

A Message from Fr. Mark Steffl

This year, St. Mary's Church has had the privilege to host two very important events for the Diocese of New Ulm, the ordination of three priests this last May, and most recently the Installation Mass of Bishop Zielinski at the end of September. Over the history of the Diocese of

New Ulm, there have been other such important events that have also been hosted here. The Apostolic Nuncio mentioned when he was here, representing the Holy Father for the Installation Mass, "Sleepy Eye is memorable now for more than just being mentioned in the Little House on the Prairie television series," having seen St. Mary's Church.

A parishioner who gave a tour of the church to a group a number of years ago recounted a story of one of the visitor's reaction. The visitor started to weep abruptly and said, "Your church is so beautiful. There are so few churches like this!"

This last year, we accomplished some important milestones in the life of our church building. The terrazzo floor is striking. As one parishioner noted, "It fits so well, it looks like it was always there." The last of the windows in the bell towers and sacristies have been repaired and restored, capping a project for the windows of the church that has lasted for many years.

Now, I am proposing that it is time to start thinking about a few projects that still remain to be done. One of them is some repair to the altars, pulpit, and confessionals. Close examination shows that after 120 years, there is much work to be done to repair them including places where paint and gold-leaf work has worn off. The St. Joseph side altar is leaning forward, and some decorative pieces have fallen off or been lost over time. These pieces are all made of butternut wood, a practically impossible wood to find anymore. I am told that the workmanship that created these beautiful pieces that adorn our church would be impossible to replicate, which makes it even more necessary that we give them some attention and needed care so that they may continue to inspire the minds and hearts of our parishioners and visitors.

This last September, a small section of the north wall and ceiling of the church received plaster repairs and a paint "sample." As I noted in the bulletin a few months ago, I am not looking to do this project just to "change things" or "to spend money" but to start addressing the plaster repairs needed on the walls, and the best way to proceed. The schema that was proposed reflects the original decoration of the church with some adaptations considering that the early paint colors in the church were very "heavy" by present-day standards. The sample is not a finalized version of what will be done, but at this point an idea. Conrad Schmitt, a well-known and long established company in Wisconsin that does this sort of work suggested we provide a "sample" of the actual colors for you to see. This visual goes far beyond a computer rendering or picture. (I realize that it is a significant change to the interior from what it has been for the past 50 years, and that such a change can take a while until it feels comfortable or the right way to go.)

Some people have suggested that while we would be doing this work it would be timely to address the interior lighting. This would also provide an opportunity to look at some repairs needed relating to the wiring of the organ (dating back to the 1940's) and the organ pipes. It is always difficult to determine how much to take on at one time in the process of addressing projects.

I am writing about this now, to "plant some seeds" for the parish to consider and pray about. Nothing, at this point, is "set in stone" or decided upon. A possible timeline for this project to begin might be the second half of 2024, provided that the necessary fundraising could be done and the project come to a definitive consensus.

If we move forward with this project, it will require a significant investment by all of our parishioners motivated by faith and an understanding that our parish church is our "spiritual home" in this world, the place where the Lord makes His home among us, and where we meet Him. Our parish church is where we begin our life with God the Father in Baptism, where we receive our Sacraments, and where we are present for our last Mass in this world, our Funeral Mass, which prepares us for the glory of the Heavenly liturgy around the throne of God.

Recently, a visitor to Sleepy Eye who stopped into the church for a visit asked me, "Do the people of this parish know how blessed they are in having such a church and a Catholic grade school and high school?" My response was, "Yes, but it is always good to be reminded!"

A Piece of St. Mary's History

This section is dedicated to the history of St. Mary's Parish.

St. Mary's Interior

The interior of St. Mary's Church has been decorated three times so far in its history. The parish had to content itself with raw white plaster walls and ceiling for the first nine years of the building's existence (1902-1911). In the spring of 1911, Msgr. Stulz contracted the O. J. Kover & Son Studio from Fort Wayne, Indiana to decorate and beautify the interior of the church. The parish was out of the church for four months while Mr. Kover's team of artists beautified the interior. Masses and other services were likely held in the old church, which by that time had been remodeled and outfitted to serve as the auditorium for the old parish school.

