
OUR MISSION STATEMENT

THE TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

A popular image of Jesus reveals his heart on fire, burning with love for all humanity. In today's gospel we hear Jesus say, "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing." What is this fire of which Jesus speaks? Consider the effects of fire: It can destroy, purify, warm, give light enabling us to see. It can serve as a cleansing element, clearing away impurities and imperfections, thereby providing space for new life and love to grow?

Jesus' statement invites us to see fire's effects within each of our lives. Is the fire of Jesus' love being kindled within my own heart, so that I am compelled to share Jesus' burning love with others? Imagine the result of our entire Catholic community taking Jesus' message to heart; we will be telling our families, friends, neighbors, even strangers about Jesus' death and resurrection and the marvelous way in which he is present with us in the Eucharist and how he loves and feeds us with his body and blood at every Mass. This is the kind of zeal needed in order to fan the flame of God's love until it becomes a blaze enveloping the entire world.

- Consider openly making the sign of the cross and leading a mealtime prayer with others in a public place, as well as at home.
- Openly share with others some specific ways in which God has blessed you/your family.
- Phone, email, or send a greeting to someone; explain that God has inspired you to reach out with warm wishes and a prayer for their wellbeing.

In today's gospel (Lk 12:50-53), Jesus acknowledges that you may receive negative reactions for your bold witness. Witness regardless, knowing that you are in good company with Jesus, his apostles, disciples, and countless saints who suffered much for being bold about their belief in God's merciful love. May we each keep the fire of faith alive and burning brightly. (See Peace & Justice article pg 3)

PEACE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

FRANZ JAGERSTATTER **CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR**

In matters of war and peace, August 9, 1945, is commonly remembered as the anniversary of the atomic bombing of Nagasaki that killed 74,000 persons in the cradle of Japanese Catholicism. But the Catholic Church now should also remember August 9 as the day in 1943 on which Franz Jagerstatter was executed by guillotine in the Brandenburg-Gorden prison in Germany. It should command the attention of the Church today as it grapples anew with the morality of war and the rise of authoritarian nationalism.

Some martyrs blaze across history and instantly change hearts and minds. Jagerstatter's martyrdom was all the more heroic for being almost entirely obscure. His fate was known by few beyond his family and those in his small farming village of St. Rategund. At a time when the Catholic bishops of Germany and Austria encouraged military service for the sake of Hitler's wars, Jagerstatter stood almost entirely alone in refusing to go along.

Not long before his death, Jagerstatter took courage from learning of Austrian Catholic priest Franz Reinisch's refusal to take the oath to Hitler – a refusal that cost Reinisch his life.

Jagerstatter was 36 at the time of his execution. He was married with four children. His wife, Franziska, remained steadfast to the end, including an agonizing final visit to him in Tegel Prison. He was declared a martyr by Pope Benedict XVI in June 2007 and beatified in October 2007 at the cathedral in Linz, Austria in a service attended by his wife and children.

Jagerstatter heroic life and death first emerged from obscurity with the work in the 1960's of American sociologist Gordon Zahn. In 2019 noted Hollywood director Terrence Malick released the movie "A Hidden Life" one more step in bringing Jagerstatter's story to a broader public.

As evident in books like Erna Putz's edited volume, Franz Jagerstatter: Letters and Writings from Prison. He was motivated by a vivid sense of acting for the sake of the love of God and neighbor and of doing so together with the communion of saints. In his last recorded words before his death, Jagerstatter said: "I am completely bound in inner union with the Lord."


Saturday mornings.

VIRTUS AWARENESS SESSION

The Diocese of Gary is committed to protecting the most vulnerable, our children, young people, and vulnerable adults, through education, awareness, and procedures.

Our Diocese began the work of addressing the issue of child sexual abuse in the early 1990s. Bishop Melczek and the clergy of our Diocese at the time established the Sexual Misconduct Toward Minors and Others at Risk in July of 1993. To implement this policy and its revisions, a Safe Environment has been established to:

- Provide a safe and secure environment for children and young people in the faith communities within our Diocese of Gary
- Assist the Diocese in evaluating a person's suitability to work with children, young people, and vulnerable adults
- Satisfy the concerns of parents and staff members with a screening process
- Provide a system to respond to the victims and their families, as well as the accused
- Reduce the possibility of false accusations against clergy, employees, and volunteers

Requirements:

Our Diocese requires that all diocesan clergy, religious, international priests, employees, and volunteers who have contact with children, young people, and vulnerable adults complete the following requirements:

- 1. Register with VIRTUS Online
- 2. Attend a Safe Environment Training Session
- **3.** Background check and required document renewal every five years
- **4.** Complete 24 ongoing monthly VIRTUS online informational bulletins

Our sessions are posted in the Virtus Database- August 21st at 9:00 am and August 26th at 6:00 pm. More sessions will be added.

THE QUEENSHIP OF MARY

Mary's Queenship is a share in Jesus' Kingship. In Luke 1:32-33 the Angel Gabriel tells Mary that the son she will conceive through the power of the Holy Spirit, "will be great, the son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever; of his kingdom there will be no end."

In the Old Testament it is the king's mother who has great influence on the court and on the king. The king's wives, often he had many, were not the queen! His mother was the Queen Mother and she was highly respected and valued for her wisdom.

The **August 22nd Marian feast**, this year celebrated on Friday the octave day of the Assumption of Mary, is important because Mary is the Mother of God. In the Dogmatic Constitution on The Church at #69 we read:

"Let the entire body of the faithful pour forth persevering prayer to the Mother of God and Mother of mankind. Let them implore that she who aided the beginnings of the Church by her prayers may now, exalted as she is in heaven above all the saints and angels, intercede with her Son Jesus in the fellowship of all the saints. May she do so until all the peoples of the human family, whether they are honored with the name of Christian or whether they still do not know their Savior, are happily gathered together in peace and harmony into the one People of God, for the glory of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity."


GOOD NEWS

"The new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized. Every Christian is challenged, here and now, to be actively engaged in evangelization; indeed, anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love. Every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus: we are missionary disciples. (#120)

"There is a kind of preaching which falls to each of us as a daily responsibility. It has to do with bringing the Gospel to the people we meet, whether they be our neighbors or complete strangers. This is the informal preaching, which takes place in the middle of a conversation, something along the lines of what a missionary does when visiting a home. Being a disciple means being constantly ready to bring the love of Jesus to others, and this can happen unexpectedly and in any place; on the street, in a city square, during work, on a journey. 
