#### "Can you drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" (Mk 10:38)

### Jubilation from John

This Sunday's Gospel brings to my mind an old hymn from my Methodist upbringing: "Are ye able," said the Master, "To be crucified with me?" "Yea," the sturdy dreamers answered, "To the death we'll follow Thee." As I reflected on the Gospel and its connection to "Are Ye Able," I realized that what intrigued me in the old hymn was the phrase "sturdy dreamers." Dreamers are seldom described as sturdy. Their dreams are often as fragile as the mists of the night—blowing away with the first freshening of the morning breeze, seldom standing up to the gusts of the afternoon wind.

But James and John weren't just dreamers—they were *sturdy dreamers*, inspired by their experience of Christ, truly wanting to share in His glory. They persevered in their dream—James was the first apostle to be martyred for the dream and John grew to fathom its depths more than any of the Gospel writers, translating the dream into his Gospel of spirit and life. Indeed, they were *sturdy dreamers*.

This Sunday, the Church throughout the world—including in our diocese—kicks off a three-year process entitled "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission." The process will culminate with the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in October 2023. However, the synod process begins right here, right now in our diocese and in our parish.

Ancient Christians developed a custom of local leaders coming together to pray and make decisions about matters affecting all the Christian communities in a region. These gatherings came to be called "synods" and began a tradition of regional synods for bishops, as well as larger ones called "ecumenical councils." Over time, ecumenical councils continued to be called, most recently Vatican II in 1962-1965, but regional synods diminished in importance.

Pope Francis has shown special interest in synodality—on coming together and journeying together—on a broader basis and in more ancient terms than minimally the worldwide Synod of Bishops that assembles every three years. In 2015, the Holy Father said, "A synodal Church is a Church which listens," pointing out that mutual listening has been the goal of much of the church's renewal since Vatican II. Harkening back Christ's words to the Twelve in today's Gospel reading, Pope Francis declared, "For the disciples of Jesus, yesterday, today and always, the only authority is the authority of service, the only power is the power of the cross."

The current "Synod on Synodality" is the culmination of the effort to bring a greater degree of openness, collaboration, and mutual listening to the church. Unlike previous synods, this one officially begins locally, with opportunities for mutual consultation at every level and among many different church organizations. As the preparatory document emphatically states, "By journeying together and reflecting together on the journey that has been made, the Church will be able to learn through Her experience which processes can help Her to live communion, to achieve participation, to open Herself to mission."

Where will this journey lead us? What steps are along the way? What pitfalls and challenges await us? Addressing these questions requires you and me to be *sturdy dreamers* like James and John, listening to the Holy Spirit, who like the wind "blows where it wills; you do not know where it comes from or where it goes" (Jn 3:8). All the Master is asking us today at the beginning of our journey together is, "Are ye able?" Keep the Faith!
