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
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Quarterly Thoughts From The Corner Office!

Dear friends,

By the time you receive this we may have started our Lenten journey. During the journey, let us continue to pray for each other that we may come closer to the God who created and cares for us.



Forgiveness, letting go of the lingering pain of new or past hurts to allow for inner peace, is an important element of Lent. We often cause a hurt without even realizing it. The hurt may be the result of "a look" that we gave or a passing word that someone misunderstood. Whether the injury is large or small, whether the hurt is individual or communal, the practice of forgiveness calls us to face the pain and work through the grief and anger. The only promise as we work through the hurt and pain is the promise of God's grace.

This comes to mind for two reasons. First, I regularly deal with individuals who are trying to deal with the sudden loss of a loved one, either because of death or because the loved one has moved on to a different place in life—physically, emotionally, spiritually. Second, I deal with people who are having a difficult time forgiving. They know intellectually that they must forgive, but their hearts just aren't ready for forgiveness. In both cases, they know they may never forget the loss and hurt because forgetting is nearly impossible. However, they would like to get on with the healing process and deal with the loss, the sense of betrayal and hurt.

I assure these individuals that they have made a gigantic step toward healing by recognizing this

need for healing and peace. My ear and my heart are open to you when you need to address some type of brokenness in your life. Also, please pray that we, as a community of believers, respond to the calling we have to live with forgiving and peaceful hearts.

We begin Lent with ashes on our foreheads, which serve as a visual reminder that we should abstain from meat on all the Fridays of Lent and fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means that those of us who are healthy and are between the ages of 18 and 59 are instructed to eat sparingly two simple meatless meals and one main meatless meal, with nothing in between. Fasting has a long history within our Judeo-Christian tradition. It was during a 40-day fast that Elijah heard the "still, small voice" of the Almighty. Allowing ourselves to feel hunger puts us on the ground floor of what it is to be humble —and humility is an important virtue for a person of faith. It takes us out of the center of our own little universe and allows us to be still for a moment so that we may know God and know ourselves better.

This Lent, instead of giving something up, try doing something extra, like reading from Scripture each day. Perhaps this is something you can do as a family. Take a little time around the dinner table to read and discuss something from scripture before or after your meal.

Let us pray for peace and for an end to terrorism in our world!

Life Long Faith Formation— It Takes a Village!

Every time we baptize a baby at a weekend liturgy, we, the gathered community, promise to help raise this child in the family of faith. We know that parents are the first and best teachers and role models of the faith for their children. But the gifts and support of the whole community are essential in the Christian formation of our young people.

Children need caring adults in the community to know their names and treat them like important members of the community (with real, important jobs such as helping take up the collection at Mass). Teens also have a developmental need to form meaningful relationships with adults in the community who can model mature discipleship and invite them into friendship with Jesus, giving them a sense of ownership within the Church and its ministries. Even adults may appreciate an invitation from a friend to attend Sunday Mass or other adult formation opportunities such as our Ash Wednesday community meal and book discussion.

There are so many ways to be a part of our parish's ministry of faith formation for all. We're welcoming new volunteers in many roles, including:

- Adult leaders for middle school youth group.
 Commitment is usually one Sunday morning meeting a month (10:15-11:15 a.m.). Responsibilities include leading planned small-group activities, participating in group discussions, and just being present for the 6th-8th graders.
- Adult leaders for senior youth group
 Commitment is usually one Tuesday
 evening meeting a month (7-8:30 p.m.).

 Responsibilities include participating in
 group discussions and just being present
 for the 9th-12th graders.
- Confirmation small-group leaders
 We're looking for adult leaders to make
 a two-year commitment to walking with
 a specific small group of Confirmation
 candidates throughout their preparation
 process. Sessions are twice monthly on
 Sunday nights (6:30- 8:30 p.m.), September
 through February. Responsibilities
 include guiding small-group discussions
 and activities at each meeting.
- · Prayer Partners.

