

Lent is a means for growth in Christian freedom and the perfection of the Christian life.

What is Christian Freedom?

Freedom is usually defined as having the ability to choose. But is that what St. Paul speaks about when he talks about the Freedom of the Sons and Daughters of God or "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom," (2 Cor. 3:17) or "For Freedom Christ has set us free." St. James calls the law of Christianity a "law of liberty." (James 2: 12.) Or St. John who says in the oft repeated verse, "The truth will set you free." (John 8:32)

Is Christian Freedom merely the ability to decide or is there more?

Bishop Barron, the great evangelizer, continually speaks about Christian Freedom as Freedom for Excellence. Excellence is found in man when he obtains the full stature of Christ and walks in the footsteps of the master and ultimately that is to live a life of love. Jesus is love made visible and we are called to live a life of love. St. Catherine of Siena says that man cannot live without loving. We were made for love because we were made for God who is love. And there is not love without freedom. Any love that is based in self-interest, constraint or merely the fulfillment of our needs is not worthy of the name love. (Interior Freedom, Philippe)

True love exists when in imitation of Jesus we freely give ourselves to one another. In the definition of love by St. Thomas we find the same idea. "Love is willing the good of the other as other." It is being for the other. In that we find our ultimate happiness and consequently our salvation.

Freedom is a precondition for love. So how do we obtain that kind of freedom? Freedom for the Christian is not like it is often portrayed in modern society as living without any constraints or obligations. Freedom for the Christian is found in a union with God, not in an independence from Him. So the more we open ourselves up to God, the more He will give us the gift of His Spirit and the greater will be the gift of freedom that He bestows on us. This will be a freedom that will blossom into a life of concern for others as we reach out to help those in need.

We could use this precious time called Lent best by making ourselves available to God. The best way we do that is in prayer. Deep heartfelt prayer is essential. In prayer we open ourselves up to Him and allow Him to fill us with His love and that will help us to grow in authentic freedom. If we concentrate on prayer this Lent, we will be setting up the condition for God to fill us with His gift of freedom.

Lent is a time of grace. I pray that it will be a graced time to grow in authentic Christian freedom so that we will truly experience more fully the Love of God and bring that love to our neighbors.

A Piece of St. Mary's History

St. Mary's Church Confessionals

With the holy season of Lent upon us, it is good to reflect on the turning away from sin and the confessional, and more specifically, the confessionals in St. Mary's Church.

On Monday, April 7, 1902, members of the church building committee, consisting of Rev. W.M. Stulz, Anton Steffen, and E.P. Bertrand, made the following resolution:

"...Agreed further, that Contract be made with Aegidius Hackner of La Crosse, Wisconsin [the E. Hackner Altar Co.] for furnishing and putting in place complete in said new church: church pews, two confessionals and Communion railing according to plans, sample, and illustrations at the rectory for the sum of two thousand (\$2000.00) Dollars." [The sum of \$2000 in 1902 would be the equivalent of about \$58,000 today.]

Older parishioners will recall that until the mid-1950s, the confessionals stood directly beneath the large north and south rose windows in the church nave, as shown in the accompanying photo, which was taken in the 1940s. They were moved to their current locations nearer the front of the church in 1956, when the north and south entrances into the church were made in the walls under the rose windows. These entrances were made to bring the church up to fire code, as well as giving better ventilation of the church during the hot summer months.

Parish Family Profile

Growing up on a family farm with six brothers and three sisters, Irene Schwartz had what seems to have been an ideal childhood. Running barefoot through the fields, along with having enough siblings to make two teams to play baseball and tip the can, a child couldn't have asked for much more.

Martin and Clara Mohr knew a Catholic education was important for their children and even though they started with country school, they all attended the Catholic school in New Ulm. After graduation, Irene attended the Minneapolis School of Business. After working

in the Cities for a short time she realized that living in a large city was not for her. During a visit home she went to see her dentist Dr. Lloyd Schwartz. He offered her a job at his business and Irene happily moved back to the area.

