“Of course! The TV, the radio, the newspapers – all are reporting endless tragedy and suffering. All represent NEEDS,” stated Homer.

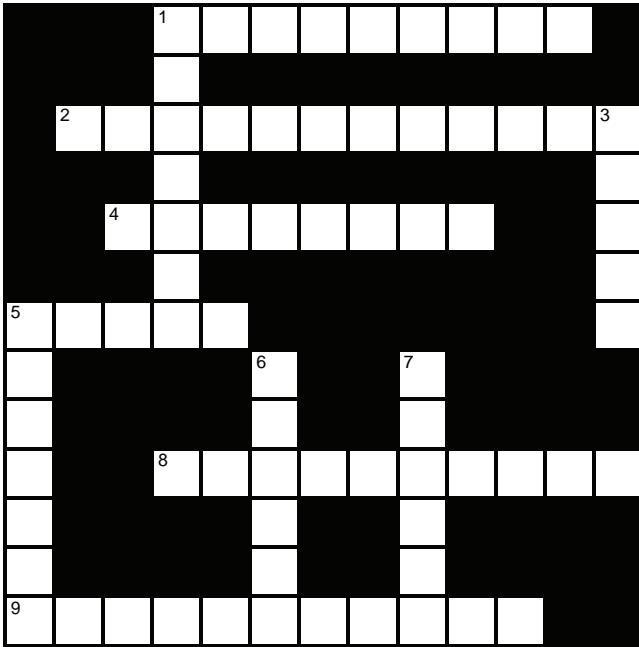
“Do you agree that it is impossible to put a total cost figure on all of these NEEDS?” asked Sam.

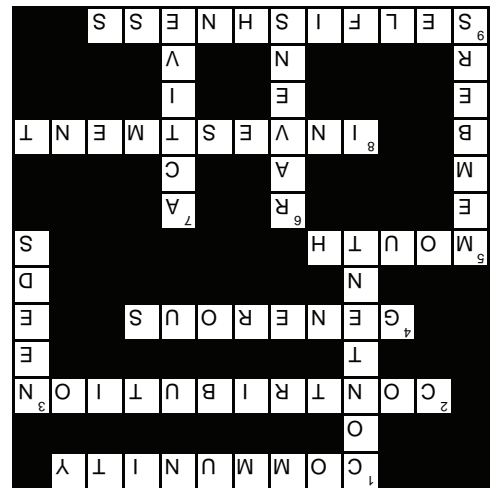
