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“I will take the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord.” (Ps. 116)

The Solemnity of the Body and Blood of the Lord – or as it was traditionally called, *Corpus Christi* – was originally celebrated on the Thursday following the Trinity Sunday. Thursday was chosen because of its connection with Holy Thursday, when our Blessed Lord instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper. Sometime after this Feast was established in the Church (in the Thirteenth Century), the Christian people developed customs by which they could show honor to Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament and give thanks and praise for this great gift. This is when the custom of Corpus Christi processions began. Some of you might remember this custom from years ago. Sadly, however, it has vanished from many places around the world. Sometime after this Feast was established in the Church (in the Thirteenth Century), the Christian people developed customs by which they could show honor to Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament and give thanks and praise for this great gift. This is when the custom of Corpus Christi processions began. Some of you might remember this custom from years ago. Sadly, however, it has vanished from many places around the world.

In the first reading today, Moses reminds the Hebrew people of the great gift the Lord gave them as they wandered in the desert after their deliverance from Egypt: the gift of holy manna – mysterious bread which fell from heaven to feed them and sustain them as they waited to enter the land of promise.

The celebration of Corpus Christi reminds us of an infinitely greater gift from God: the gift of the true Body and Blood of his only Son to be our food and drink, nourishing our souls and bodies as we await our promised land, eternal happiness in heaven. That is why we gather today to sing praise, to rejoice and to give thanks – the word *Eucharist* literally means *thanksgiving*.

And what are we giving thanks for? We are thanking God for what is arguably the greatest mystery of our Faith – a mystery which theologians have given the name *transubstantiation*: that in the Eucharist, ordinary bread and wine are miraculously transformed in their very substance – their very essence – into the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. The reality of bread and wine ceases to be, while the accidents (all the non-essential qualities) remain. When you and I receive Holy Communion, we eat and drink what appear to be a little wafer of bread and a sip of wine. We are receiving the living God, Jesus Christ our Lord – his Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, whole and entire. What a tremendous gift! And what a tremendous mystery. All this seems to defy reason. It certainly goes against what our senses perceive, and it has been the cause of terrible divisions among the Christian people. So why do we Catholics persist in clinging to this troublesome and seemingly outdated doctrine? We do so for a very simple reason: We have decided to take Jesus at his word; to believe that what he says is simply and literally true. And we hear his word at every Mass when the priest repeats what Jesus said at the Last Supper – words taken from Saint Paul's first letter to the Corinthians: “This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.” “This chalice is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.”

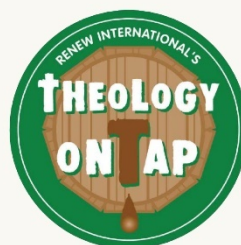

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Ex 24:3-8 | Heb 9:11-15 | Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It takes only a few moments of holding one's breath to realize how desperately we need oxygen to survive. If only we were always as cognizant and mindful of the importance of the Eucharist for the same reason! I, for one, confess to approaching the altar with fervent belief in the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Christ, but also at times doing so while distracted or not fully appreciative of the gift being given to me. But today's solemnity is a powerful reminder not to take the Eucharist for granted. It is the Church's formal and official homage to Jesus Christ who, "with his own blood" obtained for us eternal redemption. St. Thomas Aquinas offers this description of how wonderful, precious, and important the Eucharist is with the following words: "The only-begotten Son of God, wishing to enable us to share in his divinity, assumed our nature, so that by becoming man he might make us gods." (Opusc. 57, 1-4) Like the disciples on the night of the Last Supper, we, too, receive the body and blood of Jesus under the appearance of bread and wine. He dwells within us, intercedes for us, and through grace he transforms us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Spending time with our Lord at Eucharistic adoration is a profound opportunity to open our hearts to him. Just as we know that we cannot love others well if we don't love ourselves, likewise we cannot share the love of Christ with others well if we don't take time to allow Christ to enter our hearts and our lives. By taking the time to talk to Jesus and listen, we can, in turn, witness to his love to others. We can use this time to pray for a specific person, seek help with a personal dilemma, or ask the Lord to show us where we need repentance and conversion in our own lives so as to be more like him. The more we are conformed to Christ, the better we can bring Christ to the world.

Make a difference to your parish

The Catholic parish is a place of wonder and awe. It is in the arms of our parish that we experience God's love, and share it with others. Each parishioner is important to a parish, especially now. Consider these ideas to make a difference to yours:

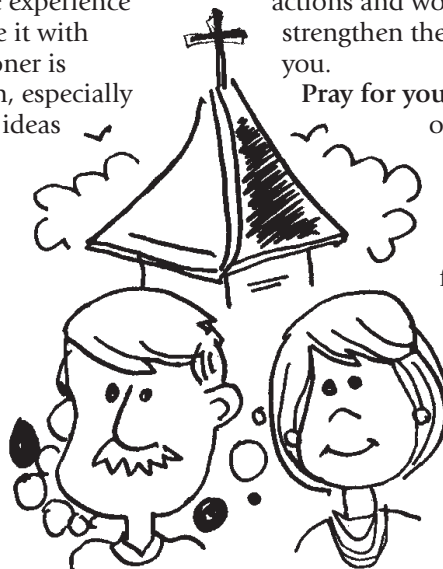
Boost the faith of others. Even the strongest Catholics can sometimes falter

Pray for your parish. This is one of the most important contributions you can make. Join parish intentions to your own in daily prayer. Pray for parish ministries. Offer prayers for your priests and parish staff.