A September 22, 1911 article from the *Sleepy Eye Herald Dispatch* states: "The people of this city can always point with pride to this magnificent monument... Great was the surprise of the members of St. Mary's Catholic church last Sunday morning when they beheld their dear church in the new vesture, and rightly did they celebrate the reopening of their church by special and most impressive ceremonies





all day Sunday. Proud as they always were of their great religious monument, their House of God, never was there a greater feeling of joy and enthusiasm manifested than when they knelt gazing upon the monument of love and veneration, truly worthy of the Immaculate Queen; and great was their joy when the congregation assembled for the first time in the

To live almost a century is quite an amazing thing and Charles C. "Chisey" Hansen Jr. is no exception. On July 4,

1924, Chisey was born the second of three sons to Veronica and Charles C. Hansen Sr. Dick was his older brother and Harold "Hooch" was younger. Chisey remains the last living member of his family. The Hansen family lived just down the street (kitty-corner) from St. Mary's Church. Chisey remembers how he felt beginning school at St. Mary's, "I cried that first day, I didn't want to go." He is grateful to the Sisters who taught him the values of the Catholic faith.

He remembers growing up during the depression, "You didn't have anything. In '29, the banks took the house from Dad and we moved to the apartment over my Uncle Henry's harness shop (currently the phone company building)." This remained the Hansen home until his mother moved to an apartment later in life.

Chisey also lived during prohibition. He vividly remembers the day President Roosevelt ended it. He was only about eight years old when he rode along with his father and Ollie Hansen to load the barrels from the brewery in New Ulm. "We had an old model A Ford and they had these big wooden barrels that weighed about 400 pounds ... and they came rolling out of there. I think they loaded about six barrels on. Then when we got back to Sleepy Eye we had to stop at Chisey's Place to give him a barrel of beer because he wanted one 'right away.' Hours later Dad received a call (Dray Line phone number was 200) for another barrel!"

Chisey graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1942. This past summer he enjoyed celebrating their 80-year reunion with the only other living classmate, Monica (Steffl) Hertling. A highlight for them was riding in Dean Ibberson's Model T Ford representing St. Mary's School in the Sleepy Eye Summerfest Parade.

After graduation, he joined the Navy for two years noting that his older brother Dick was in the Army and Hooch was in the Air Force. After the Navy, Chisey worked at Del Monte as a lift-truck driver for 72 ½ cents an hour (normal

wage was 70 cents an hour then). He remembers one day when the factory packed 33,000 cases of peas, "Bill and I

piled 'em all in the warehouse. We got a little overtime that day." He then decided to attend Mankato State Teachers College (currently Minnesota State University) and later transferred to Mankato Business School where he graduated with a junior accountant degree.

Returning to Sleepy Eye, he met and

Returning to Sleepy Eye, he met and married Phyllis George on November 8, 1947, and together they had three children, Jan, Craig and Scott. With his father owning the Dray Line, one thing led to another and soon Chisey and Hooch were in the pop and beer distribution business operating Hansen Distributing and Dick took over the Hansen Dray Line continuing the freight business.

As an active businessman, Chisey gave of his time to serve his community and parish in a variety of ways. He served on Chamber of Commerce Board, Sleepy Eye Western Minnie Entrance Baseball Club as secretary, was a member of the Lions Club. In following his father's footsteps, Chisey served on the Hospital Board of Directors for 27 years (21 years as chairman of the board) and also served as one of the initial members of the Sleepy Eye Healthcare Foundation Board of Directors. He served on St. Mary's School Board for six years (president for a term) and became a 4th degree member of the Knights of Columbus.

He married Shirley Hendley later in life and together they enjoyed retirement living in the country. Shortly after Shirley's

death, he moved to Lake Villa where he still resides. Chisey is often seen out and about walking to achieve his daily goal of 5,000 steps a day. When asked about getting to heaven, he commented, "If you're honest and trustworthy, you're halfway there," leaving us with these words of wisdom, "Work hard, enjoy life and be honest."

St. Mary's Parish is extremely grateful to Charles C. Hansen, Jr. for his generous gift of \$150,166.20 in memory of Phyllis Hansen received in 2021 (\$130,000 for the terrazzo floor, \$11,000 for tuition assistance, \$9,166.20 unrestricted).

new Immaculate."

The main color of the first scheme was a deep rose color, with red and cream accent colors. (Some of this original color scheme exists yet today in the closets in the two side entrances on the east side of the church.) The walls and ceiling were richly ornamented with stenciling and murals. These decorations remained until 1944, when the church was redecorated by the St. Paul Statuary Co. While Fr. Andrew Koller was the pastor who brought the redecorating project to completion, it was Fr. Anthony Scholzen (Fr. Koller's predecessor) who first had the idea to redecorate the church, but he died in 1943 from complications due to kidney cancer before he could do anything further with the project. Fr. Scholzen likely saw the original scheme to be too outdated and "Victorian" by the 1940s. The 1944 color scheme was olive green, cream, red, and deep blue. (A small area of this color scheme exists behind the south confessional, under the window opening.) The 1944 scheme stayed until 1975, when the National Church Decorating Co. of Indiana painted the light blue and gold scheme that we know today.




