With the recent events and developments in our world, one cannot pretend that all is good and happy. One is certainly influenced by the situations that develop in our country and in the world. As long as we keep on living, we have to pay attention to what is going on around us. We also realize that we cannot separate ourselves from those issues, and we are therefore challenged both on a physical (material) level as well as on the spiritual. We are worrying and thinking about how to ensure that tomorrow we will be able to enjoy the level of life that we are accustomed to, or how we can improve it. Those thoughts certainly have a profound impact on all of us. The struggle of comfort and selfishness, two qualities of life which come to existence at the same time in each of us.

The readings for this Sunday are almost like a blessing, a breath of fresh air that God sends on our way. The first reading and the Psalm are telling us of God's great feast that God is preparing for us. More to it, He is not only preparing it, He also is in charge of it. But God does not want to choose only according to one particular standard, He is not afraid to invite anybody, just as long as they are ready and willing to respond to his invitation. All He asks in return is proper treatment, a proper "garment". Our garment is our heart and soul that we prepare for the Lord to dwell in.

St. Paul brings to us a message which may be able to tell and give us a sense of direction in our worldly challenge and spiritual response. "I can do all things in him who strengthens me" What beautiful wisdom, but to appreciate it one needs to know both the glory and humbleness, be happy and sad, be able to lead and to be a follower. Not always will we follow the voice of the shepherd but that does not mean that God will leave us on our own. Life can be difficult and sometimes almost with no hope, but Christ died for us so that we may have life. Let us not be afraid to call on the Shepherd to take us back and put us on the right path, be it material, economical or spiritual. The Good Sheperd's invitation to a heavenly banquet is open, be not afraid to respond to it as you can and are ready.



# SOUTH DAKOTA'S EXTREME ABORTION AMENDMENT

## Frequently Asked Questions: Does the amendment limit abortion in any way?

As a practical matter, no. The amendment divides pregnancy into three trimesters. In the first trimester of pregnancy, when most abortions occur, no limits whatsoever are allowed—even regulations designed to protect a woman's health, such as requiring that an abortion be performed by a licensed doctor. In the second trimester of pregnancy, abortion could be regulated "only in ways that are reasonably related to the physical health of the pregnant woman." The interests of the preborn child could not be considered by the state when setting abortion policy. Thus, the amendment would permit late-term abortions of perfectly healthy preborn children, including those that are capable of surviving outside the womb. Even in the third trimester of pregnancy, up until the moment of birth, the proposed amendment would permit abortions of healthy, viable, preborn children whenever it is deemed necessary to protect a woman's "health." The amendment does not define what "health" means. Instead, it leaves this issue to the sole discretion of a woman's physician. Stay tuned for further information about the abortion amendment.

# Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 25:6-10a | Phil 4:12-14, 19-20 | Mt 22:1-14



I have about 75 first cousins (yes, really!), so I grew up accustomed to large gatherings. "Feasts" in our family were almost an everyday kind of thing. So you can imagine my initial reaction to today's parable: Why would anyone refuse such a grand invitation? Who doesn't love a feast? As we know, however, with parables, Jesus is giving us a message that is deeper than it first appears. Today he uses the image of a wedding feast to explain God's abundant generosity, and the indifference or outright refusal this loving generosity is often met with. Yes, we enjoy sharing food with family and friends, but are we always gracious recipients of *God's* love and bounty? Are we prepared, and properly disposed, to receive it? (Think of the graces we receive in the sacraments, especially confession.) The kingdom of heaven is the banquet to which we are all invited, and too often we can become busy with our material lives and not notice this ongoing invitation. Or we push it out of our minds, or gad about in the wrong garments (of sin, and not grace). Let us open our ears and our hearts to God's loving invitation, strive to be holy people, and share this gift with those around us.

#### **GO** EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We learn from today's readings that the kingdom of heaven can be likened to a sumptuous banquet. Isaiah, in the first reading, says it well, proclaiming, "The Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples a feast of rich food and choice wines." Isaiah then moves from imagery of food to talk about how God will destroy death forever and wipe away all tears. In other words, God has saved his people, and offers us his constant presence and the gift of eternal life. But we must respond to God's generosity in the proper manner so we are prepared to enter the kingdom when the time comes. Making our relationship with Jesus our number one priority will prepare us well to receive and respond to this invitation. From this we will see how our other priorities naturally change and how God always provides. As St. Paul says in his Letter to the Philippians: "My God will fully supply whatever you need, in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus."

**ACTION** When you get dressed each morning this week, take a look at what you are wearing spiritually, as well as physically. What does the (spiritual) garment look like? Is it appropriate for a wedding feast? Pray the Act of Contrition (and go to confession if necessary), and then make a conscious effort to repair any faults in your spiritual garment: forgive someone or apologize to someone; pray specifically for someone you do not especially care for; spend time in Eucharistic Adoration.



# The Infant Jesus of Prague

## The Statue



The original statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague was created as a royal wedding gift from a Spanish Princess to her royal Austrian cousin. The statue of the Infant is carved of wood thinly coated with wax. He stand 19 inches tall and wears a long tunic. The left hand holds a globe with a mounted cross. This cross signifies the world-wide kingship of the Christ child. The right hand is giving a blessing with the first two fingers raised to symbolize the two natures of Christ. The folded thumb and last two fingers touch representing the unity of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in the mystery of the Blessed Trinity. The wardrobe of the Infant is white linen with a cover of lace. Silk or velvet covers the albs and a cape is worn on top. to represent Jesus' Kingship of the Universe.

# The Story

The statue was discarded in war and His hands were destroyed. A Carmelite found Him and fixed the hands and placed the statue in the Carmelite Church in Prague, Czech Republic. In 1637, Fr. Cyril prayed before the Infant. He was filled with wonder and contemplating the loving God Who became a child for His people. The statue spoke to the priest saying, "Have mercy on Me and I will have mercy on you.

Give me hands and I will give you peace. The more you honor Me, the more I will bless you."

Many miracles have occurred through the intercession to the Divine Infant. During an invasion, all children were taken to the Church for protection, they prayed to the Infant, and were all saved. Many have been cured of ailments through their devotion to the Infant Child or Prague. Financial woes have also been mediated with continued devotion to the Infant. For nearly four centuries the promise of protection and blessing has inspired devotion and love of the Infant Jesus of Prague.
