Many early members were recent immigrants who often lived in unsanitary conditions and performed hazardous jobs for poor pay. Since its founding, a primary mission of the Knights of Columbus has been to protect families against the financial ruin caused by the death of the breadwinner. While this method originally was intended to provide a core group of people who would support a widow and her children after the death of their husband and father, it has expanded into much more. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

The following is taken from the June 10, 2007 address of Pope Benedict XVI on the Feast of Corpus Christi: "There is an intrinsic connection between celebration (of the Eucharist) and adoration. The holy Mass is the Church's greatest act of adoration. Adoration outside holy Mass prolongs and intensifies what happened in the liturgical celebration and renders a true and profound reception of Christ possible. I would like to take the opportunity that today's solemnity [Corpus Domini (Body of Christ)] offers me to strongly recommend to pastors and all the faithful the practice of Eucharistic adoration."

"A plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful who visit the Blessed Sacrament for adoration lasting at least a half hour." [Manual of Indulgences (USCCB, 2011) 48.]

Eucharistic Adoration: Wednesday, 8:30 AM to 7:30 PM. There is a need for parishioners who are willing to sign up for a specific hour in adoration every Wednesday.

*Liturgy Committee

The Liturgy Committee's purpose is to assist in liturgical planning so that it "leads to a conscious, active, and full participation of the faithful both in body and in mind, a participation burning with faith, hope, and charity" (#18, General Instruction of the Roman Missal). In conjunction with the Liturgy Coordinator/Music Director and the Pastor, the committee discusses, offers feedback and helps plan for worship services throughout the liturgical year.

Liturgical Ministries

Altar Server

The primary role of the altar server is to assist the priest in the celebration of the liturgy during Mass. Servers carry the cross or the processional candle(s), hold the book for the priest celebrant, carry the incense and censer, wash the hands of the priest, and assist the priest celebrant and deacon as necessary. Training is provided. Time commitment is flexible but altar servers must attend every Mass that they have been scheduled. When a server cannot be present they must arrange for a replacement. Open to grade 3-adult.

Extraordinary Eucharistic Minister

"The Eucharist is a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Father, a blessing by which the Church expresses her gratitude to God for all his benefits, for all that he has accomplished through creation, redemption and sanctification" (*CCC* 1360). Extraordinary Eucharistic Ministers distribute the Precious Body and Blood of Christ during liturgy. Training is required. Time commitment is up to 2 Masses per month. Open to confirmed adults and youth over the age of sixteen.

Hospitality Minister

Hospitality Ministers create an atmosphere of warmth and welcome as parishioners arrive for the weekend and holy day liturgies. They also assist with the offertory collection, distribute bulletins, and straighten the worship aides in the pews after Mass. Time commitment is approximately 30 minutes before and after each Mass. Open to adults and youth Grades 9-12.

Lector

Lectors proclaim the scriptures and the Prayers of the Faithful at liturgies. Training for skilled proclamation is provided. Lectors are also required to arrive 20 minutes prior to every Mass that they have been scheduled. When a Lector cannot be present, they must arrange for a replacement. Open all confirmed.

Sacristan

A sacristan is an individual who helps prepare the worship space before and after each liturgy. They carefully arrange the liturgical books, sacred vessels, vestments, linens and gifts for each Mass. A sacristan typically arrives 30 minutes before Mass and readies the church by performing a variety of duties such as lighting candles; preparing for baptisms; verifying that all other ministries are present. Sacristans remain after the liturgy to ready the church for the next celebration. Though most liturgical ministries serve the assembly, the role of the sacristan is to minister to the presider, providing sacristans a unique opportunity to interact with the presider and deepen their knowledge of Catholic traditions, while helping to ensure that the liturgy proceeds smoothly. Training is required.

Music Ministries

*Cantor

The cantor/song leader leads the congregation in the music of the liturgies (songs, psalms and acclamations). Initial training required, possible other continued education. Time commitment includes one half hour (some services require an hour) before the Mass scheduled and additional rehearsals as needed for special celebrations. Dress code required. Open to adults and youth Grades 9-12; auditions are required. (Age waiver in special circumstances and ongoing training for youth with an adult)

*Instrumentalist

Various instrumentalists and pianists/organists use their talents to add richness to the musical Worship environment. Time commitment is flexible and may include special seasonal participation.
