"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor." (Luke 4:18)

This past Monday and Tuesday, I and many others have attended the great event for our local Church as Josh Lee was ordained for the transitional diaconate for our diocese. In few months another man, Robert Kinyon will be ordained as a deacon as well. With God's blessing, these two deacons will be ordained next year as priests for our diocese. On Monday evening, we have met with many at the St. Therese Church in Rapid City for an evening prayer and the Holy Hour with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. As I have reflected on my own vocation and the 21 years of the priesthood, I watched Jesus in Blessed Sacrament. At the same time, I watched Josh and his parents sitting next to him, praying with their son, a deacon, and a priest to be. I remembered my own day of ordination, the parents and guests and the many questions that have been racing through my mind. Can I do this? Should I do this? Why should I do this? What will happen next? How am I going to do this...? and so on. But as many questions as there were, there was also the peace of God's Spirit, the desire of the heart to follow Christ, and to discover more of my life and of myself.

In the Gospel today, Jesus returns to his own. By now, many know him and of him. Many see Jesus as famous due to his teaching and miracles they heard were performed in other towns. Jesus' neighbors and relatives welcome him with joy, and at the same time with the anticipation. Many of them grew up with Jesus, they shared time and fellowship with each other, they know each other's stories. They have probably shared with each other moments of joy and sorrow, meals, and time of rest. So, when Jesus comes to them and begins to preach, to teach and to challenge his old friends, and relatives, he is met with resentment. Probably because of the message, but also because he was suddenly recognized as someone different. Many had the image of Jesus that was imprinted on their minds as they met last time. I have to say, I experience this feeling every time I go back home. Many things remind me of the time past and yet, I feel sometimes more and more like a stranger.

Sharing one's life is an ongoing process, sometimes we succeed with it and sometimes we find out that we have a work to do. Sharing something that is personal, is even harder. Perhaps, that is one of the reasons that to share our faith is sometimes one of the hardest things in our life. To share our faith with relatives and friends is definitively a challenging task. As a Priest, I am called to proclaim the Gospel, as a friend I am expected to answer questions that are hard to ask, as a relative I am expected to provide solution, and as a disciple I trust that God, through the Mercy of Jesus and the Wisdom of the Holy Spirit will provide what I need to carry on the mission I was given. I encourage us all to pray for new vocations to priesthood and religious life, to holy marriages and for the courage to witness to our faith. We may feel for a moment as if we are out of place, but God will always provide the joy and hope.



"Each one of us is merely a small instrument. When you look at the inner workings of electrical

relationships. Choose to meet in person when possible. In person or online, we must be wise in the words we use.


Forgive those who have hurt you, help those who need you. Treat all people – including yourself – with love and compassion. When we treat people the way we want to be treated, life will instantly get better.

That encounter is our connection to God, who




Welcome back to Mass!

Now that many dioceses across the country have reinstated the obligation to attend Mass, we once again honor Sunday as a celebration of the living presence of Jesus in the midst of His people.

Meet Him in the flesh. The Eucharist is the body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ. There is no substitute for taking Him into our bodies to feed our souls.

Receive His protection. Divine love and protection are showered on God's children through the supernatural gift of grace. The



more open we are to it – by actively participating in Mass – the more we enjoy the benefits.

Love Him back. The Third Commandment requires that we designate Sunday as our day to honor God. Mass is the most important way we fulfill our obligation to show gratitude to God. "If you love me you will keep my commandments" (John 15:15).

John 6:1-15; Loaves and fishes

This Gospel passage records the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes. The crowds following Jesus were hungry, so Jesus asked Philip where they could get enough food. Philip calculated that two hundred days' wages still wouldn't buy enough food for them. Like Philip, we face problems that seem too big for us and can become intimidated.

The Apostle, Andrew, went a step further than Philip; he found the boy with five loaves of barley bread and two fish. The boy, in turn, offered to Jesus what little he brought – all of it. What a surprise when Jesus fed the

five thousand "as much...as they wanted." Even after they'd had their fill of bread, there were still twelve wicker baskets left over!

God can't be outdone in generosity.

When we are faced with many problems at once, it can be overwhelming. It's easy to react like
Philip and give up hope. While on our own, we may not have

much to offer, if we offer what we have to God, He can do something amazing with it.




July 16 – Our Lady of Mount Carmel (1251). Carmelite tradition holds that Our Lady appeared to St. Simon on Mount Carmel and gave him a scapular. Wearing one has become a popular way to honor the Blessed Mother.

July 22 – St. Mary Magdalene (1st century). Mary Magdalene was the woman from whom Jesus expelled seven demons in St. Luke's gospel (Luke 8:2). She helped to support Jesus' ministry out of her own money and stood by the Cross of Jesus with his mother. Known as the "Apostle to

the Apostles," Mary was the one who first informed the Apostles of Jesus' Resurrection.

July 25 – St. James (1st Century). When Jesus called St. James and his brother, John, to become apostles, they left their father in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. St. James was one of three apostles to witness Jesus' transfiguration,

the raising of Jairus' daughter, and the agony in Gethsemane. St. James was the first of the apostles to be martyred.

What is expected of Catholics?

Every household has basic ground rules: "Be respectful," "Clean up your messes," etc. This way, everybody benefits. Like every family, the Catholic Church has "house rules" as well:

Come home every weekend: "You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor." God wants to see us back in person – often!

Take responsibility: "You shall confess your sins at least once a year." Since we are prone to sin, we're obligated to reconcile with God at least once a year.

Reconnect: "You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season." In the Eucharist, Jesus nourishes us with his Body and Blood at every Mass!

Practice detachment: "You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church." Fasting helps us free our hearts for God's love.

Help around the house: "You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church." Whether we donate money, time or resources, every little bit helps. (CCC, #2042-2043)

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


I'm struck by phrases in today's first and second readings: The prophet Ezekiel is told that those to whom he will be sent are "hard of face and obstinate of heart"; and Saint Paul aptly describes a "thorn in the flesh" as having been given to him. He even refers to this thorn as "an angel of Satan." These are descriptive images! So, I wondered, What do these images look like in practice? The Gospel gives us a clear example: those who grew up with Jesus refuse to see him as a prophet. At one time in my life, I might have said to myself: "Wow, I can't believe people of his own time would reject Jesus!" However, as I grow older, I'm conscious not only of more physical aches and pains, but the "thorn in the flesh" of patterns I'm not particularly proud of - cynicism, pessimism, even hard-heartedness and a closed mind. The "they" in today's readings hits closer to home and strikes me more as "we" than it used to. And yet, as Saint Paul reminds us, we can bring our imperfections to God and pray for grace to give us strength in our weakness, hearts open to God's love, and ears ready to hear the Gospel and be transformed by Jesus.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When Jesus returned to his hometown, he was not exactly greeted like a "hometown hero." His contemporaries could see him only as a carpenter, and not the Messiah: "So he was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith." We know that Jesus went on to perform the mightiest of deeds - dying and rising from the dead. And yet, even today, he would be "amazed at our lack of faith." Today's Gospel and the other readings encourage us to do a check-up of our spiritual health and pray for the grace to continue to grow in faith. We can also pray for others who may be questioning or have lost their faith, inviting them to consider coming to church with us or simply offering to pray with and for them.

REFLECT For a more intentional look at whatever thorns might be in your side, and what weaknesses those contribute to, consider doing a retreat. Attend an in-person retreat at a local retreat house, or look into online options for a guided retreat at home.
