### **Our Mission**

In A.D. 33, with a desire to establish the Kingdom of God, Jesus Christ established a Church and entrusted it with a Mission. St. Joseph parish in Issaquah, Washington exists to be a living response to that Mission. And so...

Guided by the Holy Spirit, we answer God's call to live as a community of Disciples of Jesus and his Mission. We strive to ever-deepen in that identity and life by embracing the Eucharist as the foundation of our life, and by proclaiming the Good News through our words and our actions, all so that we might draw others into discipleship and further establish God's Kingdom.

# Partners in the Gospel Update

This year, the Archdiocese of Seattle celebrated the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its foundation, and an epochal moment in the life of the local Church as Partners in the Gospel started taking shape. Part of the challenge we face is the shrinking number of archdiocesan priests. We are aided by priests from elsewhere, but it is problematic for them to serve as pastors given their short-term visas. Most parishes if not all also struggle with finding sufficient volunteers, and possessing the necessary financial resources for staff, programs and to care for their aging buildings. While there is much good happening, we can't allow our limitations to continue defining ministry, hence the need for this pastoral and strategic planning effort.

On July 1st, the local parishes of Mary, Queen of Peace (MQP) in Sammamish, St. Joseph (SJ) in Issaquah and Our Lady of Sorrows (OLOS) in Snoqualmie began to share a single pastor, Fr. Matthew Oakland, who was assisted by Fr. Kyle Poje. It is the beginning of a multi-year journey of discernment which will conclude with the three parishes merging into one parish. During this time, our community will discern together where God is calling us, how we can more fully live out the life of the Church, how best to utilize all of our resources (people, churches, school and other buildings, finances) to carry out the full range of ministry and the work of evangelization.

With a reduction from three to two priests, Sunday Mass times had to change immediately, a challenge for SJ in particular who lost a Saturday Mass and OLOS which had their Sunday morning Mass shift to the afternoon. Thankfully a number of the Saturday night Mass goers from SJ found a new home at OLOS or MQP's vigil Masses. In our first year, while many ministries continued separately, some joined together, in particular for sacramental preparation for those becoming Catholic, marriage preparation and adult Confirmation. SJ and MQP also started collaborating for youth ministry. Many of these changes happened out of necessity due to staffing and volunteer needs, but it's a blessing to be able to share resources between parishes in service to the People of God and the work of Christ.

# Liturgy and Worship

Our parish continued to be blessed with rich opportunities for worship through weekday and Sunday Masses this year. Each Mass offered its own musical style, enriching the liturgy, and our Sunday evening Mass remained a cherished time of quiet reflection.

Our parish school students participated faithfully in weekly Masses on Wednesdays while school was in session, deepening their connection to the Eucharist. Spanish Masses on most First Saturdays continued to unite and celebrate our diverse parish community. Eucharistic Adoration was available in the Blessed Sacraments Chapel throughout the week, providing parishioners sacred time for personal prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. Parishioners were invited to begin their day with Lauds (Morning Prayer) each weekday at 8:30 a.m. in the Worship Space, creating a beautiful rhythm of prayer to start the day together.













### **Faith Formation and Sacraments**

This year, our parish was blessed to walk alongside many individuals and families as they deepened their faith through the sacraments. We celebrated 34 Baptisms, 53 First Communions, 12 Professions of Faith, and 30 Confirmations, each a joyful witness to the Spirit at work in our community. The richness of parish life was further marked by 18 funerals, honoring those who have gone before us, and 2 marriages, celebrating the gift of covenant love. With a total of 1,646 registered households, our parish continues to grow in faith and discipleship.

Each sacrament reminds us of the depth, wonder, and abundant life we are invited into as followers of Christ. Whether in the joy of new beginnings, the strength of lifelong commitments, or the hope found in eternal life, we see in our community powerful witnesses to the beauty of Catholic faith.

Looking ahead to 2025–26, we plan to combine sacramental celebrations among the three parishes in our family, fostering a shared sense of community and faith.

