

[‡]From Father Schmeckel:

During this first week of July, we celebrate many great saints and, of course, Independence Day.

The **Feast of Saint Thomas is on July 3**. While Saint Thomas is known for doubting Jesus' Resurrection from the dead, this should not be his legacy. In the full story of the death and raising of Lazarus, Thomas boldly says to the other disciples, "Let us also go to die with him." (Jn 11:16) He shows at least some willingness to go along with Jesus' suffering and death. Even if he doesn't fully live up to this, in his heart, there is the start of his deeper belief



and trust in Jesus. Even in the Resurrection stories, after his doubt, Thomas is one of the first Apostles to explicitly state that Jesus is God, when cries out, "My Lord and my God!" (Jn 20:28) Traditionally, we believe that Thomas went all the way to India to proclaim the Good News, to teach people about Jesus, and, eventually, die as a martyr. If we have doubts like Thomas, we should ask for his help to grow in faith and courage that Jesus is truly God.

Independence Day: As Americans, we are very proud of our freedom and our rights. Saint John Paul II, approaching the New Millenium in 2000, wrote, "Freedom consists not in doing what we like, but in having the right to do what we ought." As we celebrate the history of our country and our many freedoms, we should take a moment to pause and think about how we use our freedom and liberties. Are they guided toward the good of our families, communities, and society-at-large, or do we use our freedom to satisfy our own needs, wants, and desires? It is also a good reminder for us to pray for all those who have served or currently serve in the armed forces who helped to protect and defend these great freedoms that we cherish!

On July 4, we also remember one of my favorite almost-saints, **Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati**, even though he is not officially on our liturgical calendar as yet. Blessed Pier was a young Italian man who was born into a wealthy family, but he ended up using much of his time and money to serve the poor of Turin, Italy. He was a sportsman and a mountain climber and used these natural gifts to bring other young people to Jesus and to the Church. He was a man of prayer, a man of fun, and a man of charity. He died at the young age of 24 years old but, as one writer described him, he is remembered for his joy and "ordinariness". We ask Blessed Pier Giorgio to pray for all the youth and young adults of our parishes. May his example lead them to a deeper friendship with Jesus.

The Memorial of **Saint Maria Goretti** is celebrated on July 6. She was a 12-year-old Italian girl who died in 1902. She was attacked and stabbed to death after refusing to give in to her attacker. She is best known for forgiving her murderer in the final hours of her life. The young man who killed her went to jail but was moved by her faith and willingness to forgive. When Maria was canonized in 1950, he was among the vast crowd that celebrated the day with joy. While her story is quite gruesome and difficult to hear, Saint Maria Goretti reminds us that forgiveness and reconciliation is possible – even in the worst and most wretched situations of our lives. Let us ask her to help us forgive those people in our lives that we are having a difficult time loving or forgiving for any reason.

Dear Padre,

How do we serve everyone in a culturally diverse parish?

In the past it was common to have parishes dedicated to different ethnic groups where such populations were concentrated. In 2010, the US bishops found that 33 percent of all US parishes were culturally diverse, and that's perhaps using a narrow understanding of diversity. Then in 2014, they published *Best Practices for Shared* Parishes: So That They May All Be One, in which they outline a ninemovement process for creating an inclusive parish. The term "shared parishes" describes parish communities in which two or more languages or cultural contexts are present in the ministerial life of



a parish. The fact that there are nine movements is notable. It means that we slowly move toward inclusiveness; we don't simply present a Mass in Spanish and think the job is done.

This brings to mind a parishioner in a parish I served in the Mississippi Delta. This was indeed a "shared parish." with a large African-American population, a significant Spanish-speaking population, and an elderly population of white Americans who expected a more "traditional" Mass with familiar hymns. Rosemary was an Italian-American whose family had lived in the area since the beginning of the nineteenth century. She served as the parish's director of education. Rosemary made it her practice to attend every Mass to welcome people and make them feel at home. She was the perfect example of the first movement toward serving everyone in a shared parish: hospitality.
