Jubilation from John

Last Saturday, I enjoyed a day-retreat with fourteen of your fellow parishioners who were completing the 21-week ChristLife evangelization process. Our day kicked off with praise and worship, followed by the testimony by a young man in his mid-twenties who had spent a couple years ministering on the streets of Denver. He shared that he really didn't have anything to give to the homeless and abandoned—he really couldn't solve their problems—but in his own poverty and helplessness, he found the presence of God and shared God's all-powerful presence with the people he encountered. He discovered the truest meaning of St. Paul's testimony to the Corinthians: "I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Cor 12:10).

On this Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, we encounter the truest meaning of power and authority, of strength and might. Jesus Christ enters Jerusalem amid the accolades of a tumultuous crowd—waving palm branches, lining the roadway with their cloaks, and crying out, "Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come!" (Mk 11:10). Despite his humble appearance riding on the colt of an ass, Jesus is acclaimed as a great warrior and king like David—whose power and authority, strength and might would overthrow the tyranny of the Romans and free the Jews from their occupation.

The pair of Gospel readings proclaimed on this Sunday quickly moves from the accolades of the crowd to their condemnation. During the intervening week, Jesus shows the Jewish people the true source of tyranny in their midst and the occupying force that holds them captive. He goes to the temple and drives out the merchants of sacrifice, overturning the tables of the moneychangers. He walks about the temple area, challenging the authority of the chief priests and scribes and elders with pointed parables. He foretells the ultimate destruction of the temple, the very heart of their religious practice—and reveals to them the true heart of the religion of Abraham and Isaac and Jacob, love of God and love of neighbor.

Such a disappointing warrior and king! Where was the display of power and authority, the demonstration of strength and might that they had hoped for on Palm Sunday? As the Passion of Christ is recounted to us, we discover and rediscover the answer: *on the Cross.* Like the young man on the streets of Denver, we discover and rediscover in the Passion the true power and authority, strength and might of Christ: "He emptied himself... becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil 2:7-8). In that self-emptying, in that sacrifice, in that weakness, Jesus Christ overcame the tyranny of death and the occupation of sin that holds us captive. And because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name above every name: Jesus Christ is Lord!



CHRISM MASS — 'THE MOST OUTSTANDING VISIBLE SIGN OF THE CHURCH INSTITUTED BY CHRIST' MARCH 29 AT 11 AM AT THE CATHEDRAL

Bishop Peter, joined by the priests of the diocese will celebrate the annual Chrism Mass at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Perpetual Help — a celebration that includes the blessing of oils and the renewing of priestly promises. The Mass will be live streamed to the diocesan website and the diocesan Facebook page.

Bishop Muhich will bless the three oils that will be used in sacraments in the diocese during the coming year. The first two oils — the Oil of the Sick and the Oil of the Catechumen — consist of olive oil and are blessed in the same way holy water is blessed. The Oil of the Sick is used in anointing the head and hands of those who are seriously and chronically ill to give them spiritual strength to fight in their weakened condition. The Oil of the Catechumens is used in the sacrament of baptism, meant to provide strength for discipleship. The third oil — the Sacred Chrism — is olive oil mixed with balsam and is consecrated by the bishop during this liturgy. The bishop also breathes on the oil, which is symbolic of the Holy Spirit. When someone is anointed with the Sacred Chrism, they become one with Christ. It is used in baptisms and confirmations. The priests also renew their priestly vows of ordination including obedience to the bishop, and his successors, and fidelity to the Gospel and magisterium of the church.

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Mk 14:1—15:47 or Mk 15:1-39

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

From early childhood, I remember Palm Sunday – there was a kind of excitement about receiving the fresh palms, followed by the somber reading of the Passion. The contrast strikes me: While the palms, in ancient times, symbolized goodness and victory, hope and triumph, the account of Jesus' suffering and death reminds us of the price he paid for our redemption. Jesus knew that we can't have one without the other. It is the paradox of the cross: Jesus gave his life so that we might live. For many, the past year has been like one long Good Friday, filled with discouragement, suffering, and loss. As we reflect on Jesus' passion, the palms we carry home remain a sign of hope; we know now how the story will end. As we place our palms in a special place, let us say a prayer of thanks to Jesus and ask for the grace to renew our faith and trust in God as we enter Holy Week.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

There is a richness in the liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil that is both humbling and uplifting. This time period, known as the Sacred Triduum (Latin for "three days"), is the official end of Lent, and the summit of the liturgical year. As a society, we give far more attention to the buildup and celebration of Christmas - which is not to deny its importance, of course! - and so sometimes the Triduum is not as familiar to people in both its meaning and importance. Yet, it is during these days that we most intentionally remember and celebrate the gift of our redemption; we liturgically embrace the paschal mystery of Christ: dying he destroyed our death, and rising he restored our life. We have faced a difficult year together, and we rely on each other for prayer. As we continue through this Holy Week, perhaps we can accompany each other by attending the services with one another, or at least setting aside complementary prayer time on our own.

PRAY A local Eagle Scout built a beautiful outdoor Stations of the Cross at a college campus near us. Visit your parish or outdoor stations and reflect on each one. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has excellent resources for praying the stations: www.usccb.org.