It was while working for Dr. Schwartz that Irene met his brother Jim. He would come in and visit and eventually asked her out. Jim was the son of Hertha and Frank Schwartz and grew up on a family farm with two sisters and three brothers. "I remember the day of our first date. It was March 12th and we went to a movie at the Pix Theatre. It

was also the Feast Day of St. Gregory the Great. We named our first son Gregory." While dating, Jim and Irene often went to dances on Sunday evenings at the New Ulm ballroom. While they were dating, Jim decided to go to radar school in Chicago. Jim had been a radar operator in the Navy from 1943 to 1945. It was during this time that he also decided to convert to Catholicism. When he returned from Chicago, his parents asked him to come back to farm again.

Jim and Irene were wed on Saturday, February 3, 1951, at the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in New Ulm. "It was a beautiful day, around 40 to 50 degrees. We started with brunch at my brother and sister-in-law's home and after the wedding we had a dinner and reception at Eibner's Willamarie Room in New Ulm. We finished the day having an evening meal at my Aunt and Uncle's. It was a beautiful day and we missed the snowstorm that happened the very next day."



After their marriage they moved to the Schwartz home place, where they began to build their life together. Jim and Irene were blessed with nine children: Gretchen, Gregory, Joseph, John, Mark, Michael, Mary, Katie and Anna. In 1965, the family was heartbroken over the death of Greg at the age of 12. The family continued to grow. They eventually outgrew their home and moved across the road to where Joe and Judy now live. "It was a bigger house and so much better suited to our family."

Jim and Irene carried the same value

in Catholic education as her parents and all their children are graduates of St. Mary's School. "The best investment you can make is in your children's Catholic education, if it's possible. We have also been blessed with 25 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren." Through the years, the Schwartz family stayed busy in farming. Jim farmed land and had dairy until his retirement in the mid-80s. In the late 1970s the boys began farming together and then added pork production. Their business has grown through the years and is now known as Schwartz Farms, Inc.

Through the years, Jim and Irene stayed busy with volunteer work that reflected their values. Irene was involved with the Board of Education, CCW, Christian Mothers, funeral helper, the Nex-Tu-Nu II store, St. Rita Study Club, a perpetual adorer since it started and she has been supportive of the Schoenstatt Movement. Jim was very involved in the Knights of Columbus and Meals On Wheels, along with other various volunteer projects for the church and school. On Christ-

mas Eve 2005, the family grieved the loss of Jim. "It was a hard time but we were blessed that the entire family could be together at that time."

Irene continues to stay active in volunteering and helping whenever possible. She also attends daily Mass as much as possible. Family and faith have always been and continue to be the center of Irene's life. "Having a strong faith is very important and passing on that faith to our family is equally important."


Our budget is going well six months into the fiscal year. We are very fortunate to have such caring generous parishioners and parents here at St. Mary's. We recently received a large estate gift of \$514,035.49. This is noted in the above financial statement under fundraising and donations. Gifts like these are vitally important to carry on the mission at St. Mary's. This gift was deposited into our general investment account at Christian Brothers Investment Services. This money will help increase our interest income we receive each month and increase our cash reserves for future building upgrades. Also included in this year's budget is \$126,500.00 from Caribbean Knights. This money was used to keep tuition increases at 5%. If this Caribbean Knights money was not available, the \$126,500.00 would need to be generated from another source, tuition increases would average around 18% or cuts would have to be made. We are truly blessed to have such a profitable fundraiser to help our school and it's needs.



All are invited to attend the Diocesan Chrism Mass which will be held at St. Aloysius in Olivia, this year.

"The Chrism Mass is one of the principal expressions of the fullness of the Bishop's Priesthood and signifies the close unity of the Priests with him. During the Mass, which he concelebrates with Priests from various sections of the diocese, the Bishop consecrates the Chrism and blesses the other oils. The newly baptized are anointed and confirmed with the Chrism consecrated by the Bishop. Catechumens are prepared and disposed for Baptism with the second oil. And the sick are anointed in their illness with the third oil."


