Luke 4:21

I have been blessed to be a grandparent for over four years now. My wife and I have had multiple opportunities to babysit or simply spend time with grandkids. We regularly have video calls with our kids, but it is mostly with the camera focused on the grandkids. It often amazes me how much energy the grandkids have, how joyful they "usually" are, and how much they use their imaginations.

For many, myself included, the older we get, the less energy we tend to have. We too often become less joyful and a bit more "grumpy". And we tend to use our imaginations less and less, instead filling our minds with watching TV, scrolling through social media, or otherwise keeping it busy. How would it affect you if instead, you spent a bit more time using your imagination? Would it possibly give you a bit more energy? Would it make you a bit more joyful?

One way to use our imagination, a gift God has given us, is to use it in our prayer. Today's gospel reading is a perfect scripture to do just that.

Imagine you found your customary "spot" in the synagogue, and you are silently praying or are quietly visiting with those around you. Who is all there? What are you discussing? Suddenly, a hush comes over the crowd as Jesus enters. What does he look like? Who is with him? Is his mother Mary there? Does he look joyful or tired?

Imagine yourself or someone else handing Jesus the scroll from the prophet Isaiah? As Jesus is opening the scroll, what sounds are you hearing? What does the scroll look like? Then, Jesus begins to read.

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.

What does Jesus' voice sound like? Are you able to clearly hear him or are you so far away you strain a bit to hear his words? Where are you looking at as Jesus reads from the scroll? What thoughts are going through you mind? What feelings are you experiencing?

As quickly as Jesus' reading starts, it is over. Jesus declares, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." What thoughts are crossing your mind? Are you puzzled? Are you in awe? Are you wondering what Jesus means by his statement? What feelings are you experiencing?

When we pray with scripture, using our imaginations, it gives God another way for Him to communicate with us. It transports us back to that moment in time. It allows God to reveal things to us, such as how Jesus looks and sounds. God can reveal his feelings, his emotions, his desires for us, through our imaginations. Using our imaginations can help us stay focused on the prayer instead of being distracted by things of this world.

If you struggle using your imagination, keep trying. The more we use our imagination in prayer, the easier it will become. And you just might end having more energy and become even more joyful.

ALL ENTRIES MUST BE OF CONTESTANT'S OWN IMAGINATION AND CREATION

Essay: TYPED ONLY, not to exceed 500 words on one page and on one side.

Poetry: Any style of poetry, typed, not to exceed eight (8) lines.

Art: Size: 8.5"x11" No Lettering (your art carries the message) Do not put your name on the Art, How the theme is carried out in Art will be part of the judging, in addition to artistic talent. Medium: Crayon, markers, ink, paints (water color, acrylic, oil), charcoal, pencil (black or colored), pastels (chalk), and duct tape. NO WOOD.

Computer Art: Size: 8.5"x11" or 8"x12", No Lettering. Art must be artist's own creation and should fill the majority of the page. NO clip art or images imported from web sites.

Music: Contestants must submit their own creation of lyrics and notes on professional music score paper (melody, harmony and accompaniment, all of which must be noted accurately), and an audio file in MP3 or MP4. All are acceptable ways to submit your audio for your song along with the written piece.

Photography: Size 8"x10" picture depicting the theme. Do not add matting. Picture must have been taken by the contestant. May not be a computer downloaded image or a picture of a picture. Can be color or black and white. Cannot be a collage.

Judges will use rules of clarity, grammar, spelling, interpretation of theme, and all peculiar rules in the categories listed above.

RULES:

- 1. Contestants may enter a category only once, but may submit entries to multiple categories. Contestants must be sponsored by a local Catholic Daughters Court.
- 2. Entries on other themes or not conforming to the rules will be disqualified.
- 3. ENTRIES WILL NOT BE RETURNED. All contest material becomes the property of the National Court with the right to display/or publish material.
- 4. Decisions of the judges are final. Commercial entries will be disqualified.
- 5. Each entry must be accompanied by a 2022 Entry Form properly completed and signed. Forms are to be glued or taped to the back of the entry. Name must be legible.

AWARDS: The one first place winning entry for each category in each division (either theme not both) will be forwarded to the State Contest Chairperson and the winning entries at the State level will be forwarded to the National Education Contest Chairperson. Awards at he the local level are determined by the local Court.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


Do you ever find yourself feeling like you are at the cusp of something remarkable? Like you are witnessing an incredible, historic, athletic, or aeronautical feat? I wonder if that's what it was like for the followers of Jesus when he began his public ministry: "News of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all." In today's Gospel, Jesus reads the words of the prophet Isaiah that are effectively a "job description" of his mission: glad tidings to the poor, liberty of captives, sight to the blind, freedom for the oppressed. What Isaiah prophesied, Jesus claims to fulfill. He thus inaugurates his public ministry with a claim that is straightforward, bold, true, and of great consequence. Today, by virtue of our baptism, we are part of the body of Christ and share in that mission. Whatever our backgrounds, abilities, or talents, we each have something to contribute to building up one another and the Church. And with the help of the Holy Spirit, we, too, can be bold in our own proclamation of Jesus Christ as Lord.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We've heard the phrase "Don't sell yourself short." Social media aside, many of us tend to focus on our shortcomings: We may wish we could run faster, be better at our jobs, have a cleaner home, in general, "get it together!" Truth is, we're all works in progress. That's what I love about Paul's Letter to the Corinthians. He reminds us that each one of us – whatever our strengths or weaknesses – is part of the body of Christ. God loves us with our imperfections, not in spite of them. As such, each of us has indispensable value and much to contribute to the mission of the Church. As we move into the week ahead, today's readings invite us to place ourselves at the service of the Church and one another. Beyond that, we can invite others to join us by recognizing that God values the talents – and foibles – that each of us brings to his service.

PRAY Yesterday on the liturgical calendar was the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children. As members of the body of Christ, let us join our voices with the universal Church and pray a Pro-Life Rosary each night this week. The USCCB Prayers and Devotions page is a good resource.
