




St. Joseph, Foster Father of Our Lord Jesus and Protector of the Holy Family

Parish Family Profile

"Prayer in action is love, Love in action is service." St. Teresa of Calcutta

A life of service to others has created a legacy of greatness for Rosella (Suess) Windschitl. Because of her dedication to God and others, Rosella was inducted into St. Mary's Catholic School's Hall of Fame receiving the Service Achievement Award on November 21, 2020.

Rosella, the second of twelve children, began her life of service at an early age. She recalls her daily life in rural Comfrey consisting of the typical work of life on a farm, including

milking cows and helping with the fieldwork. She attended country school in Mulligan Township, graduating after 8th grade in order to work for other families with their household chores. When Rosella was 21 years old, she married Sylvester Windschitl and, together, they had five children: Gloria ('65) Helget, Eugene ('66) (who passed away in 2007), Mary Lou ('69) Mathiowetz, Darlene ('71) Tauer, and Jane ('75) Portner.

Rosella's life of service is most vividly illustrated by the years that she generously gave to St. Mary's. In the 1970's, she began cooking with the St. Mary's Catering Ladies along with Leona Helget and Donna Helget. After Leona passed away, it was Marie Bushard who kept the catering business going. With Rosella at her side, Marie and the St. Mary's Catering Ladies have offered their gifts of time, treasures and talents by preparing meals for countless events and donating their profits to St. Mary's. Rosella also worked for 18 years in the school kitchen helping prepare meals for the students until her retirement in 2014. According to her friend and co-caterer, Cindy Rieke: "With a spoon in her hand, a recipe in her head, a smile on her face and a prayer in her thoughts, Rosella Windschitl has been found in the St. Mary's School kitchen cooking up good old-fashioned comfort food for people for many, many years, whether it be for the school children or for the St. Mary's Catering



Ladies events!"

To this day, at the age of 98, service is what motivates Rosella. Whenever the school kitchen has potatoes or apples that need peeling, Rosella is ready and willing to help out. Until recently, she attended various catering events and made her famous potato salad when needed. However, the greatest gift she shared was her faith.


As her close friend and co-worker for many years, it is Marie who most elo-

quently describes Rosella: "When I think of Rosella, she reminds me of Mother Teresa, especially her hands and her dedication to her religious faith. When I sit in the Adoration chapel and see Mother Teresa's hands, they resemble Rosella's hands, crippled and callused from working and praying and never giving up. Those hands have done much service for St. Mary's. They are always busy doing something: praying, saying rosaries, and going to daily Mass. Those hands were involved mixing dough for many brunches and meals. Making schmierkuchen and rolls was her pride and joy. She never wore out because she was always praying while working. She used her hands for peeling many potatoes and for helping in every area of catering especially making glazed carrots and gravy. What a lady to have as a special friend and a leader. We had many hard days but her cheery disposition and many big smiles and laughs got us through. She never complained no matter how much her hands hurt. She said that she always offered up the pain. Rosella gave many hours to many different projects with her hands to St. Mary's. We always told her, when she meets the Lord, she should hold one hand down and pull us up there!"

When Rosella was asked her advice to others when life presents hardships, she answered nonchalantly as if it were common knowledge, "You just need to keep going!"

Future Capital Improvement Goals for St. Mary's Church

Someone recently asked me, "So, Father, what's the next thing that needs to be fixed?" I think the answer I gave him was a little more than he was expecting...

Although these are not urgent, they are things that are going to need attention in the upcoming years if we are to maintain our very beautiful church building, keeping it the impressive place of worship it is, as one priest described, "The crown jewel of the Diocese of New Ulm."

- Church floor the last work on St. Mary's church floor was in 2001, when the floor tile was removed exposing the present wood floor to be refinished. I am told the wood is nearing the end of its usefulness and not able to refinished again as it is fir wood, which is a softer wood. In considering how to move forward, I have been encouraged to install a terrazzo floor which is the type of floor found in the greater part of the school, as well as the school cafeteria. Terrazzo is a composite material, poured in place and consists of chips of marble, quartz, granite, glass, or other suitable material, poured with a cement-like mixture. Terrazzo can be colored to match a particular color scheme, and is very durable, long lasting, and easy to maintain and clean. (The floor in the Cathedral in New Ulm is a good example of what I am proposing for St. Mary's.)
- Church windows although most of the windows in the

church have been repaired and re-leaded in recent memory, there are windows remaining in need of repair: the three levels of windows in the bell towers along with the windows in the sacristies and south entrance.


• Church walls and columns/plaster repairs – the last work done on these areas was in the early 1970's when the church interior was painted blue. Originally our church's interior contained scenes decorating the walls and arches that portrayed a "picture book of Mary's life." Needed repairs to the plaster would invite us to consider if some of this could be restored based on the photos we have from that time. (Previous issues of the Immaculata have highlighted some of these historical points in our church.) When I asked about the decision to cover up or paint over these pictures that were in the sanctuary and throughout the church, I was told that they were in poor condition at the time and the resources available steered the decision against their restoration.

Since I arrived at St. Mary's, I have had a number of people approach me with a willingness to make substantial donations towards these projects and a desire to address this, therefore I am sharing this information now, as we look to the future, both immediate and far.

The 2020-2021 Diocesan Ministries Appeal

This year we will continue to utilize the best practices recommended by the diocesan attorneys with eight specific areas of ministry supported by the DMA. The percentage of each dollar gifted to the DMA will be allocated as follows: Catholic Charities 25%, Vocations 20%, Youth Ministry 7%, Diaconate 5%, Family Life 8%, Catholic Schools 7%, Social Concerns 6%, Hispanic Ministry 2%, and 20% to the donor's parish.

These ministries supported by this year's DMA continue to impact the lives of many people across the Diocese of New



Ulm. These ministries help pass on the faith, assist those needing spiritual and/or physical assistance, as well as provide spiritual guidance and nurture youth and adults in their faith.

The DMA goal remains \$1 million. Parishes will continue to have soft goals. Our total goal is \$51,039.04. The funds returned to our parish will be used to complete the landscaping around our church building.


