St. John Vianney, a patron saint of priests said once "The Saints did not begin well, but they all ended well." For various reasons at first, he was not seen as a worthy candidate for priesthood. He did not have much to offer, the family was not well off, and his wisdom and health did not promise much. More out of mercy that some gave him any chance. What St. John Vianney had was the faith that was handed down to him by his parents, and more than that, he also had a great love and respect for God. Once he discovered his vocation, he begun following it with great passion. Once he encountered the challenges he offered himself even more to God. His persistence paid off, as he was finally received into the ranks of holy orders. France, his home country was getting more and more laicized, more secular, and out of touch with its Christian roots. Soon after the ordination, St. John was assigned to a small-town parish, with experience yet to be gained. Needless to say, people were not taking him seriously, almost making a mockery of him. But the young priest would have none of it, he was not going to fight with same weapons as he was being attacked. Entrusting his life and ministry, he lifted the people of the town in prayer, faithfulness and love up to God. He went about the work as a priest and as a shepherd. As people begun to see his resilience and dedication to God and to them, they became curious about the reason of his dedication. They were never the same again.

This week, the Church celebrated the Feast of All Saints (November 01), followed by the Feast of All Souls. These two feasts help us to remember the saints from the past, our loved ones, and friends we have known in our lifetime. From the saints we learn how to live up to standards put forth by God and which are presented to us in the Sermon on the Mount – the Beatitudes. From their lives we learn of their struggles and sacrifices. Through their example we find joy in our lives and in our faith. It is the saints who help us understand today who we are as Catholics and Children of God. The lives of the saints and of our dearly beloved who have passed away help us also to look at the reasons why they were so faithful to God. It is the hope and love that they kept in their hearts, which they wished to share with us, to make our lives better and holier. We remember them, and we are called to express our identity as children of God in our own word and deed, as we are the "saints in making."

All holy men and women pray for us as we proclaim the Gospel with the Mercy of the Father.

One Minute Meditations

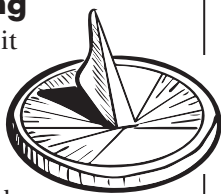
We never lose God's love

Have you ever had someone end a relationship with you because of a mistake you made or something you did wrong? It's a terrible feeling to lose someone's love, especially if it is your fault. Fortunately, God's love doesn't depend on how good we are. Remember the parable Jesus told of the prodigal son (Luke 15)? No matter what the son's transgressions, the father received him in complete love. That's how God feels about us.

God's timing

Sometimes it seems like no matter how much we pray, God doesn't hear us. It can be tempting to give up hope, but remember, God always answers prayer in His time. Each day, decide to trust God; His timing is perfect.

"But God, who is rich in mercy, because of the great love He had for us, even when we were dead in our transgressions, brought us to life with Christ" (Ephesians 2:4-5).



Turn to God during Advent

It may be hard to look forward to the holidays this year. Instead, use the time during Advent to *"Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God and there is no other ..."* (Isaiah 45:22).

Turn to God for strength. *"When you pass through the waters I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you"* (Isaiah 43:2). When outside events make you feel low, remember that God will always send the strength we need to overcome difficulties.

Turn to God for Faith. *"For our*

knowledge is imperfect and our prophecy is imperfect; but when the perfect comes, the imperfect will pass away" (1 Corinthians 13:9-10). During

difficult times, it can be hard

to be hopeful. Turn to God with the faith that He is with us now and has glorious plans for our future.

Turn to God to for love. *"I came to cast fire upon the earth; and would that it were already kindled!"* (Luke

12:49). Jesus wants to fill

our hearts with a fiery love like His. As we decorate our homes for Christmas, we can ask Jesus to fill our hearts with the warmth of His love.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

The Rosary is adapted from the complex prayers of medieval monks. It's a powerful prayer because in it, we ask Mary—whose prayers are never refused—to pray for us. In addition, the mysteries of the Rosary introduce us to the lives of



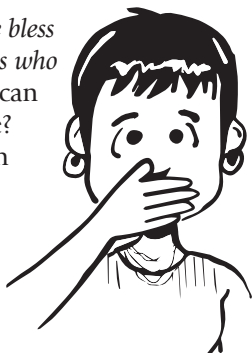
Why do Catholics pray the Rosary?

Jesus and Mary. Each mystery is associated with a fruit. For example, the fruit of the mystery of the Annunciation is humility. Praying the Rosary opens us to the graces so we can be more like Christ.

