

## 2From Father Schmeckel:

!This weekend we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. The Transfiguration is always celebrated on August 6, but this year it falls on a Sunday so we can celebrate it with a bit more gusto and joy!

We will read in the Gospel this Sunday that Jesus takes Peter, James, and John up the mountain, and He is transfigured before them. He also speaks with Moses and Elijah who, in the Old Testament also talks with God the Father who speaks from heaven confirming that Jesus is truly the Son of God! The Catechism says, "For a moment Jesus discloses his divine



glory." (CCC 554) In other words, for a quick moment, the disciples see Jesus as He really is – fully God and fully human. I encourage you to spend some time this week re-reading this great Gospel, which you can find in your Bibles: Matthew 17:1-9.

We also hear Peter say in the reading today, "Lord, it is good that we are here." He then goes on (partly out of fear and disbelief) to offer to build tents for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah. Peter's offer would have reminded ancient Jewish people of many other stories of the Old Testament and their own holidays and celebrations.

Today, we can make Peter's words our own. We can say, "Lord, it is good that we are here". when we come to Mass each week, or when we stop in the Church to see Jesus present in the tabernacle, or when we make an Act of Spiritual Communion inviting Jesus into our hearts during the day. We can also make the same offer that Peter did – to build a place for Jesus to stay by making "room" in our days and in our homes for Him. Carving out a few minutes every day to pray, having crucifixes or religious art in our home that remind us of Jesus and the Saints and including Jesus and our beliefs in our in our day-to-day conversations are other ways to build a place for Jesus in our lives. The Transfiguration reminds us to be like Peter – and to offer Jesus a place to stay in our hearts!

Finally, the Transfiguration gives us **an opportunity to consider the problems of evil and suffering**. Many of the Church Fathers and prayers surrounding the Transfiguration talk about how seeing Jesus in the fullness of glory helped to strengthen the disciples and to prepare them for His suffering and death. Even though the disciples fled from Him, imagine how much worse off they could have been had they not seen his glory on Mount Tabor at that moment!

When I was praying about the Transfiguration, I thought about how God prepared Peter, James, and John ahead of time for the grave evil and suffering of Jesus' Death on the Cross. We too should spend some time thinking about why God allows bad things to happen to good people. This is easier to do before we go through great suffering. If something tragic happens in our life – like an unexpected death, or a natural disaster, or the loss of a job, reasonable and rational explanations may not help us. Suffering is always hard, but if we have already thought about difficult things beforehand, we can make our way through such tragedies with a little more awareness of God's presence. It doesn't mean that those times will be easy, but it may help us to begin seeing why God might allows these kind of things to happen to us.

I am writing this bulletin before leaving for World Youth Day in Portugal, but I want to say thank you for all of your prayers for a safe and fruitful pilgrimage! I will especially be praying for our parish families when our group visits the Shrine to Our Lady of Fatima!




The new **Saturday Mass Schedule** has begun. Saturday Mass will be held at **4:00 pm** at:

# Mass is for Everyone.....

"Why do I have to go to Mass? What do I get out of it?". These are questions parents, grandparents, teachers, and others sometimes hear from children and teens, and at times even from other adults. Although these questions may seem difficult to answer, there is a simple response: "You are not there to get something, you are there to give something."

Just like it's helpful to get all family members to prepare for a trip or vacation or to help with and serve a family meal and assist with the cleanup in order for everyone to enjoy and take more ownership in it, much the same thing happens when it comes to Sunday Mass. The more involved family members and especially children and teens get, and the more they participate, the better they understand the elements of the Mass and feel wanted and needed.

How can we help children and teens become more involved and better understand the various parts and the importance and beauty of the Mass? In reality, this is surprisingly easy to do. Here are some suggestions:

Beginning as young as 4 or 5 years old, when children are in Kindergarten, they along with their parents can welcome people to church and hand out worship aids. Before volunteering, talk as a family about the importance of making people feel welcomed, just as Jesus did.

At about age 7 or 8 years old, a child could join a parent who is an Usher and can help with those duties. As children get older and become more experienced, they can provide this service on their own. Families can also volunteer to bring up the Gifts during the Offertory. Talk with your children about how you value supporting your Church-community with your time, talent and treasure.

After they have received First Eucharist/ First Communion, and when the Parish offers the opportunity, children and teens can assist as Altar Servers. This important ministry allows those who serve in this capacity to become more intimately involved in the movement of the Mass and helps them recognize the witness of service they provide to the wider parish community. As children become older more Liturgical Ministry Involvement opportunities become available to them. With proper training and preparation, older children can be Lectors and proclaim the Readings at Mass. Serving God and others as Choir members is another possibility. When they are 13 and 14 years of age and older, teens may also enjoy assisting the Sacristan who serves as a coordinator for the Mass and makes sure it runs smoothly.

It would be hard to find a child regardless of his or her age who didn't take these ministries very seriously and begin to recognize that their presence is important. Some may even continue helping with different ministries as they get older. Above all, it is hoped that they will enjoy their involvement and their contributions and begin to understand and appreciate the importance of coming together as a community of faith to pray and give thanks and to share a simple meal at the table of the Lord – Mass on Sundays!

# Dear Padre,

For the past year or so I have been trying to pray on a regular basis, but I am constantly distracted. My mind wanders so easily. Do you have any suggestions?

Distractions in prayer are an inescapable part of the human condition and the result of our imagination. Even great saints experienced distractions in prayer, and some of their suggestions may help. When St. Thérèse of Lisieux struggled with prayer, she would recite an Our Father or a Hail Mary or read from the Gospels. Praying an act of faith or returning to God's presence and



love can turn our focus away from other concerns, but even then, distractions may still arise.

When we become aware of them, we should calmly renew our focus and continue our prayer. Saint Teresa of Ávila offers this quidance: "We should not be distressed by reason of our thoughts, nor allow ourselves to be worried by them....The thing is inevitable, therefore do not let it disturb or grieve you" (The Interior Castle). No matter how often distractions return or how long they last, they are not sinful. Rather, they are opportunities to show God that we are sincere about praying.

Saint Alphonsus, another great teacher of prayer, reminds us that prayer is necessary, beneficial, and always possible. Hang in there, he says, because the devil would like nothing better than for you to stop praying.
