family.

Dismissal - Following our response of "Amen" to the final blessing, Mass is concluded with the dismissal, said by the priest or a deacon, using one of the following dismissal formulas:

- Go forth, the Mass is ended.
- Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord.
- Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.
- Go in peace.

The dismissal is a mandate by the Lord. While the Mass may be concluded, our real purpose now begins. We are to go and live as Catholic disciples of Jesus through our words and actions at home, at work or school, and with family and friends.

Our response at the dismissal remains the same: "Thanks be to God." What else can we do except give thanks to God? Our prayer of thanksgiving to the Lord is coming to an end. We have received the greatest gift possible in our hearts. We have encountered and received Jesus. We are filled with gratitude and thanksgiving. However, the encounter with the Lord is not finished. We really attend Mass in order to be in the presence of our God through His Son Jesus, who then sends us forth to be Christ in the world. This sending out, this commissioning by God, is the crucial conclusion of the Mass. It is the intentional desire of the Lord for his disciples to go out and be his Christ's light in this world, his living presence.

PENTECOST

Next weekend, the Church celebrates Pentecost, one of the most important feast days of the year that concludes the Easter season and celebrates the beginning of the Church.

The timing and origins of Pentecost

Pentecost always occurs 50 days after the death and resurrection of Jesus, and ten days after his ascension into heaven. Because Easter is a moveable feast without a fixed date, and Pentecost depends on the timing of Easter, Pentecost can fall anywhere between May 10 and June 13. The name of the day itself is derived from the Greek word "pentecoste," meaning 50th.

What happens at Pentecost?

In the Christian tradition, Pentecost is the celebration of the person of the Holy Spirit coming upon the Apostles, Mary, and the first followers of Jesus, who were gathered together in the Upper Room.

A "strong, driving" wind filled the room where they were gathered, and tongues of fire came to rest on their heads, allowing them to speak in different languages so that they could understand each other. It was such a strange phenomenon that some people thought the Christians were just drunk - but Peter pointed out that it was only the morning, and that the phenomenon was caused by the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit also gave the apostles the other gifts and fruits necessary to fulfill the great commission - to go out and preach the Gospel to all nations. It fulfills the New Testament promise from Christ (Luke 24:46-49) that the Apostles would be "clothed with power" before they would be sent out to spread the Gospel.

Where's that in the bible?

The main event of Pentecost (the strong driving wind and tongues of fire) takes place in **Acts 2:13**, though the events immediately following (Peter's homily, the baptism of thousands) continue through verse 41.

Happy Birthday, Church

It was right after Pentecost that Peter, inspired by the Holy Spirit, preached his first homily to Jews and other non-believers, in which he opened the scriptures of the Old Testament, showing how the prophet Joel prophesied events and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

He also told the people that the Jesus they crucified is the Lord and was raised from the dead, which "cut them to the heart." When they asked what they should do, Peter exhorted them to repent of their sins and to be baptized. According to the account in Acts, about 3,000 people were baptized following Peter's sermon.

For this reason, Pentecost is considered the birthday of the Church - Peter, the first Pope, preaches for the first time and converts thousands of new believers. The apostles and believers, for the first time, were united by a common language, and a common zeal and purpose to go and preach the Gospel.

Pentecost vestments and customs around the world

Priests will wear red vestments on Pentecost, symbolic of the burning fire of God's love and the tongues of fire that descended on the apostles.
