

Processions in the Catholic Church

Depending on where a person grows up in the world, different processions can mark one's life in the Catholic Church. Here in Sleepy Eye, we had a Rosary Procession in May to honor

Our Lady (pictured on this issue's cover) that began at the Schoenstatt Shrine and Retreat Center and followed the foot path along Sleepy Eye Lake to end at St. Mary's Church with Eucharistic Adoration and some hymns sung by the St. Mary's High School Schola, ending with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. We had another procession on Sunday, August 15, to mark the Feast of the

Assumption of Mary and the anniversary of the dedication of the parish church, and a final procession for the calendar year is scheduled on October 3rd, the Month of the Holy Rosary.

Another "procession" that many Catholics are familiar with is a Eucharistic procession on the Feast of Corpus Christi, the Feast of the Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus, which each year falls in the month of June. In our part of the world, such a procession usually follows the principal Mass of a parish, sometimes with the students who made their First Communion in a prominent place, and the priest who carries the Holy

Eucharist in the monstrance, under a canopy, to three different altars that are set up outside of the church. As the procession moves from altar to altar, Eucharistic hymns are sung. (Although this year, the windy conditions forced us to abandon the use of the canopy half way...)

When I was a student in Italy, I helped in a parish in Sicily one year for Holy Week. That little village had an elaborate procession for each day of Holy Week beginning with Palm Sunday that was connected to the different events of Our Lord's life during each of those days. I had never experienced anything quite like it!

We may not think about it, but it is very deliberate that the Mass begins and ends with a procession of the priest and Mass servers, and the offertory procession, when people who represent the entire church bring up the collection and the wine and hosts that will be used to make present the Lord Jesus on the altar for us to receive, as the Lord in the Eucharist makes His home among us.

The idea of "liturgical processions" is not a new one. In fact, we can look to the Old Testament, to find many times when there were processions involving the temple in Jerusalem. Many places in Europe, it is common to make a pilgrimage involving a walk of many miles on foot to

a significant destination such as the tomb of an apostle or shrine of Our Lady.

These processions, whether the short ones at the beginning of Mass or ones that last for miles, in addition to allowing us to enter into liturgy, are also meant to remind us that we are all on a journey to eternal life, that this walk from place to place is a reminder that our lives are a journey from one place to another, beginning in one location and ending elsewhere. As Catholics, we hope to be the new and eternal Jerusalem of Heaven.

When we have hosted the

Marian/Rosary and the Corpus Christi processions at St. Mary's, I am always happy with the positive feedback, especially from young families who appreciate the opportunity to be involved as a family in the movement of the processions which engages little hands and feet in a meaningful and memorable way. A friend of mine, who is a priest in Europe, likes to say, "never let a good opportunity for a procession pass by!" I would whole-heartedly agree with that advice. If you haven't made one of the Rosary processions yet, put it on your calendar, and bring a friend! *By Fr. Steffl, Parish Priest*



This beautiful concept drawing of the high altar recently surfaced. It was drawn presumably by Mr. Egid Hackner himself. Mr. Hackner's carving studio in La Crosse, Wisconsin (the E. Hackner Altar Company) made all of the wooden furnishings in St. Mary's Church. Given the 1903 date on the drawing, we now know that it took two years to carve the high altar and its reredos, which is not surprising given the high level of exquisite detail and magnificent execution of the altar. The three altars were installed in 1905. The finished product is mostly faithful to the drawing, with two notable exceptions being the tracery (the carved area that looks like a rose window) above the tabernacle tower in the finished product, and the placard at Our Lady's feet displays the Latin phrase 'Auxilium Christianorum'. The drawing portrays a banner at Mary's feet being held by an angel, and it reads in German 'Maria Immerhilf' or 'Mary of Perpetual Help'. A smaller-scaled framed replica of this drawing hangs in the main floor hallway of the rectory, outside of the parish offices.
