
(John 12:24-25)

We are only two weeks form the Easter celebrations that begin with the Passion and Death of Christ. That Passion of Christ will be brought into life when we celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation, the Sacraments of Life on Easter Vigil as we will welcome new members into our community of love and share with them in the communion of love. These last two weeks we will focus on the meaning of Christ's sacrifice for us, on the reason God sent His Son to us. In the first reading we hear how much God wants us to be one with Him. This is possible only through the sacrifice of the Messiah and the change of our hearts. The Gospel passage speaks of a "grain of wheat that must die." That "grain" is Christ, but also it is each one of us as we are baptized into Christ and into His Passion and Death.

This concept is expressed in a Greek word, 'Metanoia,' which means a change of heart. Sometimes we hear this concept being used in reference to our sins, but in reality, it is a much stronger word. It talks about a complete change a change in our relationship to God. It is a kind of "extreme makeover" of our lives. The principle of this change is how we perceive the world and ourselves in reference to the love God has offered us. The Metanoia requires from us total trust in opening our heart to the true love of God, the communion of love and the community of love. But because of our human experience of love, we find ourselves being held back from the full experience of the love of God. Our world distorts the true meaning of love and thus interferes with true change of heart. God has invited us to trust Him (community of love), even if we are questioning ourselves. God is seriously calling us to Metanoia, to real change of heart, which is expressed in the gift of the life and sacrifice of Jesus (communion of love). It is Jesus who becomes the "grain" that dies so that others may live. We will hear on Good Friday, "o necessary death...," a statement that reminds us that Resurrection cannot come unless we trust, unless we "die to ourselves." Christ has a total trust in the will of the Father when he prays on behalf of the people for whom He is about to die on the cross (John 17:1-26). Let us learn from Jesus as we are preparing for the celebrations of the Holy Week. Fr. Andrzei

"I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes." [1 Corinthians 11:23-26]

Brothers and Sisters,

With these words St. Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians instructs the Church in Corinth about the awesome mystery of the Eucharist which makes the death and resurrection of the Lord present to his disciples. St. Paul knew from the Lord himself how important the Eucharist is: a sacrament that feeds us with his body, blood, soul and divinity! In the Mass Our Lord makes himself present so that we can receive him and be transformed by him. There is no sacrament more powerful or important than the Eucharist!

The Lord Jesus did not come to us virtually, but in flesh and blood. When he returned to the Father after accomplishing our salvation, he made his life, miracles and ministry — and especially his passion, death, and resurrection — pass over into the sacred mysteries which we more commonly refer to as the sacraments. Each of the seven sacraments is an important encounter with Christ, but the most important and powerful of the sacraments is the Eucharist. There is no more intense way of encountering the Lord than the Eucharist, which is why he commanded us to celebrate and receive him in the Mass.

With the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, steps needed to be taken to keep people safe and healthy. We took this new virus seriously and put into place protocols and restrictions after listening to the advice of medical professionals. I want to thank you for your cooperation as we worked our way through the many challenges of the pandemic.

Now that vaccines are increasingly available and more and more people are being vaccinated, we can see the light at the end of the tunnel and make preparations to resume our normal activities — especially gathering to celebrate and receive the Eucharist.

After much prayer and reflection, I have decided that the time has come to reinstitute the Obligation to attend Sunday and Holy Day Mass. As your bishop I have a deep concern not only for your physical safety but also for your spiritual welfare. Sunday Mass is the heart of our Catholic life. The Eucharist is an irreplaceable gift given to us by the Lord himself and an essential part of our relationship with him.

I am grateful that we have been able to use modern technology to broadcast Masses from our Cathedral and parish churches so that we could maintain as much connection with each other as possible during this past year. I want to thank our priests and deacons and many of you who have generously made those broadcasts possible. They have been, and are, a wonderful way for our sick and vulnerable brothers and sisters to be with us when gathering in person is not safe.


Now that many of us are shopping and dining out safely, how can I not remind you that we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass?

It is time to come back to church.

And so, at the beginning of Holy Week on Palm Sunday I am reinstating the Sunday Obligation. I urge those of you who do not have underlying conditions or other risk factors to join your brothers and sisters in marking this holiest week of the year by participating in the liturgies of Holy Week and by making a good confession before Easter comes. Together we can once again proclaim Jesus Christ's victory over sin and death and receive the new life only he can give us by receiving him in the Eucharist. Because the obligation to attend Mass never applies to those who are ill or at risk or who might pose a risk to those they care for, I have included a list of exceptions to the Sunday Obligation. If you find yourself in one of the situations listed, please stay home and stay safe.

As your bishop I want you to know Jesus and be strong in your faith, so that all of western South Dakota will be drawn to the Lord by the witness of your life. There is no better way for that to happen than for you to have the Eucharist at the center of your life. God bless you and those you love during this holy season and God Bless the Diocese of Rapid City.

Fifth Sunday of Lent

Jer 31:31-34 | Heb 5:7-9 | Jn 12:20-33



Recent news warned of a shortage of seeds this spring, as home gardeners carry on a hobby borne of the coronavirus pandemic. Even those of us not exactly known for our green thumbs jumped in, seeing home gardens as a way not only to stock our pantries, but to sow hope during a time of isolation and, for too many, mourning. In today's readings, we are reminded of an even larger hope - one that transcends optimism and feeling, and is centered in the theological virtue of Hope. God holds us close even on the most challenging of days. We see this in Jeremiah's prophecy of a new covenant, where all shall know God and our sins will be washed away. And today's Gospel reminds us that Jesus, like the grain of wheat, dies so that we may have new life. As we plant our seeds this spring, we will undoubtedly remember the people and things we have lost. Yet, as shoots break through with the warmth of spring, we can be reminded of Jesus, the source of all hope, and his promise that "I will draw everyone to myself."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we approach Holy Week, the Gospel prepares us by reminding us that Jesus, like a grain of wheat, must die so that we may have new life: "Whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life." I don't think that John is telling us to wallow in sadness or live joyless lives. Instead, perhaps he is encouraging us to "lose" those things that are not life-giving and instead focus on what draws us closer to Jesus – such as prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Perhaps as we continue our Lenten journey, we can identify the obstacles that get between us and Jesus, or that divide our families and communities. By letting those go, we free ourselves to be more like Christ, and to share the Good News of God's great love for us with others.

ACTION Buy a packet of seeds (if you can find one). Plant seeds in memory of loved ones who may have died this past year, or in remembrance of any type of loss you or your loved ones may have suffered. Offer prayers of thanksgiving for Jesus, the source of our hope.



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
