Dear Friends in Christ,

Reconciliation, Transformation, Vocation of the Disciple of Christ - values and ideas that call us to reflect on our life in the light of the Love with which we have been loved. Right before Jesus died on the cross, He is found to be praying "Father, forgive them for they know not what they are doing." In this statement, Jesus is challenging us to look beyond the reason that would "justify" our anger, desire for revenge and for an opportunity to be indifferent to the world and each other. But that is not the way Jesus calls his disciples to live or act. The vocation of a true disciple is to look for the ways that we show our love for God and each other, especially as we overcome our differences.

It is not easy to speak of reconciliation. We have been used to understand reconciliation as a sacrament of penance, we celebrate from time to time, especially before Christmas and Easter. But the reconciliation the Gospel calls us to has much broader meaning. It reaches beyond our intimate meeting between me and God. The pain of being hurt by others, be it individual or an organization affects our relationship with God but also our relationships with others. We develop many ways of dealing with the hurt, anger, and mistrust. But very often, we just learn to live with the pain. The truth of the Gospel calls us not only to learn to live with it, but also to look for ways to do something about it. And sometimes we get to that point. Sadly, we usually are forced to deal with our pain. We find ourselves alienated, maybe we fall into depression, or we simply get tired of the hurt.

But there is another way. No, we do not have a miracle cure for our pain caused by others, but we sure can be proactive as we try to reconcile with each other. We reconcile with each other not because we must, but because we reflect the love God has loved us with, as has forgiven us through. True disciple of Christ considers his/her vocation and finds ways of living by the truth of Gospel. Our freedom can be reached not by just learning how to tolerate, but we are transformed. Reconciliation in our Christian understanding calls us to seek ways that we can be transformed into new people, even as we use the very experience of our pain caused by others, by our decisions, or by institutions. What makes us true disciples, is that we do not just tolerate but we look for an opportunity to grow and be transformed into the "Christ" who prays "Father, forgive them for they know not what they are doing."

Initiated Measure 27 will appear before voters in the Nov. 8, 2022 election. It proposes to legalize the possession, use, and distribution of marijuana for so-called "recreational" purposes. South Dakota's Catholic bishops urge a "NO" vote on Measure 27, due to the harms marijuana causes to persons who use it and the damage it inflicts on society.

# How does marijuana harm persons who use it?

Marijuana contains a mind-altering chemical known as delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol or "THC" for short. Marijuana used today has three times the concentration of THC compared to 25 years ago.<sup>1</sup>

Adverse mental health effects of using marijuana include impaired memory, difficulty with thinking and problem-solving, hallucinations, delusions, and psychosis.<sup>2</sup>

Marijuana negatively affects brain development, especially

among younger people. It impairs learning, results in the loss of IQ points, and increases the risk of addiction.3

Using marijuana has been associated with worse educational outcomes, lower income, welfare dependence, and unemployment.<sup>4</sup>

In Colorado, an early state to legalize marijuana, the percentage of suicides in which toxicology reports showed the presence of marijuana has doubled since legalization.<sup>5</sup>

# How does marijuana use harm society?

Marijuana use leads to more dangerous roads. It is the illicit drug most frequently found in the blood of drivers who have been involved in vehicle crashes.<sup>6</sup>

The South Dakota State Medical Association has stated, "Societal costs of marijuana use include paying for increased emergency room visits, medical care, and addiction

In Colorado, traffic deaths connected to marijuana use have doubled following legalization. One in every five traffic deaths now involve a driver who has tested positive for marijuana.<sup>7</sup> The South Dakota State Medical Association has stated, "Societal costs of marijuana use include paying for increased emergency room visits, medical care, and addiction treatment for the uninsured; ... increased crime; and a negative impact on the health of those exposed to secondhand smoke."



#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

When will wisdom kick in? Even so many years later, I still struggle with some of the same questions that kept me up at night when I was 21. Fortunately, God is patient with late bloomers. The Book of Wisdom reassures us that, first, God loves us, no matter where we are on the continuum of "having it all together." Second, the Lord won't judge us on our worst days, but wants us to grow in wisdom and holiness. The Wisdom writer knows it's not an overnight process; it is often marked by one step forward, two steps back: "You rebuke offenders little by little, warn them and remind them of the sins they are committing, that they may abandon their wickedness and believe in you, O Lord!" Like Zacchaeus in today's Gospel, if we seek out Jesus and ask for his help, he will show us the way. Thanks be to a God who comes "to seek and to save what was lost."

#### **GO** EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

At Mass recently, the priest encouraged parishioners to turn to the person next to them and ask them for whom they would like us to pray. I've been at Masses where we introduce ourselves, but this "Hi, how are you, please pray for X" was new to me. As Mass continued, I prayed for Matt, the son of the woman in front of me. She prayed for my friend Jim, whose sore knee had sidelined him during his walk along the Camino de Santiago. How encouraging it must have been for the early Christians to know that St. Paul held them in prayer, "that our God may make you worthy of his calling and powerfully bring to fulfillment every good purpose and every effort of faith." Just as Jesus seeks us out, we, in turn, can accompany others who may be lost or hurting or who just happen to be in the next pew. Through our prayers, we can build up one another, our parish, and the wider Church.

**PRAY** When a friend shares a struggle or challenge, don't be shy about offering your prayers. Make a list of people to pray for and set it by your bedside so you don't forget.