Does your tongue bless or curse?

"No human being can tame the tongue ... With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings who are made in the likeness of God" (James 3:8-9). How can we ensure that our tongues will bless and not curse?

Offer words in service. What we say out loud can reveal our true motives. Sometimes we just want to hear our own opinions or have others admire our insight and wisdom. We truly speak with love when we honestly intend to serve others rather than our own interests.



Lift up. Criticizing and pointing out another's faults is easy. It is an act of love to notice someone's positive attributes and possibly uncover previously unnoticed strengths.

Unify, don't divide. Our goal is always to build others up and bring them to God. If what we want to say is loving, instructive, and healing, it may be okay to speak. Otherwise, if it will cause unnecessary conflict or make someone else look bad, it's better left unsaid.

from Scripture

Mark 13:33-37, Keep watch!

In this reading, Jesus urges us to always be ready because *"You do not know when the time will come."* He wants us to be on the watch for Him.

Next month we celebrate Jesus' arrival at Christmas. He will come twice more for certain: at our death and at the end of time. Advent is the time to ask, "What do I need to do to be ready to greet the Lord?"

Start by doing your best to remain in a state of grace. When aware of having committed mortal sin, immediately seek

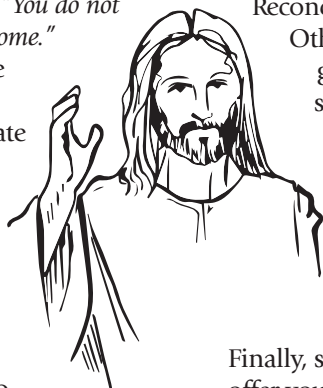
forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

Otherwise make a practice of going regularly – every four to six weeks, if possible. Consider examining your conscience and picking one or two sinful practices you want to eliminate.

Then attend or watch Mass weekly and try to spend more time in prayer.

Finally, see if there are ways you can offer yourself in service to others.

Keeping watch means fixing our eyes on God at all times. Then, when Christmas comes, you can greet the Lord with joy.



Q & A

What is the stealthy, Deadly Sin?

If you were asked to name one of the deadliest sins, what would you reply? Murder? Adultery? Lust? In fact, one of the deadliest – yet stealthiest – of the



Seven Deadly Sins is sloth or acedia. It's stealth because it is easy to overlook that we are committing it.

Laziness. "Acedia or spiritual sloth goes so far as to refuse the joy that comes from God and to be repelled by divine goodness" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2094). It means the sinner finds the attractions of this world more compelling than the glories of the next.

Ingratitude. The Creator of the universe loves us personally and showers us with blessings. Yet, we can "fail or refuse to acknowledge divine charity and to return Him love for love." Shopping for gifts, scrolling through social media, running errands – the spiritual sloth gives anything and everything priority over the love of God.

Feasts & Celebrations

November 1 – All Saints Day. The early Church celebrated the saints and martyrs throughout the year. However, Christian persecution became so intense, there weren't enough days in the calendar for individual commemorations. Pope Gregory IV designated Nov. 1 as All Saints Day.

November 4 – St. Charles Borromeo (1584). After earning doctorates in civil and canon law by the age of 21, he was named cardinal and bishop of Milan by Pope Pius IV. He worked to reform his diocese and cared for the poor and sick.

November 22 – Solemnity of Christ the King. God promised His people a king who will be triumphant over their enemies. Jesus is our King. In Baptism and Confirmation, we are brought under his kingship.

November 29 - 1st Sunday of Advent. During this four-week season, we anticipate the Messiah's birth, and look forward to Christ's reign and his coming on the last day. Catholics light candles in Advent wreaths each night to signal the coming of the true light of Christ.

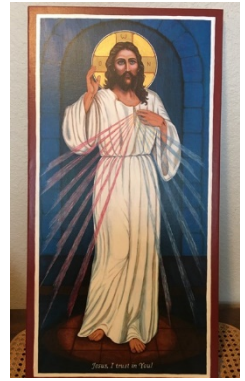

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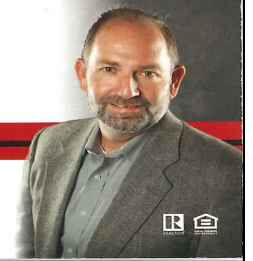
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