When our youth participate in special events such as the annual Search Retreat and the National Catholic Youth Conference, we ask parishioners to pray for a young person by name while we are away. Prayer partners may also write a short personal note of support for their named teen.

Bridges of Faith Group Mentors.
 Our family formation program needs people of faith to lead others in understanding the faith teachings. Teen and adult mentors help our families in their faith development by guiding them throughout the month.



Volunteers for each formation program are given training and lesson materials.

Support Youth Ministry

Over the past several years, our Transfiguration family has very generously supported our teens through our Support Youth Ministry initiative. This special collection funds scholarships so that our teens can attend events such as the biannual National Catholic Youth Conference. In 2017, Transfiguration sponsored a pilgrim group of 35 teens and chaperones for this event. We are expecting another large group of participants in 2019. The National Study on Youth and Religion has confirmed that such intensive faith experiences are one of the most effective means of encouraging lasting conversion for young people.

Without the assistance of parishoners, this pilgrimage would be financially out of reach for many families. In the coming weeks you will find a "Support Youth Ministry" envelope along with your usual weekly parish envelopes.

Additionally, our young pilgrims will be sharing witness talks and taking up a second collection at all Masses the weekend of April 6-7. FINANCE CORNER

In this Finance Corner article, we're sharing information regarding Qualified Charitable Distributions (QDC), part of the new federal tax legislation that may be beneficial as an alternate way of giving for some people.

A qualified charitable distribution is a withdrawal from an individual retirement account that is sent directly to a charity. In other words, the funds don't pass through your hands. Rather, you instruct your IRA custodian to send the money straight to a charity of your choice. QCDs have been around for quite some time, providing a way to donate money to charity and still enjoy tax benefits under federal tax law. However, there are a couple of conditions that you must meet:

- **1.** You must be age 70½ or older at the time of the donation.
- **2.** You must be in a position to use the standard tax deduction when filing your federal tax return.

Under the new tax law, many people will be better off using the new and much larger standard federal deduction (\$13,600 for individuals 65 and older, and \$26,600 for couples age 65 and older filing jointly). However, when using the standard deduction (and not itemizing), you get no tax benefit from donating to charity. That is precisely where the QCD helps. You can take advantage of the new, larger standard deduction and get a tax break through the QCD—only now it comes in the form of an IRA withdrawal with the ability to exclude that income from your tax return.

If you are interested in pursuing this tax strategy, you should speak with your tax accountant to ensure that you qualify and take the appropriate steps to take advantage for the current tax year. We are always working to find ways to make supporting Transfiguration easier for you. Stay tuned for additional information in upcoming bulletins and newsletters.

n the early days of our parish, Fr. Jerry asked for volunteers to help manage the newly established Church of the Transfiguration; no experience (necessarily) required. In late summer of 1992, Transfiguration's original office assistant moved away, and the call for a new parish bookkeeper was announced at Sunday Masses. Sandi applied for and was given the position.

As Sandi recalls, a prerequisite for the new position was that she be part of "the family." Fr. Jerry must have had the foresight to know that someday the books would be automated, and Sandi's experience with computers would come in handy. (Until then, all the recording and balancing was done manually in large, heavy ledgers.)

Fr. Jerry had no desire to immerse himself in the day-to-day financial details, so he left Sandi to be mentored by Frank Stotz. Frank, who had the awesome responsibility of managing the church's revenue and expenses, always reminded her that this wasn't just a job, it was a ministry with a lot of responsibility. Sandi took that message to heart.

As the years went on, the Diocese of Rochester took on a bigger role in establishing more uniformity across parishes. This meant new accounting systems, payroll systems and databases, and even a new management structure in more recent years. Sandi took on these new challenges, as well as staffing changes and new campaigns.

Soon after Fr. Mike came to Transfiguration, more changes were made after some staff members retired. Fr. Mike asked Sandi to be the business manager as well as property manager, with added responsibility for the many buildings that had been built on the parish campus. If you ask Sandi what the most recent highlight of
