"In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets; in these last days, he has spoken to us through the Son."

(Hebrew 1:1-2)

During Christmas celebration, our attention has been drawn in many ways to our families. It is the family that gives us in many reasons to do extraordinary things in sometimes very challenging ways and times. It is the family of Mary and Joseph that Jesus, our Emmanuel is born into. The church teaches that the Christian family is the first school of faith, a kind of mini-church into which God has placed us. It is the first place where we experience intimate and loving relationships and can practice the art of sharing love. So it's only natural that family relationships are central to a right relationship with God. Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, "The relationships within the family bring an affinity of feelings, affections and interests, arising above all from the members' respect for one another. The family is a privileged community called to achieve a "sharing of thought and common deliberation by the spouses as well as their eager cooperation as parents in the children's upbringing." (CCC 2206)

It is very encouraging that God provides for us an image of a family where both love and discouragement are present, where trust and disappointments have taken place, where hurt and gift of mercy and forgiveness are practiced. "The Christian family constitutes a specific revelation and realization of ecclesial communion, and for this reason it can and should be called a domestic church." It is a community of faith, hope, and charity; it assumes singular importance in the Church, as is evident in the New Testament. (CCC 2204) Into this family, just like many of the families today "Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Joseph and Mary. The Church is nothing other than "the family of God." From the beginning, the core of the Church was often constituted by those who had become believers "together with all [their] household." When they were converted, they desired that "their whole household" should also be saved. These families who became believers were islands of Christian life in an unbelieving world." (CCC 1655)

As we remember the Holy Family of Mary Joseph and Jesus, we are fully aware that we still have many reasons to search for better response to the love of God in our life. In many ways today's family (our blood family and the spiritual family-the Church) is being challenged, diminished and judged by standards that not always come from God. It is then our great opportunity to return to God the gift of His Love by our resolution to aspire to live out our Baptismal call to the best of our abilities as we live our Catholic Way of Life. The love of God to His Church is made visible in the love of husband and wife, parents and children, love for those who live alone yet in the midst of us all – the Family of God. "It is here that the father, the mother, children, and all members of the family exercise the priesthood of the baptized in a privileged way "by the reception of the sacraments, prayer and thanksgiving, the witness of a holy life, and self-denial and active charity." Thus, the home is the first school of Christian life and "a school for human enrichment." Here one learns endurance and the joy of work, fraternal love, generous - even repeated - forgiveness, and above all divine worship in prayer and the offering of one's life." (CCC 1657)

I give praise to God for my family and thank you all for being my Family as we generously show hospitality through our lively faith and as dedicated disciples of the Messiah, Living the Mission of the Church.

# **Welcome Todd Vandermay**

Todd Vandermay is a senior at Immaculate Heart Seminary in Winona, MN. He will be visiting our parish the first week in January.

Todd Vandermay was on the edge. Following his graduation from high school, he had decided



he was headed off to college – but his faith wouldn't be making the trip with him. Had it not been for an insightful group of sixth graders, Vandermay may never have found himself here, finishing his final year at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary.

Vandermay, grew up on a farm in rural South Dakota, where he helped with a variety of chores. His early schooling was spent learning in a two-room schoolhouse, but then eventually he made it into a larger building. He spent a lot of his free time with his grandmother, who lived just down the hill from his farm. "She was very religious and first planted the idea of being a priest when I was five or six," he said. "When I was there, she'd be playing EWTN, Mother Angelica and praying the Rosary. It was always something dear to her heart, to have someone in the family become a priest or sister." Vandermay enjoyed going to church and serving at Mass, but once he reached middle school, he put the idea of a vocation aside.

For him, it was all about sports. Vandermay was a three-sport athlete in high school, but he focused mostly on wrestling, with the goal of compiling 100 career wins or going to the state tournament, which would earn his spot on his school's photo board. "That was my goal in life," he said. "That's all I was living for." He missed state by one match as a senior, so he turned to other vices to numb that disappointment, he said.

He planned to enroll at Black Hills State University to become a history teacher. To do so, however, he needed scholarships, so he found one he could earn by teaching catechism at his local church. He was learning about his faith as he went, right along with his sixth-grade class. He didn't allow that new knowledge, though, to impact him, and he decided that this experience with the Church would be his last. "I had no intent of keeping (regular Mass attendance) up in college," he said. But that all changed on the final day of catechism class. The students requested to watch the movie "The Passion" of the Christ," so they did. It moved Vandermay profoundly. "It just tore my heart out, to be given that grace the entire year of learning the faith with the kids. but not allowing it to affect me," he said. "Then I started realizing, there had to be more to life than having to amplify everything to get some kind of enjoyment." So rather than going to college right away, Vandermay took a year off to ponder what else could be out there for him.

That thought he had 13 years early about becoming a priest resurfaced, so he started visiting with his vocations director and making seminary visits. Still, he wasn't convinced, but he was willing to explore. "I knew that if I didn't give it a try, I wouldn't know for sure," he said. So Vandermay made the decision to enter IHMS, and he discerned for two years, but still, something wasn't clicking, so he returned home to work on the farm for a year. But God tugged back, and a year later, Vandermay asked his bishop if he could return to seminary, which he granted. But first, Vandermay spent a Regency Year at the Mater Dei House in La Crosse, Wis., and has since returned to IHMS to finish out the final two years of his formation. He credits God with not giving up on him. "Ultimately, it's God," he said as to the reason he's here. "I have tried pushing it all away, but he's drawn me back multiple times. It's just the full process of realizing the immense love God has for us, and it isn't always an easy breakthrough to realize that and to accept that."

# Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God

Nm 6:22-27 | Gal 4:4-7 | Lk 2:16-21




Today's readings remind us of the central role Mary plays in the story of Jesus and the story of our salvation. We may be tempted to place her on a pedestal – as well we should – she is the Mother of God! At the same time, today's Gospel reminds us she is not divine herself, but human – and she bore the incarnate flesh of the Son of God in his divine and human nature. She went through the sleepless nights and the uncertainties of parenting in all its stages. She learned early on what it takes many of us a lifetime to learn – often in fits and starts – absolute trust in God. As we celebrate this solemnity, we can bring our uncertainties, fears, and struggles to Mary our mother, asking for the grace to follow her faithful example.

### GO EVANGELIZE

# PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Of course there's nothing wrong with New Year's resolutions, and I always admire people who have thought about them in advance. Me? I'm often tongue-tied on January 1 when someone asks me what my resolutions are (hmm ... maybe I should think about kicking that procrastination habit in 2023?) This is why Mary's reaction to the visit of the shepherds strikes me so profoundly. The shepherds pay homage to Jesus and spread the word that God's Son has been born. Mary, Luke writes, "kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart." As we move into a new year, so rich with possibility, we might follow Mary's example and reflect before jumping headlong into this or that goal or New Year's resolution. Instead, perhaps we can take the day - or a week or a month - to prayerfully reflect on how we can best put our faith in Jesus into action. How can we witness to our faith in our daily lives? What changes might help us do that? We can ask God to help us draw up a list of ways that we can be more faithful to him.

**PRAY** Pray the Hail Mary, reflecting on each line with gratitude. If you have more time, give yourself a "mini-retreat" by reading or reflecting on a book or devotional about Mary.
