In the Gospel today, Jesus does something that in the mindset of the time would have been shocking and surprising. He, the Son of God, comes to be baptized by John in the baptism for the repentance for sins. Jesus is without sin, He is the Son of God, so why did he submit to John's baptism? In fact John himself is so taken aback he says, "I am not worthy to stoop and loosened the thongs of his sandals" (Mk 1:9). A little bit like Peter who when Jesus went to wash his feet said, 'oh no Lord, you can't wash my feet.' We see there the humility of the Lord.

Think about the fact that the eternal living Son of God became a baby. He had to be fed and clothed. He had to grow up like every human being. He had to learn things as a human being. And he, though he was without sin, submitted to the baptism of the repentance for sins. That is a foreshadowing of his whole mission which is not to stand apart from sinners; those people over there who are alienated from God, but to step right into the place of sinners. In fact, he is crucified between two thieves.

We can tend to think of Jesus as this exalted king, this glorious figure who can't relate to us at all and yet think of the people that Jesus most enjoyed hanging around with... sinners. People who were outcasts of society, people who didn't have their act together because he came to help them put their act together. So when John is so taken aback he says, "I need to be baptized by you, and yet you are coming to me?" (Mt 3:14). Jesus says to him, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." (Mt 3:15). What he meant was his whole goal is to fulfill the Father's plan. That he would be a Messiah not of victory after victory and complete success in worldly ways, but He would be the Messiah who identifies with sinners and who bears all the consequences of human sin on the cross. It is through that, that he wins his victory that we can all share in.

Now the interesting thing is we tend to think of Jesus' ministry and all the things he did; his miracles, his healings, his raising of the dead; as things he was able to do because he is God, and that is true. Yet in a very real way, Jesus did those things as man, empowered and anointed by the Holy Spirit. That is pretty amazing because through the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation we receive the same Holy Spirit that Jesus did. When a person is baptized and confirmed they hear the same words as God the Father in the depth of their heart. They hear, "This is my beloved Son." (Mt 3:17), this is my beloved Daughter. God gives each one of us a mission, a role in his plan that is completely unique and that can't be fulfilled by anybody else. Through His Holy Spirit that he gives us through these sacraments, we are anointed and empowered to carry out that mission that the Father has given us.


South Dakota March for Life

The Epiphany of the Lord

Is 60:1-6 | Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6 | Mt 2:1-12



It's interesting how an event can be interpreted by different people. God's revelation of himself in the birth of the child Jesus is clearly one such event. The Magi, Gentiles from the east, had heard of this "newborn king of the Jews" and undertook a long and arduous journey to see him and offer him homage. They were edified and eager in their search. Herod, himself a king - of the Jews - did not have the same reaction. The very thought of this "newborn king" threatened him and filled him with rage and suspicion. In this moment in human history, the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles (i.e., the Epiphany) unveils the truth of God's redemptive work for all of creation to be reconciled to himself. This truth has been accepted and rejected throughout time, and our celebration of this feast gives us an opportunity to give thanks in a focused and particular way for our acceptance of it - to give thanks for the gift of our faith. Perhaps it is even a moment for us to have our own, colloquial epiphany: an "aha moment," where we once again truly understand the depth of God's love for us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Magi, the Gentiles from the east, were changed after their encounter with the Christ Child; they were warned not to return to Herod and they obeyed and took a different route home. In today's second reading, St. Paul says it has been revealed that Gentiles are "coheirs, members of the same body" - the body of Christ. Just as the magi were forever changed by their journey, so must we be. Their journey is a model for us, but we do not have to seek Christ in the world as they did; he is here with us, in Word and in the Eucharist. The Incarnation of Jesus is pure gift to our weary, troubled world. As we heard in Isaiah, "rise up! ... [our] light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon [us]." As the Magi followed the light of the star, let us rise to the occasion and respond to God's light in our world by recognizing the good gifts God gives us each day. And then thank him for his enduring presence in our lives.

PRAY Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star ... Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen (from USCCB Epiphany prayer for blessing of home)