## St. Joseph Parish School

#### Academically Excellent, Distinctively Catholic and Connected in Community

In 2024–2025, St. Joseph Parish School (SJS) continued to live out its mission of inspiring and educating the whole child - heart, mind, and soul. Our students achieved remarkable academic success, highlighted by our Decathlon Team's outstanding performance: 1st place in the Logic Quiz and 3rd place overall. Individual honors went to Adriana Mealy, who earned 3rd place in Science, and Lochlan Smith, who earned 2nd place in Social Studies. Our MAP testing scores were also a point of pride this year, with results exceeding Archdiocese averages and reflecting our teacher's continued dedication to our students' growth.

Rooted in our Catholic mission, service and faith were at the heart of student life. Every grade level took part in the Feeding Kiddos Backpack Program, supporting local children in need. Each class also led at least one Mass during the school year including the All-Saints Day Mass, Thanksgiving Bread of Life Mass, Living Nativity Scene, May Crowning, and three all-school Masses. These liturgies give our students opportunities to grow as leaders in their faith communities and among their classes.

This year was filled with enriching experiences that extended learning far beyond the classroom. Seventh and eighth graders journeyed to Washington, D.C., where they explored the nation's capital and deepened their understanding of history, civics, and citizenship. Pre-K students visited the Issaquah Salmon Hatchery, discovering the wonders of our local environment, while fifth and sixth graders enjoyed hands-on learning and team building at Camp Seymour. Countless other field trips provided opportunities for experiential learning, sparking curiosity and connection. Across both campuses, our students continued to thrive academically and spiritually, embodying the values of service, leadership, and community that define St. Joseph Parish School.

### FY 24/25 Financial Review - St. Joseph School

While tuition revenues exceeded budgeted expectations by \$40,000, this was offset by a \$66,000 reduction in parish subsidy support, a \$16,000 shortfall in anticipated gifts to the school, and an auction net result that came in \$45,000 below budget.

During the summer and fall of 2024, we installed new flooring throughout the Issaquah school buildings and implemented a new security system. We also upgraded the HVAC systems in both cottages using funds from our operating budget. Thanks to the generosity of the Fulcrum Foundation, during the 2023–2024 school year we secured a \$30,000 grant that allowed us to further enhance the safety and security of our Issaquah Campus through the installation of an extensive camera system and door scanners, completed in the summer of 2024. Our Fund-A-Need initiative made it possible to provide new flooring throughout all school buildings, including the two back cottages. Today, these cottages house our 3rd-grade classroom and art program.

In addition to the 2023 Fulcrum Grant, we received an additional \$10,000 from the Fulcrum Foundation in the winter of 2024 to support direct mailing marketing efforts. Since the mailing in early March of 2025, we have enrolled four new students from within the targeted 98029 and 98045 zip codes.

Our 25/26 budget shows a net income of \$52,000. We hope to increase this surplus with additional enrollment during the year. Our goal is to strengthen our financial position so that we can invest in our school, including teacher compensation and future improvements in technology and curriculum.

#### FY 24/25 Financial Review - St. Joseph Church

This Fiscal Year was the first year of Partners in the Gospel and many resulting changes, including Mass schedules. The number of Sunday Masses celebrated was reduced from four to three. Daily Masses were reduced from four to three a week. Many parishioners attended daily Mass at the other locations in our parish family or took advantage of the prayer opportunities in the Eucharistic Adoration Chapel open six days a week during church hours. Some started attending another parish for Sunday Mass with the loss of the Saturday Vigil. With these and other changes, total Sunday attendance declined 6.4% and general collections decreased by 14.3% from the previous fiscal year. As a result of the lower collections, we reduced the base subsidy level provided to the school, which also works towards the Archdiocese guidelines of school subsidy as a percentage of operating income. We also reduced some operating costs and ended the year with a slight operational deficit after eliminating capital income from the Income Statement. We are grateful for the continuing support of our parishioners.
