Philippians 2:6-8


The Lenten season is almost over, and we are at the beginning of the Holy Week celebrations. With Palm Sunday, we are called to reflect on our spiritual journey when with anxious hearts we have been awaiting the glorious day of the resurrection. Throughout this Lent, following the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we have been reflecting on our journey with Christ as we form and reflect on our conscience. The Gospel passage for the procession with the palms at the beginning of the liturgy recalls the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. For the past three years people were listening to him, following him, and looking forward to hearing of their redeemer to come. So, it is not a surprise that they were overjoyed when Jesus finally "claimed" his place in the history of the chosen nation, but it only took them a few days to be shaken and calling for his crucifixion. However, the challenge and the message of Jesus prevail in the hearts of those who focus, not only on the temporary rewards of this life, but also on the truth of redemption and liberation that takes place in the reality of our faith. In our mission of reaching beyond the Lent, do we see ourselves as part of a greater community, the community we call the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church? Jesus spoke of the Kingdom, but that was the Kingdom of God; he wanted the people to be free, but with the freedom that could not be taken away. Martyrs have witnessed to that freedom throughout the centuries. Saints have called for it in their actions and wisdom. Today we are reminded that what Jesus did as he died on the cross was not for his glory, but for our salvation.

In many ways, we, too, get excited about our faith, traditions, and practices. Through "joyful hospitality, lively faith and dedicated discipleship" we build and live our Catholic Way of Life. In many ways we want to be true disciples of Christ and enjoy the rewards of eternal life and peace in the Kingdom of God. The Church in her wisdom and her experience of encountering Christ invites us to diligently recall and remember the events that lead to the fulfillment of Christ's mission. Jesus' words are fulfilled in his action and sacrifice. The Triduum is the shortest Liturgical Season in the life of the Church, but it reminds us of the most important aspects of our faith: Holy Thursday – the Eucharist and Priesthood and service; Good Friday – the Passion and Death of Jesus; and Holy Saturday – the Vigil of the Resurrection and New Life. We are truly blessed that we can be part of these celebrations as we are anxious to be nurtured by the grace of God. In our own ways let us come together to support Jesus, not only to welcome him into our lives but also to be there for him as he is walking those final steps for our salvation. I invite you to make time for Jesus in this Holy Week, even if our Lenten journey was not so perfect, let us come to Jesus knowing that he only wants us to be made whole again.



## PONTIFICAL GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

Every year on Good Friday, a collection is taken up in Catholic Churches to support the work of the Franciscans working in the Holy Land. Christians there rely heavily on the help that comes to them from this worldwide collection. Bishop Peter Muhich has asked that special attention be paid to the struggling Christians in the Holy Land this year.

The Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America is part of a world-wide network of Commissariats of the Holy Land which function as bridges between the Holy Land and Christians all over the world. The Franciscan Monastery in Washington, D.C., coordinates this vital support for the work of the Franciscans who work in the Holy Land.

The Franciscans of the Custody of the Holy Land have the unique responsibility to care for the Holy Places as well for the "Living Stones," the Christians living there. It is vital that we support Christians living in the Holy Land, in order to maintain a Christian presence in the very land made holy by the life, death and Resurrection of Jesus.

## THE PONTIFICAL GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION IS APPLIED TO THESE PROGRAMS:

## Faith, Memory & Culture – The Holy Places

Holy Land Franciscans and staff maintain the holy places and shrines. This enables those who live in the Holy Land and those who visit to deepen their faith and their spiritual and cultural connection to salvation history.

## **Social & Charitable Activities**

In order to assist Christians to remain in the Holy Land, including the poor and young couples, the Custody builds thousands of residential units. Additionally, they build senior care facilities. Medical assistance is provided for the needy.

#### **Educational & Scientific Activities**

The Franciscans operate and support schools open to all, regardless of religion or nationality. They provide scholarships for young men to answer the call to become Franciscan priests and brothers. Additionally, Franciscan archaeologists pursue ongoing research at the Holy Places.

## **Pastoral Activities**

The Franciscans provide pastoral care in 29 parishes in the Holy Land offering worship, Christian formation, and necessary youth and family programs, especially in regions affected by war.

## **Liturgical, Ecumenical and Communications Programs**

The Christian Media Center tells the story of the Holy Land through multimedia distributed throughout the world in more than seven languages. The friars organize liturgical celebrations for local Christians and pilgrims and share with other Christian communities in the Holy Land in ongoing ecumenical cooperation.

## Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Lk 22:14—23:56 or Lk 23:1-49

## GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Palm Sunday can seem like a study in contrasts. We hear the jubilant account of Jesus riding triumphantly into Jerusalem. Then we listen to the Passion narrative, reminded that Jesus' kingship bears little resemblance to royalty as we perceive it. He will suffer and he will die. As Paul describes it, "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him." Jesus tries to explain this to the disciples, who don't fully grasp the events about to take place, instead quarreling over who would be the greatest. Yet even in this chaos of misunderstanding, Jesus continues to teach them, promising that those who stand by him in his trials will join him in the kingdom of heaven. There are certainly times when we fail to fully perceive and understand all that the Lord is teaching us, or why we are undergoing certain trials and difficulties. As we enter into Holy Week, we can ask Jesus to help us understand the meaning of the cross in our own lives, using this time to reflect on the meaning of his sacrifice for each of us.

#### **GO** EVANGELIZE

## PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we listen to the Passion narrative, we hear Peter betray Jesus, the soldiers jeer at him, and a passer-by being told to carry Christ's cross. Only Luke's account describes the two criminals, one of whom demanded that Jesus "save yourself and us." The second criminal rebukes him, asking Jesus to "remember me when you come into your kingdom." After Jesus dies, the centurion glorifies God, a good man takes him down from the cross, the women prepare his body for burial. As we enter Holy Week, we will have time to reflect on Jesus' last days, but also on the individuals in the crowd the day he died. How did they react? How would we have reacted? What can we learn from the women who stayed beside Jesus, the criminal who looked beyond his own pain and sin to see Jesus as Messiah, and even Peter in his initial betrayal? During the week ahead, we can also make an effort to attend each liturgy of the Triduum, using this time to deepen our faith as we prepare for Easter.

PRAYER Take time to read the Passion narrative at home. Invite Jesus into your heart. If you've fallen a little behind on your Lenten commitments, Holy Week is a great time to hit refresh.