Build it, serve it, or pay for it. When there is a need in the parish, don't wait for an invitation. Your parish family depends upon your efforts.

Help it grow. Invite friends, coworkers, or neighbors to join you in worship. Your parish might be the spiritual home they've been searching for.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do priests wear a white collar?

The white collar or "Roman collar," dates back to the 15th century when priests placed linen or cotton collars over their outer clothing to be easily distinguished. This evolved into the collar we see on most priests today when wearing their black "clerics."



According to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), "Outside liturgical functions, a black suit and Roman collar are the usual attire for priests." When wearing a white collar, it means he's "on duty" to give blessings, offer counsel, and administer Sacraments.

Savor a saintly summer

The slower pace of summer offers opportunities to nurture faith in creative ways not feasible in hectic times. Consider these ideas:

Visit a shrine. Holy places where relics are preserved, an apparition has taken place, or one that encourages a particular belief or devotion offer opportunities for prayer and pilgrimage. Look for directories of shrines in the U.S., including www.catholicshrines.net or from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) <http://ow.ly/OYvJ30bAayl>.

Attend daily Mass. Meeting God in the

Eucharist begins a summer day with grace. Daily Mass is a full Catholic immersion in Christ, in the Sacraments, and the saints, all at once.

Gather with other Catholics. As we emerge from pandemic conditions, spending time with other Catholic friends can provide a community of faith-filled companions. Attend Mass together, socialize together, brainstorm Gospel-centered life solutions together.

Look for signs of God's love. Find a park or green space near you where you can center your heart and mind on Jesus. Observe His creation and become more aware of His presence.



from Scripture

Mark 5:21-43, Faith in action.

As the leader of the local synagogue, Jairus was probably pressured by the Pharisees to avoid or reject Jesus. It was a courageous act for him to publicly approach Jesus, bow before him, and beg for a cure for his daughter. Jairus' faith in Jesus was that strong.

On the way to Jairus' home, Jesus was delayed by a woman with a serious hemorrhage. According to Jewish law, her constant bleeding would have excluded her from most social contact. She thought Jesus wouldn't want to touch her and secretly grabbed His cloak



believing that any contact would cure her. In fact, she was cured, but Jesus told her that it was her faith that provided the cure. We should never allow fear of our unworthiness to keep us from God. By the time Jesus finished with the woman, Jairus was told of his daughter's death. Jesus simply said, "Do not be afraid; just have faith" (Mark 5:36), and Jairus' great faith was rewarded. No matter how desperate your situation may appear, trust Jesus to help. Even death is under His control.

Q & A

Is there really such thing as sin?

Dealing with sin is uncomfortable and following God's rules is hard. The world tells us that sin doesn't exist. While we may think we are "good" and others may look up to us, eventually God will decide if we have been "good." Since His opinion is the one that matters, His rules rule.

Sin is real. The world tells us that sin doesn't exist but Catholics know that "sin is a deliberate thought, word, deed, or omission contrary to the eternal law of God." (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*) The law can be found in the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes, and in Scripture. The law says sin is real.

Unconfessed sin separates us from God. "For you have hidden your face from us and have delivered us up to our guilt" (Isaiah 64:6). Avoiding guilt means missing God's forgiveness. Each evening, examine the day's actions and ask if they would please God or not. Resolve to do better and take steps to change. Seek absolution through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.



Feasts & Celebrations

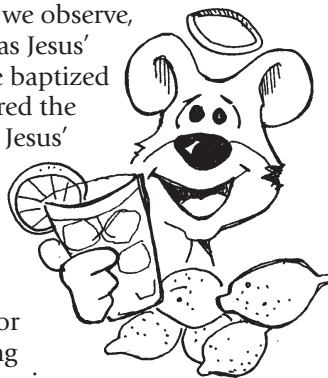
June 11 - Sacred Heart of Jesus. The image of Jesus with His heart exposed in unquenchable flame is a reminder of His intense and eternal love for us.

June 22 - Immaculate Heart of Mary. In response to a request by Our Lady of Fatima, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to Mary's gentle and devout Immaculate Heart in 1942, and initiated this feast in 1945.

June 21 - St. Aloysius Gonzaga (1591). St. Aloysius prayed vigorously and fasted from age 7. Upon joining the Society of Jesus, he was ordered to cut back on penance in order to

study and spend time with the other students. He died while nursing the sick.

June 24 - Nativity of St. John the Baptist. The only saint whose birth and death we observe, St. John was Jesus' cousin. He baptized and prepared the people for Jesus' coming. He even baptized Jesus and was later executed for denouncing Herod's marriage to his sister-in-law.
